

U. S. Lure Too Strong, She'll Again Quit Ireland

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP)—For 40 years in Kansas City, Mrs. May O'Brien couldn't forget that green sod of her native Ireland. When her husband died she came back, resolved to pass her declining years in the town of her birth, Newtonwards.

But at the age of 60 she started back to Kansas City, Friday. "I haven't felt warm since I came back to Ireland," she said. "Besides, Americans are wonderful people and I'll be glad to be among them again."

Truck Drivers In Three States Get Wage Boost

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Hourly wage increases have been approved for about 9,000 truck drivers and office workers in California, Arizona and Nevada, the regional wage Stabilization Board announced Friday.

The increases, retroactive to May 1, were 4 1/2 cents for long-time drivers, 6 1/2 cents for turn-around drivers, and 7 1/2 cents for office workers.

Pay raises in Central and Northern California and Nevada went to about 3,000 drivers.

Billy Rose Fires Verbal Salvo At Wife's Claim Of Stinginess

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Rose has fired another verbal salvo at his estranged wife, Eleanor Holm Rose, who accused him of being a tightwad.

The thorny battle of the Roses has been see-sawing back and forth ever since Mrs. Rose, the former swim star, sued for a separation. Rose launched a counter suit for divorce.

Adultery is the only ground for divorce in New York. The divorce case is scheduled to be heard next month. Mrs. Rose has been getting \$700 a week temporary alimony.

Thursday, Eleanor said the pint-sized Broadway producer was stingy with his money.

Friday night Rose, in a statement teeming with sarcasm, said in part:

"I see by the papers that Eleanor is accusing me of being a tightwad. She's absolutely right. Compared to me, Scrooge was a philanthropist."

"For instance, throughout our marriage we lived in a five-story town house on Beekman Place with only one lousy elevator. The furniture was second-hand stuff designed by Chippendale and other 18th Century English carpenters."

"Her clothes were mostly rags stitched together by cut-rate seam-

stresses like Hattie Carnegie and Valentina. . . . She only had 113 pairs of shoes, 41 sweaters and 11 ratty-looking fur coats. . . .

"When it came to jewelry, it was all last season's stuff—92 different pieces which contained somewhat less than 200 carats of blue-white diamonds."

" . . . When we split up, she was virtually destitute—\$163,000 in cash and government bonds."

Shakeup Looms In Justice Dept.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new round of top-level resignations in the Justice Department was reported in prospect Friday, and the axe is expected to fall on some U.S. district attorneys outside Washington.

At the same time, a relatively unknown attorney—Ross L. Malone of Roswell, N.M.—was slated to take over the department's No. 2 spot succeeding A. Devitt Vanech as deputy attorney general.

Vanech resigned Monday to seek the Democratic nomination for the unexpired term of the late Sen. Brian McMahon of Connecticut.

Impending new changes in the department now headed by Atty. Gen. James P. McGranery were forecast by informed sources as amounting to a virtual clean sweep of officials left over from the regime of Atty. Gen. J. Howard McGrath, and before him, Tom Clark.

Greyhound Slogan Winner Gives Report On Gift Trip

Mrs. Cora R. Clayton, Star Route, Myrtle Creek, a recent winner of a slogan contest, sponsored by Greyhound Bus Lines, has completed a scenic, four-day, expense-paid tour, with her husband, of the north and western part of Oregon. The trip was the reward for her slogan, "Go Greyhound and See Nature's Ornate Oregon." The trip was begun at 12:55 p.m. July 22.

"We were very comfortably cared for that night at the Heathman Hotel in Portland, a short distance from the bus terminal," states Mrs. Clayton in a detailed report. Her account continues:

"Early Wednesday morning we, with 22 other tourists, boarded a bus to traverse the Mt. Hood Loop. Our first stop was for a tour of the Sanctuary of Our Sorrowful Mother, the world's outstanding memorial to universal motherhood."

She describes it as a "most impressive and picturesque place."

Next was a stop at Vista Point, a vantage place for viewing the Columbia River; thence onto La-tourette Falls. Looking across the river to Washington state side are the Palisades. Further on the bridge falls, so called because of their resemblance to a cascading waterfall, on to Wahkeena Falls, height of 240 feet and two miles to point of origin; next Multnomah Falls, named for an Indian chief, is truly magnificent, she states. It consists of two falls 541 and 79 feet high. The party lunched at Multnomah Lodge and spent some time sightseeing.

Other interesting places visited were Oneonta Gorge and Trail, Horsetail Falls, Beacon Rock and St. Peter's Dome. They visited the fish hatchery on the Columbia River, where the group learned many interesting facts about propagation of salmon. They also saw a pool of rainbow trout, one of silver salmon and one of sturgeon.

From the fish hatchery, the next place of interest was Bonneville Dam, which has been reopened for public visitation after being closed during World War II and early conflict in Korea.

At Bonneville, among other sights of interest, they visited buildings housing models of other dams soon to be constructed, of which one is Chief Joseph.

From Bonneville the Clayton's trip took them up the Columbia, passing Eagle Creek Forest Camp and historic Bridge of the Gods marker, thence on to Mitchell Point tunnel, which has large windows cut in the river side, to enable one to look out over the river.

They crossed Hood River just above its confluence with the Columbia and started the climb to Mt. Hood up the Hood River Valley. They reached Timberline Lodge.

Civil Engineer Ends Life In 10-Story Plunge

PORTLAND (AP)—A 55-year-old civil engineer took his own life early Friday in a 10-story plunge from the Ione Plaza Apartments, one of the several modern, multi-story apartment hotels in the city.

The body of Wilfred Juppenlaz was found crumpled on the sidewalk. He had prepared careful instructions for his own funeral and handling of his personal affairs. Police said Juppenlaz, a former lieutenant commander in the naval reserve, had been despondent since his wife died two years ago.

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Screen Writers Guild To Strike TV Concerns

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Members of the Screen Writers Guild and the Authors League of America called a strike today against the alliance of television film producers.

The alliance comprises 13 member firms and the walkout may interrupt production of more than half of the filmed TV programs made in Hollywood.

Nine months of negotiations broke down more than a week ago when the alliance refused demands by the guild and the league. Spokesmen for both groups announced last night the strike would go on as scheduled at 12:01 a. m. today.

Big Portland Theater Sold To Evergreen Co.

PORTLAND (AP)—The J.J. Parker interest in the Mayfair Theater in downtown Portland was sold Friday for \$500,000, to the Evergreen State Amusement Co.
