Winchester Bay Sports Revenue Justifies Plans By DAWN PESEAU Review discussions of the Salmon Harbor, Winchester Bay development construction and operations, a major business of the Port of Umpqua commission concluded at Reedsport Tuesday, meeting at the Douglas County-Port of Umpqua sponsored recreational and commercial fishery project of the sponsors. Revenue was reported to be averaging more than \$150 per day, in spite of limited and incomplete facilities and weather conditions which stalled fishing operations for several days this season. The work of Harbor staff, resident Salmon Harbor manager employed by the County and the Port, was commended by observers. The significance of the harbor management in co-operation with the U. S. Coast Guard in the prevention of water accidents was also brought out. The Coast Guard, under the command of Harold F. Morrison, chief boatswain, and the management of Salmon Harbor, it was pointed out, have co-operated in a campaign of water safety education, enforcement of regulation, operation on the part of the patronage public was cited by Port Commission discussion. The Port Commission authorized a letter of commendation for the work of the Coast Guard under Morrison's command be sent to the 13th Coast Guard District at Seattle. It was brought out that recent accident incidents at the Umpqua river bar had seriously elements of potential tragedy if not been for the training and alertness of the Coast Guard organization. Charles Pfeiffer, representing the Gardiner Rod and Gun Club, a branch of the Southwest Oregon Sportsmen's Association, presented the problem of the county dock at Gardiner. The Port Commission moved to remind the Longbell Lumber Co., Gardiner Mill, of an obligation assumed to maintain the channel at the dock in return for log race facility privileges in the area. Use of the dock has been handicapped by lack of channel maintenance. The Longbell Lumber Co. is to dredge a channel, 350 by 150 feet, as access to the dock. The Port of Umpqua moved to participate in the Northwest Rivers and Harbors Congress, an organization of port municipalities for the promotion of water-borne commerce and harbor development. Charles Collins, Douglas County parks supervisor, and John W. Purvis, Port of Umpqua attorney, were tentatively discussed as representatives of the Winchester Bay, Salmon Harbor project and the Port to attend a convention of the congress, slated for Raymond, Wash., Sept. 15, 19 and 20. Jurisdiction of northwest tidelands, it was pointed out, will be discussed at the forthcoming conference. A decision to establish a trustee account for the disbursement of joint County and Port of Umpqua funds of the Winchester Bay development was among the routine returns of the Port group.
