

Flying Saucer Solution Sought Via Vacuum Bell

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Evening Star reported Wednesday that Army Engineers, working with a vacuum bell in a laboratory, have produced atmospheric phenomena which may explain the widespread reports of "flying saucers."

In a copyrighted story by W. H. Shippen, the Star said the experiments created airborne objects which "can speed up, hover indefinitely, or disappear and reappear in a flash."

"The man-made saucers" occasionally fly in formation. Moreover, they are believed to have substance enough to show up on the screen of a radar designed to track them.

What the experimenters did, the Star said, was use the vacuum bell as a tiny working-model of the stratosphere and reproduce "two forces — very low air pressure which is balanced against static

May Solve Mystery

"Experimenters in the research and development laboratory at Fort Belvoir (VA.) believe these two are the primary factors responsible for saucer sightings by competent observers," the story added.

The Star published its report on the experiments following a night of rain during which radar screens, scanning the skies over the capital, showed a flurry of mystery objects.

In line with the theory that they are atmospheric phenomena, an Air Force spokesman noted that the radar sightings — tiny blips on a fluorescent screen — started about the time a thunderstorm hit the area.

Imported Rose Bushes Blamed For Buyers' Kick

SALEM (AP) — A Portland nurseryman, at a state agriculture hearing called to determine if he should be granted an extension of his operator's license, said Tuesday he had received 40,000 complaints from persons to whom he had sold rose bushes imported from Holland in 1951.

The hearing was called by Frank McKennon, chief of the division of plant industry of the Oregon State Department of Agriculture. He explained that his department had received many complaints about the nurseryman, Jack Hurd, who does business as Riverside Gardens, Oswego, and as Luke Hopman, Garden Home.

McKennon said the complaints involved substitution of stock on nursery orders, inferior stock, slow mailing of stock or failure to fill orders and failure to respond to complaints.

OSC Students Advised To Make Housing Plans

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — College is still a calendar page away but Oregon State college students were advised this week to be thinking about housing arrangements.

On the campus, adequate dormitory space is assured for all single men and women wishing to live in the residence halls, according to Robert C. Koehler, director of dormitories. Campus housing for married couples is all taken, but prospects for off-campus housing in private homes and apartment houses are "excellent."

Some single rooms are still available for both men and women in the dorms. Board fees remain exactly the same as last year—\$47 per month in all halls—and room rentals are the same with one exception. In Central hall for men, the room rent has been increased from \$45 to \$50 per term. Rent per term in the main dorm for MEN AND Waldo hall for women is \$53; in Sackett hall for women, \$68 per term.

Help with campus housing arrangements is available to students from the director of dormitories, administration building. Off-campus listings are available from the housing — employment office, commerce building.

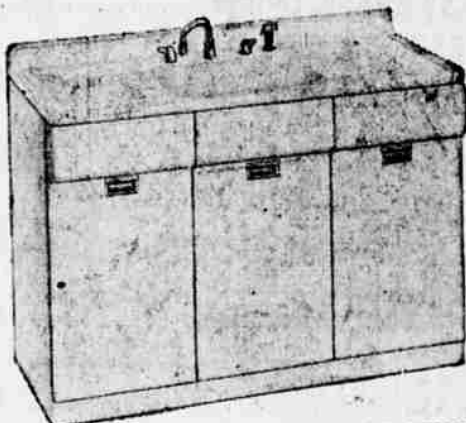
