Defense To Take
Most Of Steel
Next 6 Months

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Pentagon expects defense production to be the nation's steel output during the next six months.

An official handling military production problems said this will necessarily mean less steel, temporarily, for civilian use, and a return in part to the system of wartime priorities for military production.

He said the nation lost 20 million tons of steel output during the 54 days of recent strike.

To meet urgent needs of some plants, the official added, air shipments of raw materials may be authorized.

In order to see that the military gets first crack at available steel, the Defense Department has assigned 30 special officers to stay at the mills.

Higher Ceilings Upped

Meanwhile, Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall signed an order permitting steel mills to put higher ceiling prices in effect on all steel delivered on or after July 26. It was issued after a directive from Acting Defense Mobilizer John R. Steelman.

Price control officials said that a price increase probably will be given to aluminum producers and fabricators. A decision is expected this week on the amount of the increase.

The big three producers, Aluminum Company of America, Reynolds and Kaiser, have applied for ceiling price increases of 2 to 2.35 cents a pound on raw aluminum and 10 to 12 1/2 percent on semi-fabricated and fabricated aluminum products. They have signed contracts calling for higher wages if a price increase is granted.

GRANTS PASS (AP)—Carl Penry, 66, died Wednesday in a hospital of burns suffered in an explosion and fire Tuesday at the Kelt Chevrolet Co. where he was employed as a janitor.

Penry at the time was scraping paint from the floor of a paint shop at the rear of the building. His clothing was set afire and the blast of undetermined origin broke most of the windows in the building.

The fire, which spread through paint to the roof of the building, was quickly controlled by firemen.

Contract Talks
For Coal Miners
Begun By Lewis

WASHINGTON (AP)—John L. Lewis reportedly has begun talks with a major part of the soft coal industry, probably to lay the groundwork for full-scale contract negotiations.

An informed source, who is in touch with the situation but declined use of his name, said Wednesday, Lewis had his first conference with the industry Tuesday.

The United Mineworkers chief told the bituminous coal operators association July 22 that the present soft coal work contract would end Sept. 22.

The present contract has been open for termination on 60-day notice by either side for several months.

Barring a new contract, Lewis is considered certain to take his 450,000 miners out of the nation's soft coal pits on Sept. 22 if he follows past performances.

His battle cry has always been "no contract, no work."

It was not known definitely who participated on the industry side but the obvious choice would be Harry M. Moses, president of the Bituminous Coal Operators Association and the man who does all the negotiating for association members.

These operators represent about half of the annual soft coal tonnage mined by the UMW.
