Festivities will get under way at 8 o'clock with music by the Corn Poppers, Bend square dance orchestra. Louie Olsen of Madras, Len Gorton of Redmond and Claude Cook of Bend will be MC's for the three-part program.

After the grand promenade, the first square will be "Manana," with Bend's square-dancing mayor, Wes Welcome, as caller. "Dive for the Oyster" will follow, with Alton Johnson of Eugene at the mike. A pattern dance, "Josephine," will precede "Four Gents Star," to be called by Erwin Gledel of Vancouver.

The first portion of the program will also include "Crawdad Song," "Oregon Star" and "Steamboat," three of the newer squares, with Lloyd Lewis of Portland, Neil Brown of Salem and Roland Onfrey of Boise, Ida., calling in that order. The mixer, "Slow Poke" will provide a break.

The second part of the program will get under way with a mixer, "Five Foot Two." The first two squares will be "Hot Time" called by Mert Sauers of Tygh Valley, and "Forward Six Wagon Wheel Over" called by Laurie Wylie of John Day.
