Wenger said he had no money to hire an attorney.

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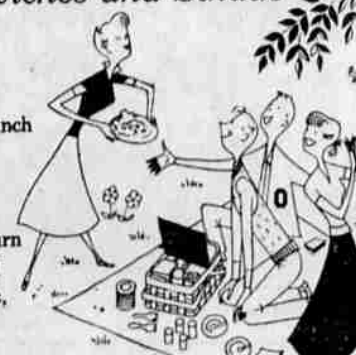
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WAHANKA CAMP FIRE GIRLS HAVE PICNIC

The public is invited.

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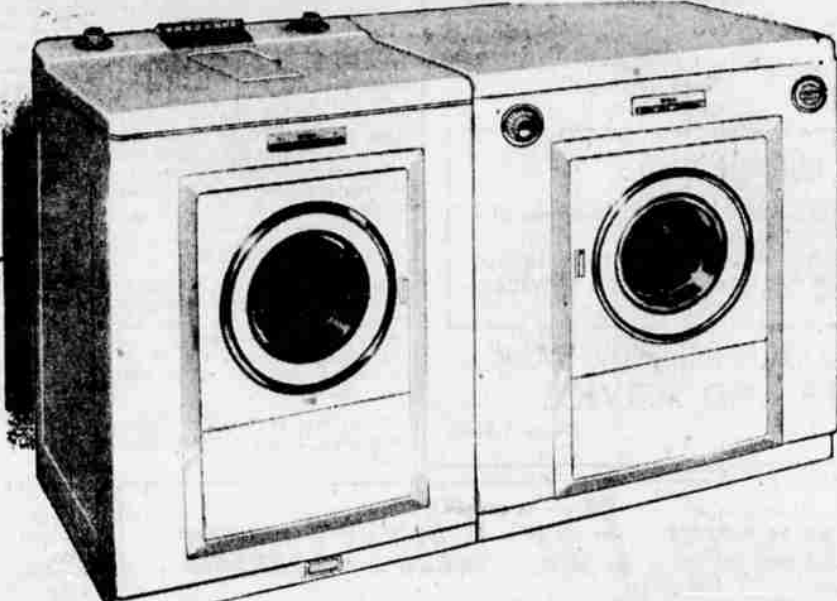
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
