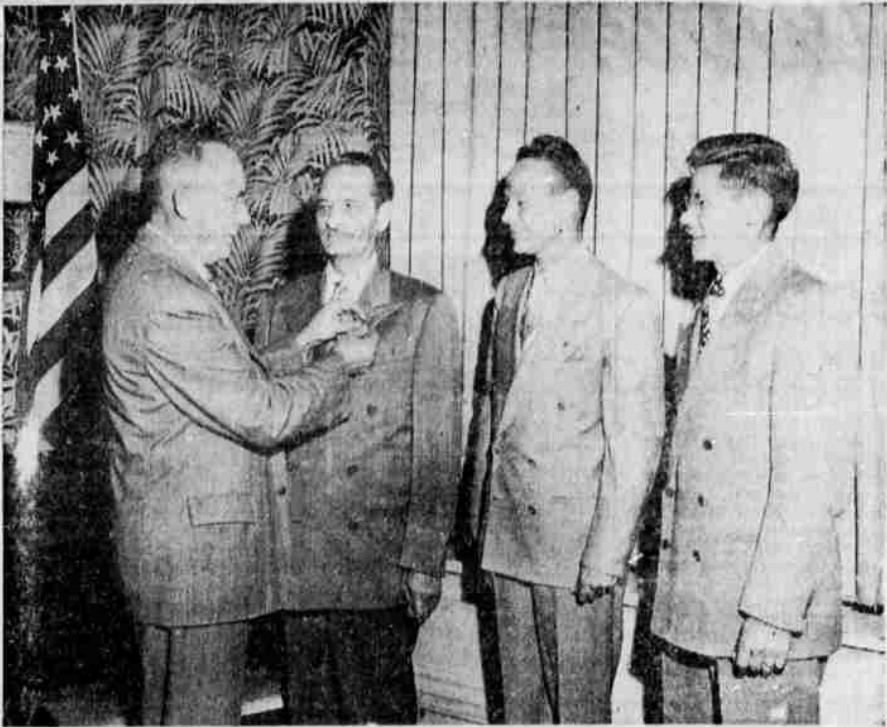


District Toastmaster Meeting Held In Roseburg; Bob Harvie Honored

Bob Harvie of Roseburg holds the distinction of being the first Southern Oregonian to gain high office in Toastmasters.

At the sub-district meeting of District 7, including Areas 3, 6 and 8 of Toastmasters International, held at the Hotel Umpqua here last Thursday, Harvie was presented with the lieutenant governor's pin.

The presentation was made by District Governor John W. Buck, Corvallis, who presided over the meeting.

Buck also presented Dave White, Grants Pass, with an Area 3 governor's pin and Vincent Derig, president of Roseburg Toastmasters, with an Area 6 governor's pin. Daniel J. Dunn, Reedsport, was presented in proxy with a District 8 governor's pin.

Other state officers present for the occasion were W. M. Harper, Corvallis, District 7 secretary-treasurer, and Evans T. Hamilton, Portland, past district governor. Harvie, a charter member of the Roseburg Toastmasters, has held various offices in the local club, including president and deputy governor.

Born and reared in Clark, S. Dak., he later moved to Aberdeen, S. Dak., where he was employed by the American Insurance Co.

In January, 1938, the Harvies moved to Roseburg, where Mr. Harvie has been employed by various local establishments, including the Veterans Administration. For the past five years he has been employed by the Oregon State Employment Service and is presently the employment deputy.

Married, he has two daughters, the younger, Betty Ann, who lives with her parents at Terrace Apartments, and the older, Mrs. Shoenhard, Long Beach, Wash. The latter has a daughter, Kathy.

Harvie is also active locally with Red Cross. In the latter he has been a first aid instructor for a number of years. He was also influential in organizing the Roseburg Toastmasters Club.

Egypt Impounds Farouk's Riches As Purge Starts

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — A government decree impounding all of ex-King Farouk's vast holdings in Tuesday night, Justice Minister Egypt is expected to be issued Mohamed Aly Roushdy announced.

The announcement came as Premier Aly Maher opened an anti-corruption drive to probe bribery, graft and unlawful profits by government officials.

At the same time, the powerful Wafd party — which governed Egypt during most of the time the official stealing is supposed to have taken place — launched a purge of its own ranks.

It kicked out nine members, three of them former cabinet ministers, and set up a party commission to examine "any complaint brought against the propriety of any Wafd member."

Maher, chosen "purge" premier by the Army following its coup which led to the abdication of King Farouk, in two separate decrees Monday:

1. Set up a commission of career judges to "investigate and punish administrative offenses by government employees."

2. Ordered "all responsible officials or officials filling representative posts" to submit a full statement of their income to a second commission before the end of the year. If an official's income increases after he takes office, he must explain why.

Official sources said government bans against 173 foreign publications, including Life magazine and the Saturday Evening Post, have been lifted.

These publications were barred from Egypt for publishing stories unfavorable to King Farouk.

