The Canyonville public schools will open this year on Tuesday, Sept. 2, according to Omer J. Moser, superintendent. All first and ninth grade students will be given their state required physical examinations free if they will appear at the first grade room on Wednesday, Aug. 27, starting at 9 a. m. (standard time). All first graders must be accompanied by their parent or guardian and bring their birth certificates.

Registration for high school students only (grades 9 to 12) will take place Wednesday morning, Aug. 27, starting at 9. All high school students are urged by Supt. Moser to register, in order to as-

sure themselves a choice of schedule. Senator Who Hit Tax Dodging Gang Receives Threats

WASHINGTON (AP) — A well-placed source said Wednesday Sen. Williams (R-Del) has been threatened with harm as a result of his charges of tax evasion by racketeers.

"Don't be asking me about it," Williams told a reporter when asked about the threats. "Nobody will ever get confirmation of such a statement from me."

The informant, who declined to be named, said in an interview he knows the threats were made, but that Williams has refused to treat them seriously.

The informant said the threats clearly stemmed from a series of speeches Williams made in the Senate alleging that big time gangsters and gamblers have profited from compromise settlements of their federal taxes.

In the speeches Williams named the men involved, and brusquely questioned whether the average citizen could expect as lenient treatment.

Scandals Exposed
Williams' lone-hand investigations were a major factor in uncovering tax scandals which caused shakeups in the Revenue Bureau and Justice Department earlier this year.

Although mum about the reported threats, Williams told a reporter he has more disclosures in the mill about racketeers' taxes.

He said he hopes to publish a report in the cases of three of them in a supplemental issue of the Congressional Record due for publication about Aug. 19. He declined to name them in advance.

He previously had told the Senate about seven other cases, which he said he had selected "at random" just to find out how racketeers' tax cases were handled.
