Egypt Abolishes Nobility Titles; Army Purge On

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Egypt's thousands of noble big shots Thursday became just plain "El Misry Efendi"—local for John Doe—after abolition of the Nile Kingdom's ancient titles of Bey and Pasha.

The Pashas and Beys—Egypt's nobility—lost their handles under a decree by the reform cabinet of Premier Aly Maher.

Maher and the dominant figure of his regime, Army Commander-in-Chief Gen. Mohamed Naguib, were themselves affected. Maher had been a Pasha, Naguib a Bey.

The royally-conferred titles carried no salaries but meant a lot in prestige and influence.

As yet, however, there was no indication how deep the government's promises of an unrelenting fight on graft and corruption would cut into the ranks of Egypt's non-untitled ruling class.

The Army announced the release of all but four of the officers arrested in last week's military coup.

The Army said the four still held—they were not identified—would be tried on charges of corruption.

The cabinet also invited foreign investment with a decree permitting foreigners to own 51 per cent of new Egyptian corporations instead of the 49 per cent maximum allowed them under a 1949 law.

A government spokesman explained that the law applied only to new companies.

Those already in existence still are bound by the 49-per-cent restriction.

Adoption of the old law had caused a sharp drop in foreign investment in Egypt.

COLLEGE TO RESTRICT DOGS

HELENA, Mont. (AP)—State Attorney General Arnold H. Olse ruled that Acting President P. C. Gaines may exercise "a more strict control of dogs" on the Montana State College campus. Gaines complained of general destruction by dogs and said they killed several sheep belonging to the college.
