TACOMA — The Rev. Loyl Vickers, executive secretary of the Tacoma Council of Churches, resigned Tuesday to become a radio station manager in Oregon.

He said the resignation would be effective Sept. 1 but gave no other details.

Rev. Vickers came here nine years ago from Oregon. He figured in several recent Tacoma vice cleanup campaigns.

Saudi Arabian King Orders U.S. Luxury Airplane

WASHINGTON — The King of Saudi Arabia is getting a four-engine American airplane equipped with a king-size bed and an elevated revolving throne, complete with safety belt.

Transocean Air Lines said the plane, one of five Douglas DC-4 Skyliners sold to Saudi Arabia, is being converted at Oakland, Calif., into the "most plush of all personal transports."

The throne and 18 luxurious seats will be installed at Transocean's Bradley Field, Conn., maintenance base.

The company said the throne, on the king's orders, must be raised above the floor and must rotate 360 degrees. It will have a safety belt stressed to withstand a "10-G force"—a pull 10 times that of gravity.

Transocean said the remodeling is being rushed to enable the King to fly from his winter palace at Riyadh to his summer palace at Taif, to lead off the annual pilgrimage of Moslems to Mecca.

Standard Oil Hit By \$450,000 Fire At Ketchikan

KETCHIKAN, Alaska — A fast-spreading fire destroyed a big pier and warehouses of the Standard Oil Company of California Wednesday with loss estimated at nearly \$450,000.

Firemen saved large oil storage tanks near the waterfront terminal, and controlled the blaze shortly before noon.

The loss estimate was made by the Ketchikan Chronicle, based on reports from firemen. The newspaper reported about a million gallons of petroleum products were destroyed.

Burning oil spread on the water and washed under the nearby Union Oil Company pier at height of the fire, but the blaze was restricted to the Standard Oil terminal.

Slump Will Ease, Farmers Advised

CORVALLIS — Several signs of economic recession are showing, but Oregon farmers were advised Wednesday that the slump likely would not be severe the rest of the year.

In fact, Economist M. D. Thomas of the Oregon State College extension service, said the closing months of the year might even bring some recovery.

Many Oregon farmers have been hurt by the downward price trend on strawberries, cherries, chickens and wool, he said, and a sagging beef market has added to their troubles.

Thomas advised farmers that it likely would be a mistake in most cases to hold out for last year's high prices. The best bet, he said, is for them to keep a close eye on supply, demand and price shifts so they can market at the most favorable time.

The situation is not at all alarming Thomas said, with many firm factors in the economy.

GOP State Senator, Democrats To Debate

SEATTLE — State Senator Don Eastwood of Tacoma, who played a prominent part in the recent Republican National Convention, flew to Los Angeles Tuesday for a debate with James Roosevelt on the relative merits of Presidential Candidates Adlai Stevenson and Dwight Eisenhower.

He was scheduled to fly to New York Wednesday for a similar debate there with Democratic Sen. Blair Moody of Michigan. Elmo Roper will be moderator.

Boy Cuts First Two Teeth At Age Of 9

ASTORIA — James Stanley Pearson Jr., at the age of nine days, cut his first two teeth.

"We thought we saw them coming in Monday night," said James Sr., "but we weren't sure until Thursday."

The two are in the infant's lower jaw. His 18-month-old brother got his first teeth when six or seven months old.

Neuner's Ruling Favors New State Department

SALEM — The State Department of Finance and Administration has complete control over printing of all state departments, including that of Secretary of State Earl T. Newby, Attorney Gen. George Neuner ruled Wednesday.

This control, Neuner said, gives State Finance Director Harry S. Dorman power to pass on all copy submitted by state departments.

Dorman asked for the opinion after Newby and State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson objected to Dorman's proposal to leave their names off letterheads of state institutions. The opinion apparently gives Dorman the authority to leave their names off any printed matter.

Home Fire Kills Man; Cigarette Believed Cause

ALBANY, Ore. — The body of James Hillis Hanscom, 49, was found Tuesday on a flaming davenport in his home at Crabtree, nine miles east of here.

Whether he died from burns or a heart attack could not be learned, Deputy Coroner Walter Kropp reported.

A neighbor discovered the blaze, believed started by a cigarette.

Stork Beats Taxicab In Trip To Hospital

HILLSBORO — Mr. and Mrs. Albert Powell, Vernonia, took a cab to a hospital here Tuesday night.

By the time they arrived, Mrs. Powell had given birth to an eight pound, six ounce girl, born at Banks. Don Bailey, the cab driver stopped the car and ran for help. He found Mrs. L. B. Shaw, a trained nurse, working in a nearby store. She aided in the delivery.

Authorities Pay Fine For Girl Truck Driver

WHITEFISH, Mont. — A woman was fined \$5 for not having a weight sticker on her truck. But that was just the beginning.

She told the Whitefish Court she had a receipt proving the sticker had been applied for. She told the justice of the peace she wouldn't pay the fine—she preferred jail. She then sat eight hours waiting for transport to nearby Kalispell jail.

Justice of the Peace Robert Hunter, the Whitefish police chief and three highway patrolmen gave up, paid her fine themselves and cancelled the jail sentence.
