

## Indian Legend, Mythology, Romance, Massacre United In Second Pageant Episode

From a dark protoplasmic mass descended a woman and a child, and that's how mankind had its creative beginning. At least that's how Indian mythology records the creation of man. That will start the second episode of the forthcoming Umpqua Cavalcade scheduled for Labor Day weekend.

Georgene Shanklin, a graduate of the University of Oregon music school, will direct the episode.

Backgrounded by music and aided in places by singing and dancing, the episode continues through the origin of man with the woman placing the child on the back of a wolf—portrayed in the Indian legend "Kommeman," as the animal friend of man.

As he grows up, the youngster is beset by Indian furies—attacked by "evil" lightning, thunder and earthquakes and defended by the "good" forces of water and the sun.

It takes fire, however—a gift of the gods—to deliver man from evil. This brings about the Indian "Dance of Liberation."

Romance And Massacre. Comes now Sir Francis Drake—commissioned by Queen Elizabeth I in the first episode—on the horizon, his ship approaching the mouth of the Umpqua River.

Sir Francis, the first white man to set foot in Douglas County, according to history, casts ashore a Spanish navigator and leaves him stranded in the "New World."

About that time an annual Indian festival chooses a beautiful maid from among the lovely princess candidates of each tribe.

Reigning over the Indian celebration, the queen happens to meet the navigator—and chooses him as her companion during the fete.

The Indians pursue their games and contests, and when it's all over and the members of various tribes prepare to go home, the beautiful Indian queen is faced with a difficult—but romantic—problem.

She must decide whether to stay with her people or with the navigator. She sings "The Indian Maid's Lament," a number written by Composer Gail Kubik especially for the pageant.

But before the Indians disband, word comes of the presence of the Jeddiah Smith party near what is now Reedsport. Reports filter through of the party molesting Indians to the south.

Young Indian horsemen swoop down on the party and in a bloody massacre do away with the Smith party—with only Smith and another man surviving.

This also ends episode 2.

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## Byrnes Advises Demo Ticket Vote By S. Carolinians

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Gov. James F. Byrnes advised South Carolinians to support the national Democratic Stevenson-Sparkman presidential ticket.

Byrnes, often at odds with the Truman administration, thus joined the state's two Senators and other party leaders in support of the national ticket.

His recommendation came at the party's state convention which was reconvened after being in recess since April while waiting to learn the national party's stand on civil rights.

It was at Byrnes' suggestion that the state party, which bolted the national party for the States Rights Democratic ticket in 1948, adopted this wait-and-see attitude.

With Byrnes' support, there seemed to be little doubt that the convention would go down the line for Stevenson and Sparkman.

The South Carolina action may also influence other Southern states.

In a 30-minute report on the national convention which he attended as chairman of the South Carolina delegation, Byrnes noted that the state party was free to support the Republican Eisenhower-Nixon ticket.

"But," he declared, "I think this convention should instruct the state executive committee to place on the ballot . . . electors pledged to Stevenson and Sparkman."

"If today were election day, I would vote for Stevenson and Sparkman," the former secretary of state said, "not because they are labeled Democrats, but because of their personal qualifications and their records in public office."

But Byrnes said he wanted to hear views of both Stevenson and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican candidate, before finally making up his mind about his own vote.

He noted that while this state voted a States Rights Democratic ticket in 1948 in its quarrel with the national party, it still was voting for Democrats.

For the state Democratic party to support the Republican candidates "would not be right," he declared.

Rev. Robb Gets Spokane Pulpit

The Rev. Clark Robb of the North Roseburg Church has been appointed to a Evangelical United Brethren Pulpit in Spokane, Wash., according to word received from the Church's Jennings Lodge conference.

The local pulpit will be filled by the Rev. Kenneth Dooley of Eugene. He is married and has two small children.

Aug. 17 will be the Rev. Mr. Robb's last day in his Roseburg pulpit. He'll speak at morning and evening services on that day, as well as the evening drive-in services this coming Sunday.

The Rev. Mr. Robb and family are still at the Jennings Lodge camp, where they and 20 youths from the Church are attending a youth conference.

X-RAY REPORT MADE

PORTLAND (AP) — The mass X-ray program here brought chest X-rays to more than 237,000 persons at a cost of \$70,466.

That was revealed Wednesday in a release of the financial report which showed that the federal government contributed \$37,829. The local organization, Portland-Multnomah County X-Ray Inc., wound up with \$3,271 in the bank.

## Pope Says Church Friend Of Labor

CASTEL GANDOLFO (AP) — Pope Pius XII said Wednesday the aim of the Roman Catholic church in the labor problem is to overcome and compose social differences.

For the church, he emphasized, the labor question is not "a class struggle."

The pontiff spoke during an audience granted to Italian priests serving as ships' chaplains and missionaries among Italian emigrants in Europe.

Emphasizing several questions as a major problem of priests in their work, the Pope charged them to tell "your faithful that the church has always had and always will have maternal concern for the workers."

In the countries where the missionaries are stationed, the Pontiff continued, the labor question long ago passed "its first stage."

"What 60 or 70 years ago was the goal of the worker has now become his natural right and safe possession and not without the faithful cooperation of the church."
