some narrow escapes by the injured.

Winchell, husband and father of the missing pair, and his daughter, Sharon, escaped from their house after it had washed downstream about 150 yards.

Sharon was treated for shock and severe scratches received when she was carried against a barbed wire fence. Mrs. Webb, Mary Ann Webb, and Mrs. Bill Eckley also were hospitalized, suffering from shock and cuts.

Ted Noyes, 17, a neighbor who helped with rescue efforts, said he drove a tractor down the bank of the Wenas after the flood passed, to the spot where the Webb home had been.

He said Webb had just pulled Mary Ann, unconscious, from the water. Noyes took the two to safety on higher ground. He said he heard someone calling for help when he returned and found Mrs. Webb in a field.

Farther downstream, Noyes spotted nine-year-old Ellen Eckley on the roof of a partly submerged building. The water was only waist deep at this point, Noyes said. He waded out and rescued the girl.

SPOT ADVICE

BAD BUTTONS CAN BE AVOIDED

VEGETABLE IVORY BUTTONS. In the past, the dyes on these buttons faded, and while manufacturers now produce a button colored with fast dyes, there are still a few "vegetable ivory" buttons left on the market which fade. Be sure to give the buttons close attention when you buy a garment, especially on "sale" or "clearance" items.

PLASTIC BUTTONS. Major problem here is one of susceptibility to heat. If it's a thermo-plastic button it will lose its shape when heat is applied, and will dissolve in cleaning. Better pass it up. It won't last long anyway.

GLASS BUTTONS. Pretty, but a nuisance. Break in handling and often cut the material they're fastened to. Best thing is to take them off before cleaning. If you treasure your glass buttons, ask us to take them off, or still better, snip them off before bringing the garment in.

COVERED BUTTONS. Many cloth-covered buttons now on the market are stuffed with a fibrous material which releases a brown dye in cleaning. This dye, like the vegetable ivory one, is difficult to remove.

When buying buttons, check with the merchant — whether you're buying a garment or loose buttons — FIRST, if the button itself is dye fast, and SECOND, whether it is impervious to heat and cleaning. If he cannot assure you, choose another set of buttons of which you can be sure.
