

Atom-Powered Warships With Unlimited Cruising Range Now Planned By U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States, reporting progress on atomic-powered submarines and aircraft, Friday launched a new project: Development of giant atomic-powered warships.

The Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) announced it had asked the Westinghouse Electric Company to develop an atomic engine capable of propelling "large vessels such as aircraft carriers."

This immediately revived speculation that atom-powered battlewagons and giant commercial liners like the Queen Mary and the USS United States could easily make 100,000 mile cruises at top speed — and without refueling.

Such estimates are based on the fact that a pound of fissionable uranium or its titanic twin, plutonium, could generate as much power as 1,500 tons of coal or 200,000 gallons of fuel oil.

The AEC's announcement came only a few hours after release of its 12th semi-annual report to Congress in which the commission reported progress on the development of nuclear-powered aircraft and on two different types of atomic engines for submarines.

No. 1 Assured Success
The fact that AEC awarded the contract for the large vessel atomic engine project to Westinghouse indicates it believes that at least one submarine engine project is definitely assured of success.

This appears likely because Westinghouse is building an atomic submarine engine at the AEC's landlocked site in Arco, Idaho, which is scheduled to be installed in the navy's projected atomic submarine, the USS Nautilus.

Evidently the Navy, too, has no doubts that the engine will work, because the service has already laid the keel of the Nautilus.

Meanwhile, another projected atomic submarine engine is being built by General Electric at an AEC-owned site in West Milton, N.Y.

The designed power of the engines has not been disclosed, but President Truman gave an idea of it when, speaking at the keel-laying of the Nautilus, he said the sub would cruise underwater at "more than 20 knots" and that "a few pounds of uranium will give her ample fuel to travel thousands of miles at top speed."

Greater Speed Sought
Unofficial observers have speculated that atom-powered subs would be able to achieve 5 knots and possibly would bound the daylight hours of the fastest non-atom ships of any navy.

Presumably then, the AEC and the Navy have their sights set on atomic-powered surface craft with speeds far above those of present craft.

Atomic-powered ships could not sail the seas forever — like the storied "Flying Dutchman" — because uranium-fueled atomic furnaces must have their ashes dumped, somewhat like a coal furnace at home. And spent fuel would have to be replaced.

But, for all practical purposes, their cruising ranges would be unlimited.

3 Navy Vets In Schooner Off On Cruise To Tahiti
WILMINGTON, CALIF. (AP) — Three young Navy veterans sailed off recently in their 3-foot schooner, the *Waka*, bent on following in the wake of the *Kon Tiki*, a raft full of scientists which drifted from Chile to the South Seas.

The trio, Frank Thatcher, 26, Pat Swift, 26, and Miles Wyatt, 27, explained they would work their way down the coast, stopping at La Paz and Acapulco, Mexico, then at Panama and South American ports.

"We plan to be gone 18 to 24 months," said Thatcher, "depending on how long the money holds out." After they reach Valparaiso, Chile, they will turn west toward the Marquesas and Tahiti.

Korea Vets May Attend Columbia U. In Fall
NEW YORK (AP) — A special deferred payment plan for veterans of the Korean war and for other veterans entitled to educational benefits under the new G.I. Bill of Rights will be started in September at Columbia University's Teachers College, according to Dr. Milton C. Dei Manzo, college provost. They may have up to two-thirds of their tuition deferred.

Under the deferred payment plan, if the year's tuition for a veteran is \$600, he pays \$200 cash and the balance in installments starting six months after he leaves college.

Oil Shipments Through Suez Canal Decrease
SUZ (AP) — Northbound oil shipments through the Suez Canal in 1951 fell off 10 per cent.

Last year, 42,873,000 tons of oil passed through the vital waterway. In 1950 the total was 47,525,000 tons.

This drop was largely caused by the new trans-Arabian pipeline which moved 14 million tons nearly a thousand miles across the desert from Saudi Arabia to Sidon on the Mediterranean.

Sea Food Exploration Stars On Africa Coast
LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — With the big research trawler "Cape St. Mary," the West African Fisheries Research Institute is probing waters of Nigeria, Gold Coast, Sierra Leone and Gambia.

It is hoped that research will lead to increased sea food supplies for the British West African territories.

Nearly 100 Dixie Editors Back Ike For President

ATLANTA (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will have the editorial support of more newspapers than ever before backed a Republican presidential nominee in the traditionally Democratic south.

An Associated Press survey of nearly 100 papers in 11 Southern states showed Friday that 41 have endorsed the general or will do so and past performance indicates several in the "undecided" list will go to him.

Paradoxically, however, this does not mean that editors of the area are much more opposed to the 1952 Democratic candidate, Adlai Stevenson, than they were to President Truman when he ran in 1948.

Four years ago the anti-New Deal anti-Fair Deal sentiment was divided between Thomas Dewey, the GOP nominee, and Strom Thurmond, choice of the States' Rights party and these two men drew more editorial page endorsements than Truman. That year, 24 of the papers surveyed were for Dewey, 22 for Thurmond.

Only 22 Papers For Dewey
At this early stage in the campaign, only 22 papers have come out for Stevenson and Sen. John Sparkman, the Democrats' vice-presidential nominee from Alabama. In 1948, 35 of those questioned this year were lined up for Truman. Presumably, Stevenson's total will approach that.

This tally includes only papers in Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee, Kentucky, Florida, Virginia and the Carolinas which endorsed a ticket in 1948 or have done so this year.

It covered most of the leading papers in all 11 states.

Twelve of the papers endorsing Truman four years ago have taken no stand in this campaign as yet, and 13 of the editors favoring the 1948 states rights ticket are similarly silent this far in 1952.

Only four papers supporting Dewey in 1948 have taken no stand this year, while nine who were neutral in the last race now have thrown their support to Eisenhower.

2 Dixie Senators Back Ticket But Unsure Of Win
WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Russell B. Long of Louisiana Friday pledged his support for the regular Democratic presidential ticket but said Republican nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower could crack the Solid South.

"I like that (Democratic) ticket and I'm going to be for it," Long told a reporter.

At the same time, Long, who staged one of the dramatic incidents at the recent Chicago convention, conceded that Republican presidential nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower "is a formidable candidate all over the United States — and that includes the South."

Long was the second Dixie senator to announce for the Stevenson-Sparkman ticket.

Virginia Aids Nods
Sen. A. Willis Robertson of Virginia announced Thursday that he will "vote the straight Democratic ticket next November" — but was critical of the present administration.

He said he will back the ticket because he regards as a mere gesture the Democratic platform pledge to repeal the Taft-Hartley labor-management act.

Robertson also contended that the new platform civil rights stand "is less threatening to the Southern viewpoint than the 1948 plank."

The Virginia made it clear his support for Stevenson and Sparkman did not mean he endorsed the man.

Robertson termed Stevenson an honest and able man "who refused to be placed under obligation either to President Truman or the CIO."
