Roseburg Jr. In Warmup For Bashor Bombers

The Roseburg Pee Wees complete their double home-and-home series at Myrtle Creek today, but it's bound to be just a warmup for Saturday's all-important series with the Bashor Bombers.

Frank Bashor's young charges return to the Finlay Field pastures for the fifth straight year for the annual series which has become almost traditional. The young Portlanders always invade Roseburg with one of the best teen-age clubs in the state, but the local Pee Wees spend the year pointing for this big one. This year, it's no different.

Following an exhibition game between two local teams of very young youngsters at 6 p.m. Saturday, the Pee Wees, 13-and-under, bare their bats for a five-inning tilt with the Bashor Cubs. The local baseball youths then close out the evening with the seven-inning nightcap between bombers and Pee Wees 15-and-under.

Higher Age Limit

It's the Bombers who invariably give the Roseburg Pee Wees a bad time. This year they're more vaunted than ever. In a six-week season, the Bombers have lost only three games. Tuesday night, they outscored unbeaten Tigard, which pitched Tigard High's famous Johnny Fredericks who scored 52 points in a basketball game last winter.

Since Bashor has upped his age limit to 15 years for the Bombers, they will have almost the same team as last year. Bashor will probably start his brilliant young right-hander, Keith Krupke, who last year struck out the first six Roseburg boys to face him. He had 10 strikeouts in four innings before he was relieved.

Also back will be Buck Knight, whose parents were once Roseburg residents.

Hurriers Needed

Coach Hal Zurcher of Roseburg reports he will add several Junior League players to the lineup. This move is acceptable because the Roseburg Pee Wee program is limited to youngsters 14-years or younger. He has already selected Dick Ricketts, Fred Hargis, Loren Sargent and Billy Rudzik to bolster the team.

"It should be a fair ball club," Zurcher said. His only worry is the pitching department. He has no hurlers of Krupke's caliber. No admission charge will be made to the game, but donations for uniforms and equipment for the local Pee Wee program will be accepted at the gate.

27 Sign For 'Y' Tennis Tourney

With the deadline for the YMCA-sponsored Roseburg Tennis tournament looming tonight, 27 entries have been listed, according to Tournament Director Al Hoffman.

Additional entries must be filed sometime today with Al Hoffman at 3-5363, Merlin Donaldson at the YMCA or on posted lists at the High School tennis courts. The nine-day tourney starts Friday. Final rounds will be completed by Sunday, Aug. 10.

Hoffman states that pairings will be announced in Friday's News-Review and first rounds must be completed by Sunday night so second round pairings can be made. The second round will continue from Monday, Aug. 4, through Thursday, Aug. 7. Netters may play off their matches at their leisure during the specified dates.

To date, Hoffman has seven boys listed in the 15-and-under age brackets, nine in the junior men's field for youths through 18, and 11 in the men's division. These are all singles and most will pair up for the doubles competition.

Hoffman reveals that the perennial city doubles champions, Royd Bruton and Louis Miles have failed to sign yet. He says they may not defend this year. The men's singles championship is wide open since Hilbert Lee has shunned this division to team up with Dick Jacobson in men's doubles.

This pair will definitely be the doubles team to watch since Jacobson just finished a sparkling four-year high school career on the courts and Lee is one of the top adult players in the area. In the junior men's division, Jacobson and Ronnie Groves have teamed to take the favorite's role. This team was runnerup for the state high school championship this year.

Umpqua Trout Catches Good

Trout fishing in the upper Rogue River is good, but is fair to poor in the Grants Pass area. The water is low and best catches are made on flies, states the weekly fishing report of the Oregon State Game Commission's district office here. Salmon fishing at Winchester Bay is fair when weather conditions permit passage of small boats across the bar.

Trout fishing is poor on coastal lakes, but spiny ray fishing is good.

Good catches of trout are being made on the North Umpqua River from Winchester to Eagle Rock and on the South Umpqua from Mile to Camp Comfort.

Some salmon trout are being taken in the vicinity of Umpqua and The Forks. Summer steelhead fishing is good at Steamboat, but only a few are being caught at Winchester.

Chiefs Showing Flashiest Fielding, Low In Pitching

The Roseburg Chiefs continued this week to be one of the flashiest teams afield but definitely a-floundering in the hitting and pitching departments.

