vision program whether the nomination might alienate Negroes and Northern Liberals, Monroney replied.

"Only one or two Negro leaders have disagreed with the nomination of Sparkman. Northern Liberals will appreciate that Sparkman has literally taken his life in his hands to be a Liberal."

North-South Rift Eyed

Civil rights was also the topic of a statement issued in Washington Sunday night by 16 Republican leaders, among them several key backers of Eisenhower.

The statement said the 16 interpreted the GOP civil rights Employment Practices Commission plan to mean that "FEPC (Fair Employment Practices Commission) with enforcement powers and similar laws will be accelerated by a Republican victory."

The Democrats' 1948 civil rights plank, strong for an FEPC which could enforce decisions on job discrimination against Negroes and other minorities, caused the Southern revolt then.

It was carefully worded this time by platform-drafters trying to seal the North-South rift.

The 1952 Republican civil rights plank endorses "Federal legislation to further just and equitable treatment in the area of discriminatory employment practices."

Democratic standard-bearer Stevenson and Sparkman, meanwhile, turned their attention to another issue, foreign policy.

Rift in GOP Seen

Stevenson messaged Ohio Democrats, in convention at Columbus, that "bitter division" among Republicans over foreign policy has the GOP "split down the center."

In a Richmond, Va., radio broadcast, Sparkman said the nation's prime task is cementing a free-world wall against the march of Communism.

The program is doing well, he said, and perhaps in two years may be far enough along to permit an "appreciable" out in taxes.

Privately, chiefs of state in major parties credited Stevenson with making a smart move in establishing his headquarters at Springfield.

They said this will aid his apparent effort to separate his campaign from President Truman's administration.

Republicans from Illinois were calling Monday on General Eisenhower at Denver.

The conference follows an announcement of "complete understanding" between the GOP National Committee and the National Citizens for Eisenhower Committee.

The announcement said the Citizens group will operate as a special agency on behalf of Eisenhower and the GOP vice-presidential nominee, Sen. Richard Nixon of California.

Its particular field will be any disgruntled Democrats and the independent voters.

Arthur Summerfield, Republican National committee chairman, said the agreement will avoid duplication and confusion and provide a "united effort throughout the ranks."

Mrs. Frank C. (Nannie) Dunn, 80, lifelong resident of the Melrose district, passed away at her home Saturday evening following a prolonged period of illness.

She was born Dec. 10, 1871 at French settlement, near Melrose. Mrs. Dunn was the daughter of George J. and Mary Holmes Callahan, pioneer residents of that community, who came to Douglas County from California in 1864.

She made her home there continuously, except from 1894 to 1896 when she resided in Santa Barbara, Calif.

She was married to Frank C. Dunn at Roseburg on Jan. 12, 1916. Mrs. Dunn was the last surviving member of the nine children of the George Callahan family. She was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Surviving are her widower and five nephews and nieces. They are Dr. C. L. Brown, Coos Bay; Holmes Gabbert, Portland; Mrs. Asenath Muir, Portland; Mrs. Hazel Nunn, Long Beach, Calif.; and George Callahan, Seattle.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr mortuary, Wednesday at 11:00 a.m., D.F.T., with the Rev. R. V. Kleinfield of the First Christian church officiating. Concluding services and vault interment will follow in the family plot in the Melrose cemetery.

not learned.

Out on the pavement she and other maimed and dazed passengers "stumbled around in a daze" looking at a scene of horror.

"There was a little baby," Mrs. Daniel recalled. "It was lying in the middle of the pavement, burning. Nobody could help."

Authorities were at a loss to explain the accident, which may have been the worst traffic crash in Texas history. It occurred on a straight stretch of highway.

The drivers were both killed — M. B. Herring of Waco, who had been driving about a year, at the wheel of the North-bound vehicle, Billy Malone of Waco in charge of the South-bound bus.

Police Chief Jesse Gunterman said Herring had just topped the crest of a slight hill.

It was on the same highway in early 1928 that ten members of the Baylor University basketball team of Waco were killed in a bus-train collision.

That accident occurred near Round Rock, Tex., considerably to the south of Monday's crash.

SPOT ADVICE

WATCH YOUR INNERLININGS

Innerlinings are one of the major headaches of the cleaning industry. Which means, naturally, that they're a real problem to everybody who wears clothes.

Here's the difficulty.

Innerlinings, being hidden, are one of those little things that many unscrupulous manufacturers use as an excuse for making petty economies. The innerlining is dyed, and then used without rinsing out the excess dyes. Petty economy? You said it! And yet it's done.

The "fugitive dye" innerlinings occur in both men's and women's clothing at the following places: Collar, cuff, facing, waist band, pocket stay, or shoulder pad. When the garment becomes moist, either from rain or perspiration, the innerlining bleeds off the excess dye and it travels either into the body of the fabric or the lining of the garment. Attempting to remove any such spot will result in bleeding of the innerlining, and the result will be that the garment will be damaged beyond repair. Such a stain frequently produces a permanent discoloration.

If the garment should become stained without you having noticed it right away, please call it to our attention. We employ a variety of processes which are workable and produce good results in many instances. If the stain can be removed, we'll do it.

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
