

Bids On Roseburg High School Shop Held Up

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Board member W. G. Clarenbach pointed out that the room will be a good and much-needed place for community gatherings.

Other Needs Considered

If Highway 99 eventually runs within 10 feet of the back of Wilbur school's gymnasium building, (as the board thinks it may), they will ask the State Highway Department to give them land equal in area to the portion cut off by the road and to move the gym free of charge.

There was some discussion on the planned North Roseburg School on the Fruitvale site. The area survey will be in on Aug. 15. Superintendent M. C. Deller said.

What to name the school is a problem faced by the board. They said they'll welcome any suggestions from district residents.

Suggestions were made, but no official action was taken, on plans for the Senior High School gymnasium. Plans have already been revised several times, and recommendations are now scheduled to be completed by Aug. 25.

The board increased the salary of the Junior High School secretary from a 1951-52 rate of \$2,432.53 for 10½ months to \$2,957.54. At the July 14 meeting her sal-

ary had been increased to \$2,563, but it was felt this increase was too small in comparison with larger increases given other secretaries.

N. D. Johnson was appointed vice-chairman of the board.

Also heard and discussed in the closed session was what the meeting agenda called an oral report on Rose School from Superintendent Deller.

The board also turned a question on payment of \$5,000 to the City of Roseburg for sewer service at Fullerton School over to its attorney, paid off \$15,336.05 in bills for July, considered a proposed bill to the legislature which provides for holding school elections earlier in the year, discussed the need for a central warehouse for the district and adopted several administrative policies.

Firemen Denied Ballot For Bargaining Right

PORTLAND (AP)—A charter amendment to permit firemen to bargain collectively for improved wages and working conditions will not appear on the Portland election ballot this fall.

The City Council Monday voted 4-1 against the proposal with Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee casting the lone vote for the firemen.

Commissioner Nate Body said he favored collective bargaining for private industry but not city governments.