Statistics from League Statistics show the Chiefs tops in double plays and only second to Coos Bay-North Bend in team fielding with a flashy 854 percentage. In addition, the Chiefs have committed only 35 errors in League play. This is second low to Coos Bay-North Bend's 23.

However, hitting is a different matter. The Chiefs still have only Hal Zurcher and Lovell Baker in the crowded .300-or-better list. Zurcher has a .333 average and Baker is just over the mark with a .303.

It's interesting to note that the Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks, who deluged Roseburg with 19 hits Wednesday night, have six better-than-.300 batters, five of them in the top 10.

Douglas County's other Southwestern Oregon League team, Drain, was still not hot. The Black Sox have five in the .300-or-better group, led by Norvall Ritchey's healthy .411. Harvey Storey has fallen to second in RBI's with 16, but still leads in doubles with 9. Ritchey shares the triples lead with two others now.

In pitching, Drain's Roy Helser and Jerry Cade continued as the hottest pitching team of the League.

Visiting Batters Launch Wild Hitting Spree

A murderous battery of Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks proved their claim to the Oregon and Northwest semi-professional baseball championship by humbling the Roseburg Chiefs, 10-0, last night on Finlay Field.

The exhibition loss was the ninth straight setback for the local Lumberjack Pitchers. Don White whitewashed the Chiefs with a seven-hit performance.

The hulking Lumberjack batting order, which never ran low on hitting talent, racked up 19 hits to waltz to victory. All but one of the winning tallies was earned.

Beamer Called

It took particular delight in the pitches of Starter Bus Sporer, who was sent packing to the showers after 1-13 innings. In that short stint, the Lumberjacks sent 15 men to the plate, collected six runs and nine hits, including a first-inning two-run homer by Glenn Stetter.

Wally Beamer was sent in to stop the run cascade. He met the challenge in that second inning by retiring the last two batters, but he had to be satisfied with scattering hits and runs in the following frames. In his 7-23 innings, he held the man-eating Lumberjack crew to four runs and 10 hits.

Only two 'Jacks in the original lineup failed to get at least two hits. At the top of the batting order, for instance, Leadoff Man Lou Scrivens collected three for six. Curly Leininger got two for three, including a double. Stetter had a homer and a single in four trips, behemoth Buzz Arlitt rapped two for five and Dick Wenner had two for four. Pitcher White, himself, was one of the top batters of the evening. He hit a double and two singles in his first three trips to the plate.

With hitting and pitching on their side, the Lumberjacks added crack fielding for an unbeatable combination. A single error for the night marred their pyrotechnic show.

Top Fielding

The Chiefs managed to scatter their seven hits over four innings and only once did they get a man to third base. In the eighth, Chuck Fiske and John Ferrell singled consecutively and Barney Koch's groundout to the pitcher put them on second and third. Bud Shirliff struck out to nip the budding rally, however. Only four Chiefs got to second.

Some brilliant fielding gems by the Chiefs saved the game from a complete rout. It was again a department in which the locals couldn't be outshone. Bud Shirliff came up with the first in the rugged second inning. With two outs and two men on bases, Lumberjack Ken Jensen blasted a long, high fly far out into the gloom of deep center field. Shirliff took off at the crack of the bat. He made a motion like flagging a train as he balanced the ball on his gloved fingertips to make the out.

Lovell Baker drew cheers from the crowd also with a flying catch to retire the Lumberjack side in the fourth. Curly Leininger hammered a bullet liner to the left of third that Baker snared with an almost instinctive motion.

Barney Koch was the polished veteran at second base and also the only Chief to get more than one hit in his rising batting fortunes. He had two singles in four trips.

Coen Will Start Against Globetrotters On Sunday

Mickey Coen has been picked to take the mound against the Harlem Globetrotters on Finlay Field Sunday afternoon at 2.

The former Roseburg High School ace and current Chief stringer has shown tremendous improvement since his 1951 year with the Roseburg Indians. His speed has picked up and he has discovered a variety of pitches which carried him to the top of the Southwestern Oregon League early in the season. He still needs seasoning, but is definitely a good choice to meet the crack traveling outfit.

He will be up against probably the best barnstorming baseball team in the nation. The Globetrotters of the diamond are currently forming a percentage bulge in the win column to keep pace with the fabulous basketball team which bears the same name.

