The Soap Box Derby will be aired over KRNR, Sunday afternoon at 3:00.

Cannery Layoffs Boost Oregon Unemployment

SALEM (AP) — Cannery layoffs have boosted Oregon unemployment, the Compensation Commission reported Thursday.

The number actively seeking work claimed from 17,078 two months ago to 18,236 on Aug. 1—the biggest early summer increase since the end of the war. A year ago 13,233 job seekers were reported.

Only 333 employees of food processing plants received checks early in July but 1,342 were listed last week—nearly a fourth of all claimants. With bean picking now well under way and late fruits beginning to come in, cannery employment is expected to head toward the peak early in September.

Winston Civil Defense Plan Needs Volunteers

Volunteers are still needed for the Civilian Defense program in the Winston-Dillard area.

These words come from Russ Turner who heads the organization in this community. Eleven of the 27 volunteers needed turned out at Tuesday night's meeting, Turner said, and it is hoped that at least nine more will offer their services this week.

Anyone willing to help may contact Turner at the Winston Electric building or telephone him at 9-8723. Instructions will be given these citizens in emergency treatment of fire, flood, or any other disasters which might strike the community.

It is anticipated that a sky-watch will be set up in the near future. Upon completion of the lessons in defense applicants will undergo screening in Roseburg.

Details of the recent quakes which have been rocking Southern California have been related in a letter written to Mr. and Mrs. George Bacher.

The writers, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Miller, told of how they were awakened by "a continuous splashing sound," which turned out to be the gasoline in the family car parked beneath the bedroom window. By the time they could locate a flashlight (power having been knocked out by the first shock) the house "was giving sickening lurches as if riding the waves," they said. Plaster cracked inside their home, and pictures bounced off the walls.

Most of their neighbors, in spite of warnings, rushed out doors, they continued, and therein lay the danger as most casualties occur from hot wires and flying debris. The Millers had just moved from Reseda to Van Nuys (to avoid flood dangers) when the quake struck. Their small daughter, Jo Ann, is tearfully insisting that they return to their former home. "The earth doesn't shake there," she says. Athe Millers have visited in Winston many times.

The Portland guest was en route home following a visit with his 96-year-old father, Henry Bacher, in Grants Pass. The elder Bacher recently suffered a fractured shoulder in a fall at his home. He is reported to be making a "surprisingly rapid" recovery and is expected to be released from the sanatorium soon. He is well known here, having visited many times in the George Bacher home.
