

Big Match Delayed By Three Issues

NEW YORK (AP) — Plans for a million dollar September title match between heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott and Rocky Marciano, the Brockton, Mass., crusher, hinge on three important points:

1. Percentages. Felix Bocchicchio, Walcott's manager, insists on 45 per cent. Marty Weill, Marciano's manager, wants "more than 15 per cent." Promoter Jim Norris says he can allot only 60 per cent.
2. Date. Weill and Norris prefer Tuesday, Sept. 23. Bocchicchio likes Sept. 15 or Sept. 16.
3. Site. Weill and Norris want New York's Yankee Stadium. Bocchicchio wants a place "where I can manage my fighter," possibly Jersey City or Philadelphia.

The percentage angle may give Norris' International Boxing Club quite a headache. If Marty Weill, whose step father Al Weill is L. B.C. matchmaker, insists on too much more than 15 per cent, they will have quite a hassle.

Marciano, fresh from his sensational two-round knockout of Harry Matthews, planned to remain in New York a few days to have a definite date on the big fight. He'll go to camp in about two weeks.

The 27-year-old Brockton bullfight expressed surprise that Matthews did not "jab and run." As Rocky put it, "He really wanted to fight."

Matthews left for his Seattle home leaving manager Jack Hurley to collect the paycheck of about \$51,078.87 — the same amount Rocky collected for five minutes work.

Drain Sox Get 12-1 Victory Off All -Stars

Drain's own Jerry Cade staged one of his brilliant strikeouts shows before a home crowd Tuesday night to pace the Drain Black Sox to a 21-1 victory over a team of Evergreen All-Stars.

Working with sensational precision, the young Black Sox struck out 18 batters from a team made up of the top players from Sutherland and Elkton. Cade got started in the first inning after his former Drain High School teammate, Allan Brown, had tagged him for a single. In quick succession, the young left hander whiffed the next three. He added 15 more in the next eight innings and walked only one.

Another former teammate, Earl Simpson, who now plays for Elkton got the only All-Star run in the third inning when he blasted the game's lone homer.

Cade rose to his greatest heights when the heat was on. In the sixth inning, Glen Cox rached first on an error and Ray Cole walked to put two men on bases. But again, Cade met the challenge by fanning the next three men. In both the eighth and ninth, crucial strikeouts cooled rallies with two men on bases.

In the hitting department, Pat Wohlers set the pace for the Sox. He had a triple, double, two singles and a walk for a perfect night off two All-Star pitchers. Wohlers batted in the winning run in the first inning. With men on first and second, he collected his double for two runs batted in. His triple in the third accounted for another rbi. He pushed across another in the sixth and another in the eighth for a total of five rbi's.

For the All-Stars, Simpson's home run led off the third inning. Glen Cox followed him with a triple, but couldn't get home. Cox led the All-Stars with a triple and single in four trips. Ray Cole had two singles in three trips.

The All-Stars were somewhat handicapped by the fact that several teams in the Evergreen League were not informed of the game until very late. When the All-Star club was finally fielded, it contained only members of Elkton and Sutherland teams. Even Sutherland lacked the services of top players Bert Avery and Fred Toal.

The game was close on an earned run basis. The Sox had three earned runs to the All-Stars one, but untimely errors were costly. The All-Stars were only out 10-7.

Dove Hunting Rules Announced

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 1952-53 hunting regulations for shooting doves, band-tailed pigeons, rails, gallinules, scoter, elder and oldsquaw ducks in the United States and waterfowl in Alaska were announced by the Interior Department Tuesday.

Interior Secretary Oscar Chapman said regulations for migratory waterfowl and woodcock hunting will be announced late next month.

The new regulations provide a Sept. 1-15 open season on mourning doves in Washington, Oregon and all but 12 counties in Idaho.

Sept. 1-30 is set as the season for band-tailed pigeons in Washington and Oregon.

The daily bag and possession limit for the doves was set at 10 birds and for the pigeons at six birds.

Plywood, Scherner Teams Play For Pennant Tonight

It was pitcher's night at Veterans Field Wednesday.

Three of the four hurlers in the YMCA Industrial League softball playoffs threw three-hitters as Plywood Bros. and Umpqua Plywood moved into the finals. In the drum tight Vets-Umpqua game, a pair of crucial errors in the sixth inning won the game for Plywood. With a run in the fourth and two more in the fifth, Vets Employees grabbed a one-run edge that loomed big going into the bottom of the sixth.

But Dick Ballantyne sounded a foreboding note by opening his half of the sixth with a single. Kidder struck out the next man and a fly gave the Vets two outs. Then an error at shortstop brought Ballantyne home with the tying run. A pair of walks and still another error at shortstop scored the winning runs.

Umpqua took a one-run edge in the first, but Kidder drew his own game abrest by blasting a homer in the fourth for the first run or hit off Reder. Reder got wild in the next frame to walk three Vets and hit another. A fielder's choice added the second of two runs in that frame for the Vets. A double by Ballantyne and another error gave the Umpqua team its second run in the fourth. The Vets earned all their runs while Umpqua Plywood wasn't credited for a single earned tally.

