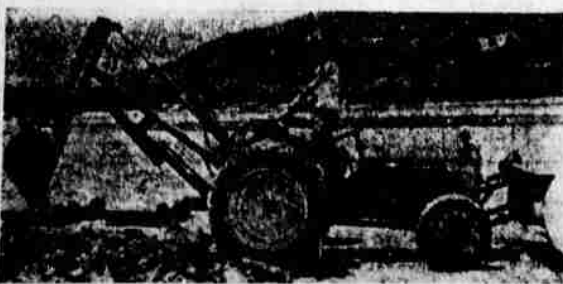

Helicopters' Use Could End Bloody Beach Landings

NEW YORK — The helicopter's performance in Korean tests indicate that the U.S. need never go through another bloody Tarawa, Aviation Week, McGraw-Hill publication, reports.

In any future beach assault, helicopters probably will lift assault waves from widely dispersed transports and land them behind the enemy's beach defenses. Though in no Korean operation have helicopters actually replaced naval landing craft, combat evaluation tests show that such "vertical envelopment" is practical, according to the magazine.

Since last September, when evaluation tests of the Sikorsky HRS-1 helicopter were begun by Marine Transport Squadron HMR-161, the helicopter has become a full-fledged tactical combat vehicle, the magazine says. Before that, it had established an amazing record in evacuating wounded, in rescuing downed pilots and transporting corps and division commanders.

Ultimate use of helicopters will come in the development of new amphibious tactics, according to the magazine. Transports carrying helicopters and men could stay 25 to 30 miles off shore and helicopters would lift assault waves to shore, free from underwater obstacles and out of range of atom mines. Speed, maneuverability and navigability of the helicopters would permit faster and greater concentrations of assault forces.

Supply Service Speeded
Attacking forces would be put down inland and would smash at beach defenses from behind to clear the way for eventual landing of heavy artillery, tanks and bulldozers. Only service troops bringing in heavy equipment would need to wade ashore, according to the magazine.

Since September, helicopters have been used to supply food, water, medical supplies and ammunition to front line units in hours instead of the days required by trucks. One helicopter laid down a 20-mile stretch of telephone wire in half an hour; troops have been moved in and out of the front lines, patrols have been set down in areas which otherwise could be reached only in a day's march, and units and heavy bulky equipment have been moved over rugged terrain and unfordable rivers, the magazine reports.

Education, Not Finance, Chief Merger Issue

The educational advantages to children of the Green and Roseburg school districts, rather than financial advantages to be gained, should be the prime consideration of any merger of the two districts, stated Supt. of Schools M. C. Deller.

Deller made this statement to clarify his stand on the matter, in reference to an account in Tuesday's News-Review, in which he was quoted as saying, "I don't think you (members of the Green School board present) should talk finance, because you don't have anything to offer."

He qualified by saying that he could see no financial advantages to be gained by either district in such a merger, because of Green's unfavorable financial situation. He emphasized that, while a merger could offer no financial advantages, it might offer educational advantages.
