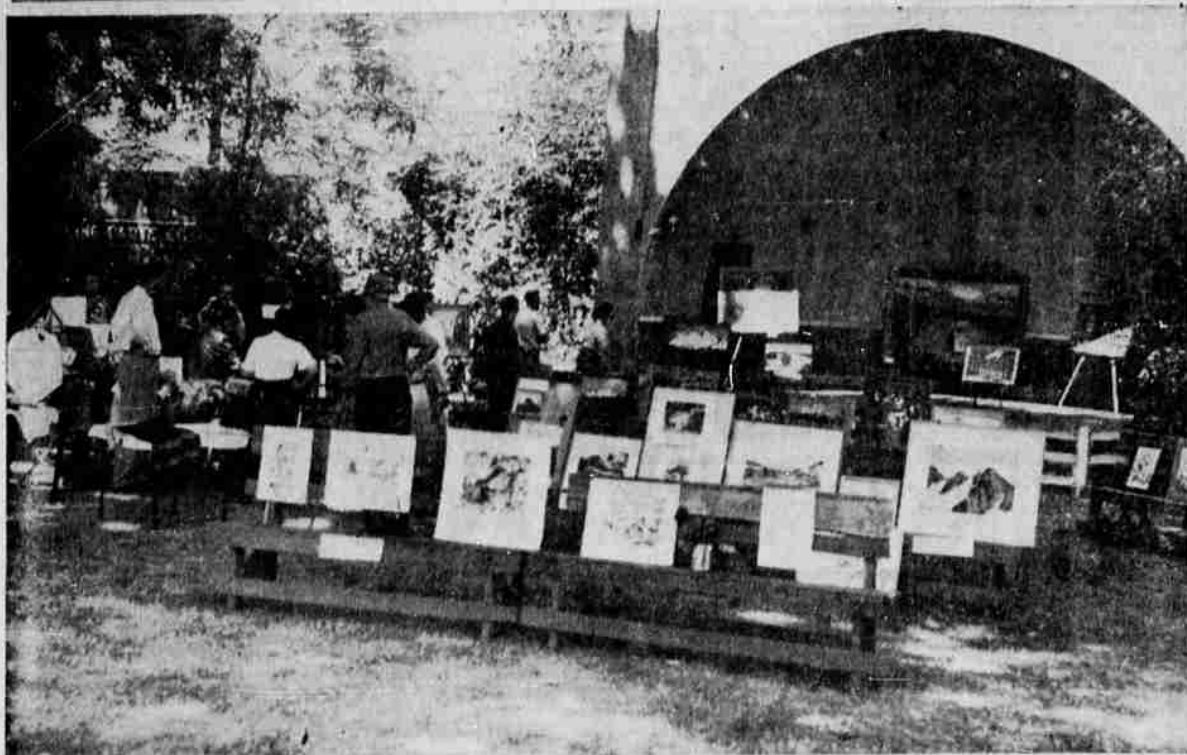

Disaster To Bus Caused By Snakes

BOMBAY, India — Newspapers told Wednesday how 24 persons were killed in a bus accident caused by snakes on the loose.

The bus, loaded with Hindu worshippers, was going through the jungle in Hyderabad state last week to the Hindu festival of Nagpanchami, a festival in which snakes play a part.

Among the travellers were several snake charmers whose baskets of king cobras were tied to the roof of the bus.

As the bus jolted along, the basket lids came loose and the snakes escaped.

Some of the reptiles appeared on the windshield and others crawled in with the driver.

The snakes had had their poison apparatus removed, but the driver panicked and lost control.

The bus went off the road and fell into a chasm.

The driver lived to tell how the crash occurred.

Pacific Security Talked By Foreign Ministers

HONOLULU — Foreign ministers of Australia, New Zealand and the U.S. headed into talks Wednesday on formation of a military staff for the Anzus Mutual Defense Pact.

One other item remains on the agenda of the ministers' closed session—relations of the Anzus nations with other nations and regional associations in the Pacific.

Mossadegh Gets Unlimited Power To Govern Iran

TEHRAN, Iran — The Iranian Senate Monday gave initial approval to a bill granting Premier Mohammed Mossadegh unlimited powers to rule this near-bankrupt country with a free hand for six months.

But the upper house offered unexpected opposition to a government bill ordering confiscation of the personal wealth and property of Ahmed Qavam, who was forced out of the premiership two weeks ago by wildly demonstrating Mossadegh followers.

The lawmakers passed the confiscation bill without trouble on its

first of three readings.

On the second reading, however, only three of 25 senators present stood up to signify approval.

The bill then was sent to a Senate commission for possible revision. It probably will be brought up when the Senate meets again.

The legislation calls for Qavam's fortune—estimated by some lawmakers at 500 million rials (about 16 million dollars)—to be divided among the survivors of persons killed in the street fighting which resulted in his overthrow. More than 20 police and soldiers re-

portedly died in the clashes.

Five million rials (about \$160,000) would be set aside for Qavam's wife and 10-year-old son.

Qavam's whereabouts have been unknown since Mossadegh swept to power July 21.

Iran has been headed for bankruptcy since her giant British-run oil industry was nationalized last year and production fizzled out.

U. S. Civilian Workers Increased Last Year

WASHINGTON — Uncle Sam wound up the fiscal year on June 30 with 112,999 more civilian workers on the payroll than when the year started.

The Senate-House Committee on Reduction of Non-essential Federal Expenditures reported the increase without comment. The civilian labor force, it said, numbered 2,596,690 at the year's end.

The great bulk of the increase, the report said, was in the civilian payrolls of the military establishment. The armed forces' civilian labor list, it said, rose 101,571 in the year to a total of 1,337,172.