Heat In July Exceeds Month's Usual Figures

July was a hotter month than usual.

The average monthly temperature of 70.8 degrees was 3.4 degrees above normal, according to the weather bureau's July summary prepared by Aels M. Landner Jr.

July 8 was the hottest day of the month, with a high of 100 degrees. The lowest temperature was 47 degrees, on the morning of the 2nd.

Local residents sweltered in 90 or above temperatures for 13 days during the 31-day month. Highs were 80 or above for 26 days. The highest minimum temperature was 63, on the 14th.

The total rainfall for the month, 0.1 of an inch, came on the 31st. It was 31 below normal. July 1951 was a dry month, too, with only a trace of precipitation recorded. In July, 1933, and earlier, none was recorded during the entire month.

No thunderstorms were observed in the immediate area during the month. However, on several days thunderheads were noted over the mountains east of the city.

Truman 'Confident' Of Democratic Win

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman returned by plane at 2:06 p. m. EST Tuesday from Missouri and expressed confidence the national Democratic ticket would win in November.

Asked about his political plans, and particularly when he would go out on the campaign trail by special train, the President told newsmen he would have to await orders on that.

He repeated that he is just a private in the ranks now and added: "I obey orders when in the ranks. I do what they tell me. I am not like some of these prima donnas. I'm a good Democrat."

FACTS ABOUT FLYING

Harrison Winston Gives Pertinent Information, Advice In Kiwanis Talk

When descending in an airplane, hold your nose and blow out every few minutes to relieve the air pressure. Don't eat too heavily before going aloft to avoid air sickness. Don't worry about your safety in the air, as statistics show percentage air accidents well down the list.

This advice was extended by Harrison Winston, local attorney and flying enthusiast, speaking on the "Practical Side of Aviation" at Tuesday's Kiwanis Club meeting in the Hotel Umpqua. The program, arranged by Archie White, was in keeping with Aviation Day.

Winston, a bomber pilot in the Pacific during World War II and who still does considerable flying, said that the simple act of holding one's nose and blowing out is not usually explained by airline hostesses. He said a few people are not troubled and a few can successfully "pop" their ears by chewing gum while descending in a plane. But about 50 per cent experience extreme discomfort, especially when they have been flying at altitudes up to 10,000 feet.

Air sickness also causes a great deal of discomfort for air passengers, he said. Even he, with more than 3,000 hours of piloting and as a passenger on commercial lines, sometimes gets a bit sick or "woosy," he explained.

Eating lightly and controlling fears, worry or anxiety will do as much as anything to eliminate or lighten sickness, he said.

Air Travel Tops in Safety
As for safety, statistics put air travel far in the percentage of accidents for miles flown. Next come boats, followed in order by trains, busses and automobiles.

With highways choked as they are today, it is no wonder that flying is safer, he said. We should not think so much in terms of how quickly we "can get there," but think in terms of "flying as a means of going places. Plan your trips. Make it the simplest, easiest way," he advised.

Referring to West Coast Airlines, the only commercial line serving Roseburg, he said the company has never had a fatal accident, and, considering conditions under which the service operates, it is reasonable to feel it won't have any.

Roseburg has a safe airport, and reports that the hills are a menace is absolutely untrue, he said. Referring to night service soon to be established, he said it is actually safer to fly at night, as navigation is easier and there is less chance for air collisions at night.

Aged Can Also Learn
In private flying, there is no reason why a man of 70 years can't learn to fly safely, he stated. The conception that flying is for young men is slowly changing.

He discussed the difference in commercial and private flying. For instance, it is not possible for most small aircraft to land on larger municipal fields, because they are too slow and interrupt the general traffic pattern.

To fly, a person must know how to use a compass and to know how to get to where he is going. Flying in adverse weather is definitely discouraged.

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Fair Timber Sale Benefits Indian

HOOD RIVER, Ore. (AP) — Jim Slim Jim, an illiterate Indian, is to receive \$18,363 for a tract of timber which he sold last year for only \$1,000.

Last year Jim sold the 80-acre tract three miles east of here to Fred M. Marsh of Lebanon, Ore. for \$1,000. But the Indians' friends filed suit to cancel the sale.

Before the case came to trial Marsh offered to settle out of court. He agreed to return title to the tract to Jim and take back his \$1,000. The offer was accepted.

Jim, 57, is to receive the money in monthly allotments of \$75 to \$100, his guardian, Mrs. Arline Moore, said. At this rate it will last him about 15 years.

Senator Morse Pledges Full Support To Ike

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.), who has been critical of the platform adopted at last month's Republican convention, said in a statement Monday that he will give his full support to the party's presidential nominee, Dwight D. Eisenhower.

But he added that "I shall never hesitate to exercise my honest independence of judgement on any issue with which I disagree with Eisenhower or any other political leader, because I owe such frankness to the independent voters if I am to continue to represent their interests in the Senate."

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
