They eventually moved to Kerby and were living there when the Oregon Caves were discovered. Jesse Chitwood was born in 1820 and died in 1894.

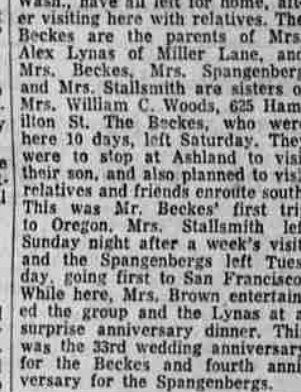
Here From Lake - H. H. Hohl, who is sojourning during the summer months with his family at their place at Lake of the Woods, is spending a few days in Roseburg on business.
