Angina pectoris is a condition characterized by paroxysmal chest pain. An attack may be brought on by exertion, emotion, or change in temperature.

Angina pectoris is not a disease in itself. It appears to be a spasm of the artery to the heart-muscle which causes inadequate blood flow into the muscle itself. The predisposing factors are: hardening of the arteries, syphilis, and coronary heart disease. The condition may have associated with it inflammation of the fibrous tissue of the heart muscle, insufficiency of the aorta and syphilitic involvement of the aorta.

Angina pectoris is a disorder of later life. It occurs more often in men than in women. Usually the afflicted person belongs to the professional classes.

Angina is commonly brought on by physical exertion with relief afforded by cessation of effort. It may be brought on by excitement, simple swallowing, the ingestion of food, exposure to cold, walking with effort, speaking, smoking, eating or any type of exertion. Occasionally there is no demonstrable exciting cause.

The symptoms usually consist of pain beneath the breast bone and often radiating out into the left arm and often as far as the fingers. Sometimes the pain may be referred to the right arm, neck, back or stomach area. The pain in the chest or upper abdomen, which is clearly induced by

The Sutherlin Chevrolet and the Oakland town team will vie in baseball Sunday afternoon.

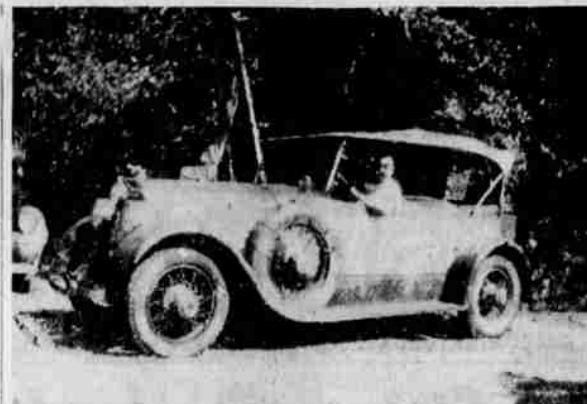

Timber Area Again Blazing Near Klamath

EUREKA, Calif. — Despite efforts of 350 firefighters, a brush and timber fire covering nearly 2,000 acres near Klamath raged out of control again Friday.

Fire crews, which include 54 convicts from San Quentin Prison, have been battling the blaze since Monday with bulldozers, tank trucks and hand tools.

Foresters twice reported the blaze almost under control but wind and dry weather hampered efforts to encircle the fire area.

The fire is in canyon country about six miles southeast of Klamath, an area used for logging by several Eureka mills.

Britain Prepares To Set Off Her First Atom Bomb

LONDON — Britain warned world shipping and aircraft Friday to keep out of about 30,000 square miles of ocean off Northwest Australia because this nation is about ready to set off her first atomic weapon there.

The Admiralty said the huge island-sprinkled area of the Indian Ocean now is dangerous and will remain so until further notice, owing to "the test of atomic weapons."

The announcement gave no hint of the actual date or duration of the tests.

Nor was it clear how much significance attached to the Admiralty's reference to "weapons" instead of a single weapon.

Prime Minister Winston Churchill disclosed last winter that Britain had produced an atomic weapon and set up arrangements for its large-scale production.

He said he had ordered tests to be carried out on the uninhabited, almost waterless Monte Bello Islands, about 50 miles off Australia's northwest coast.

The islands lie some 30 miles inside the danger area as defined by the Admiralty.

The irregular, approximately pentagon-shaped region is mostly open sea. It is more than 200 miles long and some 200 miles wide at its broadest point.

Yoncalla Youth Jailed On Grand Larceny Count

LeRoy Ernest Thiele, 19, of Yoncalla, was returned to the Douglas County jail Friday charged with grand larceny, the sheriff's office reported.

Thiele waived preliminary hearing in District Justice Clarence Leonard's court and is held in lieu of \$2,000 bail. He was arrested by Eugene police and returned by a deputy sheriff.

Lightning And Hail Hit Central Counties

PRINEVILLE — Lightning and hail hit scattered areas of Central Oregon late Friday.

The Ochoco National forest had no fires and little rain, but not far outside the forest lightning set seven blazes on public land protected by the state. Crews were out all night and reported at dawn that all of the fires were controlled and damage was light.



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
