The revenge-bent Seattle Rainiers, out to even scores for a whipping they received in a series two weeks ago, drew first blood from the Portland Beavers Monday night in the opener of a nine-game Pacific Coast League series.

The game at Portland, a make-up of a postponement, was tied at 1-1 through 10 innings. In the 11th, the Rainiers exploded for two runs and a 3-1 victory—their eighth in a row.

Seattle won the game as Artie Wilson singled, Nanny Fernandez sacrificed, Bob Boyd and Walt Judnich singled and Bob Wilson doubled. Portland's only run came in the second inning as Joe Brovia homered.

With other clubs idle, the win narrowed the gap between the Rainiers and first-place Hollywood to 7 1/2 games.

Portland moves to Seattle Tuesday to complete the series.

4 Teams For Shaughnessy Playoffs In SWO Picked

Here's how the race shapes up as seven teams gallop into the home stretch of the Southwestern Oregon League baseball campaigns.

The four teams for the Shaughnessy Playoffs Aug. 30, 31 and Sept. 1 are virtually decided—Drain, Coos Bay-North Bend, Bandon and Medford. Roseburg has a very slim outside chance of getting into the playoffs by tying either Coos Bay-North Bend or Medford for fourth place. However, this doesn't seem likely since the Fairies have the roughest two-week schedule left in the League. They play the Lumberjacks this weekend and Drain's Black Sox the following week.

The Black Sox appear a pretty good bet to finish out the season on top of the League. With a nucleus of former Portland Beavers to boost them on, the Sox have paced the League through the entire season except for a short lag early in the campaign.

The Sox lost their sixth game in 30 last weekend at Bandon when the Millers overcame an eight-run lead Saturday night to beat former Coquille hurler, Aldon Wilkie, 15-12. Wilkie was released by Coquille and immediately snapped up by Drain last week.

The Sox saved their two-game lead the next day, however, as Roy Helsler pitched seven-hit ball to stop a couple of other veterans, Dr. Frank Dierrickx and Ad Liska, 8-2.

Harvey Storey is certain to be a mainstay in the race to the wire. His booming bat clouded a homer Saturday night and added a 225-foot fence buster Sunday. In that Sunday match, he had a homer, double and two singles in five trips.

What makes the Sox appear even surer is an invasion of Brookings this weekend. The cellar-dwelling Beavers have won only one game in 20 this year. The following week is a neighborhood home-and-home battle with the Chiefs.

The Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks stand a good chance of taking over the second spot, but overtaking the Sox appears close to impossible at this reading. They come to Roseburg this weekend for a game in which the Chiefs will be primed to the hilt. The following weekend, they meet Medford in the finale. The Studs are the only nine in the League which has swept a two-game series from

the Lumberjack batting monopoly. Bandon and Medford should just about decide the third and fourth spots in the League this weekend when the Millers invade the Cheney lair. That pair of games finishes the season for Bandon.

Meanwhile, as the Chiefs work on keeping their mathematical hopes alive, they must also concentrate on holding off the Coquille Loggers in sixth place. Coquille draws a bye this weekend and has an easy one with Brookings during the last weekend. The Loggers are just three games behind the Chiefs.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Big Johnny Lindell, knuckleball artist of the front-running Hollywood Stars, maintained his role as the most effective pitcher of the Pacific Coast League with 19 wins against seven defeats through last weekend.

He also topped the strikeout department by retiring 140 batters in 219 innings of the 29 games in which he had appeared.

'Cats Cast Out Of Hoop Conference

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Kentucky's temporary castout from the conference, its basketball forces ruled with an iron fist, tackled the project of filling 14 open dates on its cage slate Tuesday.

Monday's one-year suspension from the Southeastern Conference, an unprecedented penalty levied for the school's laxity in administering its sports program, left Kentucky with only 10 games on its hardwood schedule.

In addition, the SEC ruled that two football players were ineligible for future participation and fined Kentucky \$500 for each of them.

The basketball suspension was ordered by the SEC executive committee. It means Kentucky can play no conference school for the duration of the suspension, but leaves the Wildcats free to play any school outside the conference.

In this connection, however, the SEC dropped a hint that Kentucky might have to rule on the eligibility of one or more basketball players before they would be accepted by the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

It said Kentucky's suspension was for "violation of rules and regulations" of the SEC. Only eligibility rules appear strong enough to stand behind a suspension.

This was taken as an indication that Kentucky must remove the players who caused the suspension before it can meet outside teams belonging to the NCAA. Already on its tentative schedule outside the SEC are St. Louis, Minnesota, Notre Dame, DePaul and Xavier.

Rubes Take Lead In Playoffs Here

Windmilling Bobo Willis had to pitch a no-batter and strike out 21 opposing batters to push the Rubenstein Rubes of Eugene into a one-game lead in the regional state softball playoffs at Finlay Field last night.

The grizzled right hander let only three Evans Products Co. batters get on base, but his Rubes had to go an extra winning to eke out a 1-0 victory in the brilliant pitcher's battle.

Eugene's timeless veteran, who has pitched in more championship games than most other pitchers have played, had the District 7 Coos Bay team on his hip through the entire contest. But the tantalizing rise used so effectively by opposing pitcher Harvey Well-sand kept the Rubes at bay all so. He gave up only four hits.

Willis retired the Evans Products crew with three strikeouts in all but two innings. Bill Kiley grounded out in the first and rapped an easy fly in the third. He was the only Coos Bay man who wasn't whiffed by the hulking Willis. In fact, it was Kiley who came closest to winning the game for Coos Bay in spite of the no-batter. In the bottom of the eighth inning, neither team had been able to push across a score.

But Willis let a bad one get away from him and hit Kiley. The swift little second baseman stole both second and third and was in scoring position with no outs. That's when the irrepressible Willis hitched up his belt and started fogging the ball across like a white rocket. He struck out the next three men.

The Rubes were continuously getting to first, but few progressed farther than second. Slick fielding by Coos Bay and set-up pitching by Well-sand kept an impenetrable shroud over home plate.

Well-sand gave up a bunt single in the fourth frame and a well-hit one baser in the sixth, but when he allowed a group of two singles in the eighth inning, the show was over.

Bob Wren, pinch hitting to lead off the frame, singled to short center. A wild pitch sent him scampering to second. Cece Berg laid down a perfect bunt and Wren was on third. First Baseman Bob Wetzell nailed down the hero's laurels by rapping the second single of the inning to score Wren.

The Eugene nine left 11 men on bases while Coos Bay left the aforementioned three.

Beside Willis, probably the most colorful man on the field was Plate Umpire Phil Telford. He has been a workhorse in the umpire's role in YMCA softball this year, but he is also a glutton for punishment. In almost every game,

a ticked or wild ball hits him and he goes sprawling to the earth choking on a monstrous lump of chewing tobacco which bulges his right cheek continuously.

Last night was no exception. A ticked ball caught him squarely and his convulsive choking stopped the game for five minutes.

The two teams end the best-of-three series at Eugene Wednesday in a double header at 8:30 p.m.
