Employment In Roseburg Area At Year's High Mark

Employment in the Roseburg area reached the high point of the year last month, George T. Foster, manager of the Roseburg office of the Oregon State Employment Service, reported today.

Full employment prevails and is expected to continue until the annual fall rains begin, he said.

There is a shortage of labor in skilled and semi-skilled classifications, Foster said. The supply of unskilled workers is adequate.

Most local people are working and the majority of applicants for jobs are people from other areas in the state and out of state.

Lack of housing facilities, Foster asserted, presents a big problem for outsiders in coming in to the local labor market.

Claims for unemployment benefits dropped considerably during July but the totals are much higher than for the same period last year.

The string bean harvest that is now in progress should be a help in providing jobs for many people. The bean crop is fairly heavy and work should be available through August on that crop.