In five years of action, the baseball Trotters have compiled an average of .834 on 531 wins and 106 losses. This is a far cry from the basketball team's 25-year record of 4,092 victories against 292 defeats, but it's still far and away the best traveling baseball team record in the land.

Owner Abe Saperstein and Manager W. S. Welch have handpicked their players from the best Negro talent outside the big leagues. And Welch apparently knows his baseball flesh. He has developed such 'name' players as Satchel Paige, Luke Easter, Artie Wilson, Orestes Minoza, Ed Steele, Fidel Davis, Jimmy Newberry and Felix McLaurin.

Welch himself is one of the reasons the Globetrotters are held in such high esteem. He gives the team that touch of showmanship gained from his winter months as road manager of the basketball trotters. And his foundation in baseball is as solid as any in the country. He has managed numerous Negro teams to championships including the Birmingham Black Barons, New York Cuban Giants and the Cincinnati Crescents.

Two new players were listed Wednesday on the Roseburg Chief roster.

Manager Earl Sargent hopes that Pitcher Don Dargumond of Eugene and Infielder Jack Warren of Portland will give Roseburg's waning baseball fortunes a shot in the arm in the home stretch Southwestern Oregon League drive.

The Chiefs started the season with high hopes based on a wealth of youthful talent. But since then a corps of four heavy-hitting players have been skinned off by professional teams. The result was staggering to the Chiefs and is the major reason for the current slump.

Both the new additions are na-

turals to throw into the gap. Sigmond has been a highly successful hurler in the Oregon State League with Eugene's Athletics.

He was the first string pitcher for the University of Oregon last spring. He pitched briefly for the Chiefs last summer. Sargent states the young Webfoot will be here for the next League series Aug. 9 and 10.

Jack Warren is currently one of the hottest hitters in Portland's City League in spite of his team's second division position. He is clipping along at a .467 pace with the Heale's Babes. Warren may be able to appear in the Harlem Globetrotter game here Sunday.

Drain Blasts 4-2 Victory Off Eugene

The Drain Black Sox mechanically nailed down another victory at Eugene last night.

With three-hit pitching by the duo of Gene Peterson and Roy Helser, the Sox notched their second exhibition win from the Athletics, 4-2.

A pair of runs on two singles and a walk pushed across the two-run winning margin for the Sox in the eighth inning. Mel Krause led off the inning with a walk and later scored on Harvey Storey's single. Storey romped across shortly after when Ron Phillips slapped a clean single.

Peterson hurled a brilliant game through the first 7-23 innings. He struck out nine and walked only four. But he had to call for help in the eighth after a run had scored and two men were on bases with only a single out. Helser snuffed that rally quickly by forcing a fly-out and scoring a strikeout.

Drain got into the scoring column in the second inning when Pat Wohlers continued his sensational current hitting string with a double. He scored on an error. Bob Caviness tied it up in the fifth. He got the first hit off Peterson, a resounding home run, for the Athletics.

The Sox moved ahead again in the sixth. Bill Beard's single brought Krause across after the latter had walked and stolen second.

Roy Helser's invincible crew closed out the game in the last frame with the bases loaded. Helser singled off Reliever Don Sigmond and Don Kirsch and Krause drew walks. But the heavy-sticking former Portland Beavers, Bill Beard and Harvey Storey, thumbed their noses at the possibilities. Beard flew out and Storey rapped a grounder to first.

Pat Wohlers was again a big man in the Drain batting order. He thumped a double and triple in four trips to the plate.

The double victory pushed the Beavers into a tie with Los Angeles in fifth place, only a game and a half behind the Rainiers, and gave them a 2-1 edge in the eight-game series.

Dick Ward gained the decision Over Vern Kindsfather in the seven-inning opener.

Portland won the finale in the sixth inning following Eddie Barr's hunt, the Beavers' only base hit of the game. Frank Austin then hit a sacrifice bunt but was hit in the back by a throw from Seattle catcher Claude Christie that advanced Barr to third. Rocco Krsnich missed a throw to third and Barr scored. Austin scored on an infield out.

It was one of Krsnich's last appearances for the Rainiers. He was recalled Wednesday by the Chicago White Sox who are sending Leo Thomas, a Portland player last year, to replace him at third.

Jack Salverson, although touched for 13 hits, twirled San Diego to a 5-2 win over Sacramento, and the Padres advanced to within 5 1/2 games of the leading Hollywood club.