Scherner Bros. wrapped their game up in the first inning with three unearned runs to coast to their 12th consecutive victory this year.

Don Hagedorn opened the game with a walk off losing pitcher Jack Gerling. A pair of errors brought in Hagedorn. Jack Loomis' timely double scored the winning runs.

Roseburg Drops Eighth In Row; Play Tonight

Even the Fates have turned their backs on Roseburg's luckless Chiefs.

Although collecting more hits and playing tighter baseball, the Chiefs lost their eighth straight game last night at Coquille, 4-3, on John Bilbrey's two-run pinch-hit double in the bottom of the eighth inning.

The exhibition tilt saw the Chiefs notch eight hits off Pitchers Skeeter Ellis and Dick Gilson, while Mickey Coen was holding the Loggers to six hits. But Bilbrey's clutch double, the only extra-base hit of the game, spelled the difference and extended the string of losses which started back on July 16.

Run In Third

Tonight the Chiefs get an even stiffer test when they tangle with the Oregon and Northwest semipro champion Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks on Finlay Field.

After a pair of scoreless innings at Fortier Field in Coquille, the Chiefs drew first blood with a single run in the third. Barney

The latter held the Chiefs in check with one hit in the next 2-3 innings.

The eighth was Coen's fatal inning. He had a three-hitter up to that point, but he doubled the count in that one frame. Singles to Hinchberger and Lee Wert and Taylor's sacrifice put two men in scoring position for Bilbrey's disastrous pinch hit.

The Chiefs had the tying and winning runs on bases in the last-chance ninth after Koch had walked and Shirliff had reached first on an error. Two men were already out, however, and Al Simpson's high fly snuffed the threat.

Coen went the route for the Chiefs. Although his six hits were enough to lose the game, he struck out eight and walked four.

From a hitting standpoint, Barney Koch and Lovell Baker divided up five of Roseburg's eight hits. Koch had three for four and Baker two for four. The Chiefs committed only one error.

Globetrotters To Give Tough Test To Chiefs

When the Roseburg Chiefs run up against the Harlem Globetrotters this Sunday at 2 p.m. on Finlay Field, they will be facing a well spring of baseball talent.

Abe Saperstein, one of the top selectors of crowd-drawing talent, states that many of the septa stars with the Trotters this year are "sure bets to make the major leagues in the not-too-distant future."

Apparently he knows what he's talking about. When associated with the front office of the Cleveland Indian team, Saperstein signed such renowned Negro greats as Larry Doby, Luke Easter, Orestes Minoso, Harry Simpson and Satchel Paige. Saperstein is currently a stockholder and talent scout at Bill Veeck's St. Louis Browns organization.

This is the sixth season in action for Abe Saperstein's crowd-pleasing Globetrotters of the diamond. He calls them the best club he ever put on the road. This is a big statement when it is realized that other clubs in the first five years ran up a string of 331 victories to 106 defeats for an .834 average.

The team is managed by one of the top developers of American Negro baseball talent. He is Winfield Scott Welch. Welch's record is marked by the numerous championships his clubs have won. He has mentored the New Orleans Creasents, Detroit Stars, New York Cuban Giants and the American Giants.

With the backing of such fundamntalists as Saperstein and Welch, the team is bound to be bristling with power. But what makes the crowds is the showmanship that goes with this power. The name Saperstein is enough to assure that.

Los Angeles moved into fifth place, three games behind Seattle, as Portland moved out.

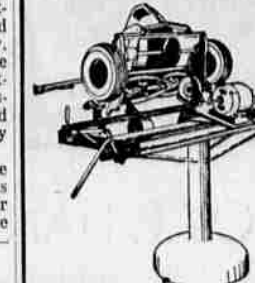

San Diego, apparently back on the victory trail after two weeks of unsteady, erratic play, beat Sacramento by an 8 to 5 count.

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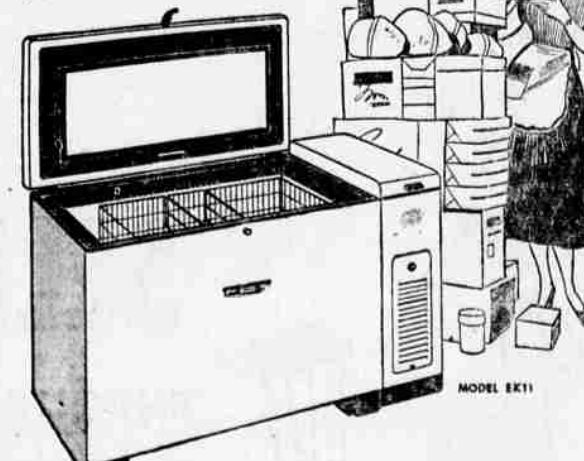
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
