Carol Jo Kabler Captures Courter-Pearson Tourney

Tomboyish Carol Jo Kabler is rapidly becoming the brightest star on the Roseburg golfing horizon.

Tuesday she added the Courter-Pearson women's golf title to her recent list of divot successes. The cool 14-year-old Miss pranced to a 2-1 victory over her more experienced finalist partner, Mrs. Ralston Bridges, for championship flight honors.

Just last week, the nonchalant youngster stroked to low net Class A honors at Bend in the annual Willamette Valley-Southern Oregon Women's Golf Association Tourney. Gaining tremendous wood and iron distance for a 90-pounder, the youngster got most of the plaudits from both the gallery and golfers for her snappy 79 net.

In the other final match of the Courter - Pearson, Mrs. Walter Brydges scored an identical 2-1 victory over Mrs. Joe Perrault in the first - flight climax. Mrs. Perrault was defending Courter - Pearson champion.

Tuesday also marked the opening rounds of the Class C women's tournament which starts next week. Mrs. Gerald Kabler, mother of blonde Carol Jo, and Mrs. Bob Harris qualified, leaving the field open for six more. These six may qualify Thursday and Friday.

In the regular day's play, Carol Jo continued her winning ways by scoring first low net in the Classes A and B sweepstakes. Mrs. Dick Coppage was second low net.

14 Squads Out For Trap Event

The biggest horde of shotgun slingers this summer turned out Tuesday for the weekly practice shoot at the sunny Roseburg Rod and Gun Club Winchester Traps.

A total of 14 squads went on the firing line in the three standard events, 16-yard, handicap and doubles.

No shooter marked up a perfect in spite of the ideal weather. However, six men missed only one in the 16-yard shoot. They were: Walt Edmonds, Ken Gilkeson, Jack Culver, Dean Bubar, Charles Klingler and Bill Jones.

Fading Chiefs To Play SWO Cellar Team

The hard-luck Beavers are occasionally used in the Pacific Coast League when the Portland club starts to slip. The Southwestern Oregon League has a Beaver variety which also deserves the tag.

This weekend, the Roseburg Chiefs return to Finlay Field for SWO action against the hapless Brookings Beavers, a team which has won only one game in 18 starts this year.

The Beavers invaded the Roseburg home park Saturday night and Sunday for the first time in 1952. In the previous meeting of the two teams, the Chiefs easily won the first game, 13-5, but was extended to the limit in the second to win 1-0.

This is one of a host of one-run losses the Beavers have taken in league play. For example, last weekend, the coast crew lost two such games to Medford, 8-7, and 6-5.

Although the won-lost record looks bad, the Beavers have become increasingly powerful. Two weeks ago against Coos Bay-North Bend, the Beavers lost the first game, 6-5. What makes them even more dangerous is the fact they have nothing to lose. Not even a miracle could rescue them from the cellar. Meanwhile, they can snuff out Roseburg's mathematical chance of getting into the four-team Shaughnessy Playoffs.

Both teams are out to break a losing streak. Roseburg has dropped 10 straight, dating back to July 16. Only four were League contests, however. Brookings has lost eight straight, all League games, dating back to June 29 when the Beavers won its only tilt from Coquille, 4-1.

The Beavers have a crack hurler in Jim Nierman and the SWO League leading batter, Frank Burdell.

Yoncalla In Tie For Last Place

Yoncalla's entry in the newly-created Junior State League displayed its baseball wares at a picnic climaxing the year's schedule.

The team met a squad of parents in the Sunday afternoon shindig, but neither team reported a victory. The picnic and swimming party was staged near Elkton on the Umpqua River.

The Yoncalla Junior Staters closed out the season Saturday with a 25-16 win over Junction City. This put Yoncalla in a tie with Drain for last place in the talent-laden loop. Both teams have a record of two wins and eight losses.

Leading the League is Eugene with a perfect 10-0 record. Cottage Grove, Creswell, Thurston and Junction City follow in that order.

Fish Migration Good In Umpqua

The current migration of fish in the Umpqua River system remains extremely favorable, reports William E. Pitney, game department field agent in charge of the river study.

Movement of spring chinook salmon is nearing its close, with a total of 4,488 fish counted over the Winchester dam since the start of the season and through July 31. Counters checked 79 adult chinooks and one jack salmon through the station during the last two weeks of July.

This year's chinook run is the progeny of the 1947 migration which totalled 2,833 as of July 31 that year, and 2,994 for the entire season. It is believed that this

year's run is more than 90 per cent complete. It now sets a new high record since the count started in 1946. Total migration of chinook jack salmon through July 31 numbered 554 fish.

Steelhead count for the last two weeks of July was second only to 1947. Total count as of July 31, however, still remained the highest on record as of that date, 3,501 fish, as compared with 2,784 on the same date in 1947, the former high mark.

Movement of salmon trout remained slow with a total of 148 counted on July 31, slightly behind last year, but ahead of the three preceding years.

"I would be happy to wrestle him right here in Roseburg, if Matchmaker Elton Owen could make the match," Stojack said. A win over the Prince would help his cause considerably.

In the 30-minute semi-final, Billy Sandow continues to push his

star higher on the wrestling horizon when he meets Warren Wimber, tag partner with the Prince last week.

A newcomer to the Roseburg ring makes his bow in the 20-minute special event at 8:45. He is Ted Ballantyne of Caldwell, Idaho. He has been pitted with veteran Bullet Bob Cummings.
