pen again. Flegel said he had a "strong objection" to promoting an assistant chief to chief simply because he's in line for the job in terms of length of service.

Tom Burke, former Roseburg city patrolman, commented, "I like Ted. Even if he fired me, I like him." He agreed, however, it wasn't a wise policy to promote an assistant chief and suggested the council set a policy whereby local men would go no higher than assistant chief — bringing in an outside man for the top position.

"It hasn't worked out in other cities," Burke said, and it hasn't worked out here."

Other Matters Get Attention

Other action coming before the council last night included the following:

Plans and specifications were approved for a storm sewer on Terrace Ave. between Lane and Overlook Streets. Engineer John Loosley estimated the job at \$1,896.

Action was delayed on paving of North Jackson Street on the east side pending agreements with property owners. The project was estimated at \$6,941. Librarian Muriel Mitchell requested a raise in pay for library workers and the council took the matter under advisement.

Bids for three pickup trucks and two police cars were referred to the city manager and finance committee with authority granted to accept one or more of the bids. The three pickups will be used by city building department, street department, dog control officer and by operators of the sewage plant. The police cars will replace the two now in operation.

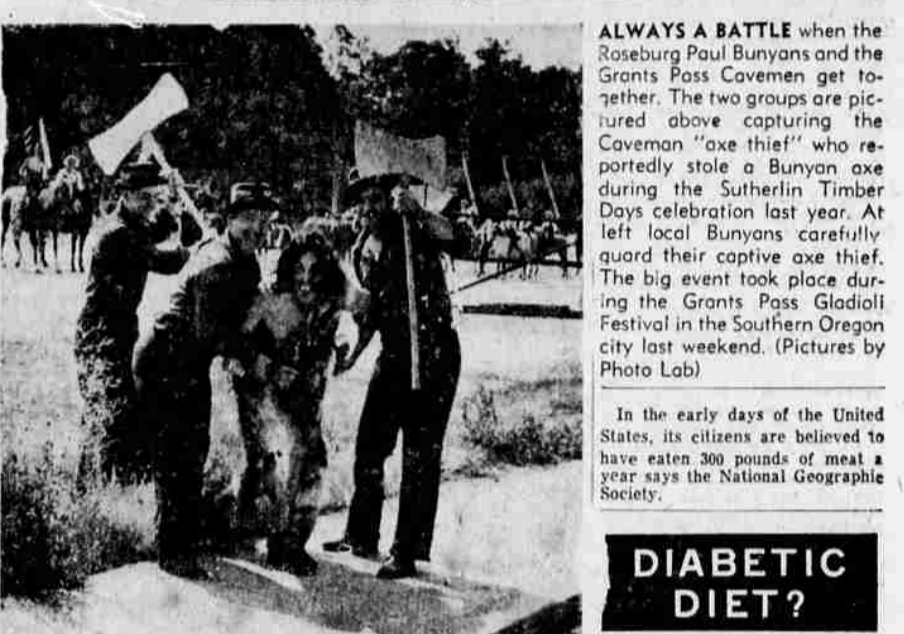

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary Wednesday, Aug. 6, at 11 a.m., DST, with the Rev. Raymond Schaefer of the First Baptist Church officiating. His body will be sent to Topeka, Kansas for concluding services and interment.

WASHINGTON — "What this country needs," said Vice President Thomas Riley Marshall, "is a good five-cent cigar." He said the Office of Price Stabilization suspended price ceilings Monday on all cigars but not cigarettes, effective at once. Reasons: Increased costs of labor and leaf tobacco, and below-level industry earnings.

figure prominently in campaign calculations.

Eisenhower has said handling of its groups are most interested in—should be left mainly to the states. Most Negro leaders are against this principle.

Leaders Pledge Support

But Monday, after a meeting with Eisenhower, a group of the one Negroes and other minority explosive civil rights issue—publican Negro leaders who said they represent organizations with three million members, came out flatly for him. This immediately aroused speculation over whether he plans to change his civil rights stand.

Stevenson didn't seem to be worried. He said:

"I can hardly see why the Negro vote can find any happy refuge in the Republican party."

Eisenhower's Los Angeles speech will be before the annual encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (about 6 p.m. PST). He said it will be non-political and will deal with his ideas about good government and the role veterans can play in achieving it.

The Illinois governor hailed the Russell-Kefauver meetings as further evidence he faces little worry about losing the South and its big bloc of electoral votes. The Augusta (Ga.) Chronicle is breaking tradition: It said editorially Tuesday it is backing Eisenhower, the Republican candidate.
