Of Cardinals
Threatens Bums**

Can lightning strike twice for Eddie Stanky?
Will it be the miracle of the Mound City in 1952 just as it was the miracle of Coogan's Bluff in 1951?
Stanky is keeping discreetly quiet as his sizzling St. Louis Cardinals continue to apply pressure on the Dodgers and Giants in the National League race. But there is no doubt the scrappy little Redbird skipper is thinking if it happened once it can happen again.
Who will forget the '51 pennant race in which the Giants, sparked by Stanky, rose from a 13 1/2 game deficit on Aug. 11 to nose out the Dodgers for the pennant in a play-off?
With that in mind, it would be hazardous to discount the third place Cardinals because they trail the pace-setting Dodgers by eight and a half games with 57 more to go.
They struggled through 13 innings Tuesday night before they finally downed the Braves in Boston, 6-5, to pick up a full game on the Dodgers and Giants.
Murry Dickson gained the honor of becoming the first Pittsburgh pitcher to defeat Brooklyn this season ending a 13-game Dodger winning streak over the Pirates with an eight-hit 7-1 triumph.
Rookie Warren Hacker, with the help of veteran Dutch Leonard, gained his ninth triumph as the Chicago Cubs defeated the Giants, 4-2.
Philadelphia's Phillies continued their blistering pace, sweeping a two-night twin bill from Cincinnati, 6-1 and 4-3.
Mickey Mantle's grand slam home run with two out in the ninth inning gave the New York Yankees a thrilling uphill 10-7 triumph over the Chicago White Sox and enabled them to retain their three-game first place margin over Cleveland. The Indians whipped Boston, 4-1 to drop the Red Sox 4 1/2 games off the pace.

**U. S. Swimmers
Cut Relay Mark**

HELSINKI (AP)—Continuing the record-a-day (or better) pace of the 1952 Olympic swimming competition, the United States women's 400 meter relay team shattered the Olympic record in winning its trial heat today.
The American quartet of Evelyn Kawamoto of Hawaii and Jacqueline Lavine, Marilee Stepan and Joan Alderson, all of Chicago, was timed in 4:28.1 in beating Holland in its heat.
This broke the Olympic mark of 4:29.2 set by another American team in the 1948 Olympics at London and was more than four seconds faster than Hungary's time in winning the other qualifying heat.
Eight teams qualified for the final Friday.
Three United States men swimmers had little trouble qualifying for the second round of the men's 100 meter backstroke and, in rather unexpected performances, the American water polo team won its first game of the semi-final round competition.
American fencers marked up a decisive victory in a semi-final competition in the team sabre event.
Argentina's basketball team, regarded as the most serious threat to the U. S., suffered its first defeat of the tournament.
Yoshinoba Oyakawa of Honolulu and Ohio State University turned in the best time in the men's backstroke swim, one minute and six seconds.
Jack Taylor of Akron, O., another Ohio State swimmer, also won his heat but Allen Stack of Hingham, Mass., and Yale, finished second.
Stack had to swim with a bandaged hand, the result of a fall from a motor scooter in the Olympic village last night.
America's hopes in the women's springboard diving competition received a setback when an international jury over-ruled the judges

**16 Enter 2nd
Round Of Tourney**

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Sixteen survivors set out in the second round of match play in the Women's Western Amateur golf tournament Wednesday, with gallery attention focused on a 15-year-old upset kid from Huntington, W. Va., Berridge (Berri) Long.
The pretty teen-age high school girl drew the spotlight when she ousted the Western's defending champion, Marjorie Lindsay, Curtis Cup team member from Decatur, Ill., 3 and 2, Tuesday.
Wednesday Miss Berri, already women's champion of West Virginia despite her age, encountered further strong opposition. Her opponent was pert, smooth swinging Mrs. Lyle Bowman of Richmond, Calif., former state champion of Oregon and winner last April of another recognized inter-sectional title, the Women's Trans-Mississippi.
That reduced her total by nine points and put her in eighth place among the qualifiers for this afternoon's free diving competition.
Mrs. Patricia McCormick of Long Beach, Calif., leads the divers.
Uruguay, the team that almost knocked itself out of the tournament two days ago when some of its players attacked Referee Vincent Farrell of Newark, N. J., turned in the biggest upset of the basketball tournament by beating Argentina, 66-65, in an overtime game.
