

### 'Missing' Girl Reposes In Bed As Search Is On

TOLEDO, Ore. — Nine-year-old Florence Scott ran away from home Wednesday. When she didn't come back, search parties were organized and near midnight 75 or more volunteers were combing the rugged bramble-covered hills near her home.

In the early morning Sheriff Timothy Whelp searched a new place — the little girl's room, and sure enough, there she was, snug in bed.

While searchers had been out scouring the woods, Florence had tip-toed home.

The whole thing started Wednesday when she turned in two false fire alarms and firemen explained that was a serious business and scolded her. By mid-afternoon she was off and away. By 8 p.m., state police, city police, sheriff's aides and volunteers recruited to appeals over radio station KNPT at Newport, formed a growing search crew.

The girl lives with her mother, Mrs. Walter Mabe, two miles east of here. Her father is Carl Scott of Toledo.

### Adventist Camp Girl Says Youth Assaulted Her

GLADSTONE, Ore. — Police Chief Clarence Moore said Thursday Margaret Salyer, 13, Grants Pass, disappeared last Sunday from a Seventh-Day Adventist camp meeting here.

He said another 13-year-old girl reported she was raped by two teen-aged youths whom she met while attending the camp meeting.

Moore, who said he was not notified of either case until more than 24 hours after they occurred, did not reveal the names of the girl who said she was assaulted nor of 18 and 19-year-old youths whom she has accused. He said he had their names and was seeking them. The description of the two fits that of two youths who were seen talking to the Salyer girl just before she disappeared at about 3 p.m. Sunday, Moore said.

Neither of the youths were registered at the camp meeting. They were traced by Washington license plates on their car, Moore added.

### Roseburg YMCA Camp's First Session Filled

The Roseburg YMCA boys camp at Diamond Lake is filled for the first session, scheduled for Aug. 17 to 24, reports Merlin Donaldson, local "Y" director.

There are still openings for a few more boys for the second camp, Aug. 24-30. The registration is open to boys 9 to 14 years, and is limited to a total of 30, said Donaldson.

### Saxton To Risk Boxing Record With Castellini

strike against Red hydroelectric plants.

Gen. Wiley D. Ganey, head of the U.S. Fifth Air Force Bomber Command, predicted the blow would have a psychological impact on the Communists.

The target was saturated with 500-pound bombs, some of which will not explode for hours or even days. The plant area had been showered with leaflets for almost two months, warning non-combatants to stay away because it would be bombed.

On the ground, Allied infantrymen Thursday wrested an outpost from Chinese troops in a two-hour fight in driving rain northwest of Yonchon on the Western front. The Reds had taken the position Monday.

### MUNSAN, Korea

The United Nations Command added 45 names Thursday to the list of U.N. personnel it says were captured by the Reds and asked for an accounting.

The names were not made public. They were given to the Reds at a 35-minute staff officers' session at Panmunjom.

The staff officers are considering final wording of a Korean armistice agreement draft while full-scale negotiations, blocked over prisoner exchange, are in recess until Sunday.

A U.N. spokesman said the staff officers made "no appreciable progress" Thursday.

### MORE POLIO CASES

PENDELTON — Three new polio cases brought the Umatilla county total to 26 Thursday.

Dr. E. E. Berg, county health officer, said nine of those stricken had been released from hospitals. He urged parents to keep their children out of crowds.

Nineteen of the cases are from Milton-Freewater. Others include Weston 3, Pilot Rock 2, Athena 1 and McNary 1. None has been fatal.

Last year's polio total was 14.

Among more than 50 resolutions approved by delegates were those calling for:

The Air Force to assume responsibility for the spotter, ground observation posts.

A universal military training program.

A study of narcotics legislation to improve Oregon's laws.

Increases in veterans home and farm loans.

Repudiation of agreements with certain nations which permit foreign nationals to avoid military service although they live in the U.S.

The site of next year's convention will be decided at an executive board meeting to be held later in Portland.

### Oregon Capital Layout Planned

SALEM — A master plan for development of Oregon's state capital buildings to "make Salem the most beautiful capital city in the United States" was proposed Wednesday by Francis Kealy, New York architect.

Kealy who designed the present capitol and who was hired by the State Board of Control to prepare a long-range plan, said his plan calls for extension of the Capitol Mall to four blocks long. The mall now is one block long, but currently is being extended for another block.

The capitol and proposed supreme court building would be at opposite ends of the mall, with four state buildings on each side.

The only buildings now constructed are the capitol, and library, public service, and highway buildings.

Kealy said his plan, which requires legislative approval, would take care of the state's needs for the next 20 or 25 years. At the end of that period, the mall would be extended another four blocks to D street.

### Two Oregon Prison Guards Hurt In Fight

SALEM — Two guards were injured Wednesday in a brief disturbance at the Oregon State prison.

Warden Virgil O'Malley said James Q. Anderson, a 29-year-old convict from Klamath County, started the fight after becoming intoxicated on pruno—a fermented drink made of fruits and vegetables discarded by the prison canteen.

Guard James Schultz attempted to quiet Anderson and in the fight that followed he suffered a knife wound. Another guard, Raymond O'Neill, who rushed to aid Schultz, was attacked by other convicts.

### No Traffic Deaths This Year In Klamath Falls

CHICAGO — Klamath Falls, Ore., is the only U. S. city in the 10,000-25,000 population group which has not had a single traffic death this year.

That was the report Wednesday of the National Safety Council.

The council said that the country's toll the first six months of 1952 was 16,820 — a 3 per cent increase over the 16,400 at the halfway mark last year.
