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## Satchmo Pitches 1-0 Brown Win

Old Satchmo still has it. Even if he is 43 and going on 49, as some folks say, Satchel Paige of the St. Louis Browns still has the stuff to bewilder big league hitters. Let there be no doubt about it.

Satchmo chose to desert the bullpen Wednesday night for a starting role — the second time he'd tried it this year. Even youngsters wilt in the late innings but not Paige. Locked in a 0-0 duel with Detroit's Virgil Trucks, he pitched nine shut-out innings.

Bob Nieman's bases — loaded with two outs in the 12th finally got him home with a 1-0 win, his eighth of the year. The box score showed only seven hits for the Tigers — six of them singles. Satchel walked only two and struck out nine in his brilliant effort.

Walt Masterson pitched the Washington Senators to a 6-4 victory over New York, striking out 11 Yankees.

CHICAGO (AP) — A rematch booked for Philadelphia was brewing Thursday after Chicago's Bob Satterfield, a 7-2 underdog, defeated Harold Johnson in a battle of power — punching light heavyweights.

Johnson, 23, a Philadelphia contender and No. 3 light-heavy contender, said after Wednesday night's televised scrap at Chicago Stadium that he would welcome another chance at the unpredictable Satterfield.

Satterfield, a mustachioed Negro from Chicago's southside who has a knockout blow and something of a glass chin, needed the win to get back into good standing in the 175 pound division after losing his last three starts.

It was a 10 round split decision with referee Tommy Gilmore voting 51-49 for Satterfield. Judge Edward Hintz 54-46 for the same fighter and Judge John Bray voting 52-48 for Johnson.

## World's Fastest Speedboats In Gold Cup Qualifying Runs

SEATTLE (AP) — Some of the world's fastest speedboats were set Thursday to qualify for the 43th running of the Gold Cup races — if they can beat a run of bad luck that has jinxed the visiting craft.

Only two boats thus far are officially qualified. They are Stanley Sayres' record-cracking speed queens — Slo-Mo IV and Slo-Mo V — which ran the nine-mile qualifying course Monday in better than the required 75 miles an hour average.

Still hoping to qualify in the two days remaining are three from Detroit — the Such Crust IV, Miss Pepsi and Miss Great Lakes II — and the Hurricane IV of Los Angeles.

The Hurricane IV limped from the course Wednesday after winding up an average speed of 101.633 miles an hour around one 3 mile lap. Morlan Visel, driver of the speedy boat, said it had burned out a bearing and he would have to replace the drive shaft. He hoped, however, to have it back in shape Thursday after an all night repair job.

## Beavers Drop To 5th Place As Oaks Win

The Oakland Oaks handed Portland an 8-3 trimming Wednesday night and the Beavers bowed out of the Pacific Coast League's first division.

The defeat, coupled with Los Angeles' 1-9 shutout of Hollywood, dropped the Beavers into fifth place half a game behind the Angels and half a game ahead of Seattle's Rainiers.

The first-place Oaks, rebounding from the loss to Portland Tuesday night, took an early lead and held it for the distance. Al Gettel went the route, fanning seven and walking three. Portland used Lyman Linde, Cal McIrvine and Marino Pieretti, and they gave up 13 hits.

Seattle, now only 9 1/2 games back of the Oaks, made it two-in-a-row over Sacramento, 9-0 on six-hit pitching by Al Widmar.

The Rainiers nipped four San Francisco pitchers for 13 hits. Rog Osenbaugh, fresh off the Stanford campus, lasted until the fourth but he gave up six runs in the third.

San Diego's steady-going Padres forged into a tie with Hollywood for the second spot by shutting out San Francisco, 4 to 0.

### Michigan Demos Again Nominate Williams, Moody

DETROIT (AP) — Two scions of Detroit's Gold Coast—G. Mennen Williams and Fred M. Alger, Jr.—will fight it out for the governorship of Michigan this fall as the result of Tuesday's primary.

Williams, the incumbent Democratic governor, won a whopping courtesy vote in his party primary although unopposed.

Alger, making his second try for the Republican nomination, was successful this time.

And it will be U. S. Sen. Blair Moody, the Democratic incumbent, against Rep. Charles E. Potter, 11th District Congressman since 1947 and legless World War II veteran.

Moody, standing on his own feet politically for the first time since Williams picked him from the

Washington press gallery for the Senate, rolled easily over his sole Democratic opponent Louis C. Schwinger of Saginaw.

Potter, a member of the House Un-American Activities Committee, smashed down the bids of three other rivals, apparently carrying all but three of the state's 83 counties.

### Wild Animals May Roam Geneva Streets

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP)—There is no law in Geneva against permitting wild animals to roam the streets.

The city fathers discovered this loophole recently when they tried to prosecute a woman psychiatrist whose 10-month-old cheetah caused a panic in the principal market place recently.
