

Drain Sox Chalk Up 26th Victory

Victory No. 26 came easy for the Drain Black Sox Wednesday night in a home-stand exhibition contest.

Behind Gene Peterson's four-hit pitching, the Sox coasted to their second win over Portland's Archer Blower and Pipe, 5-1.

Single runs in each of the first three innings clinched the win for the Sox, their 26th in 32 games. A wild pitch in the first inning gave Drain enough for a tie. Al Rutschman walked and went to second on a wild pitch. Harvey Storey drove him to third with a single and another wild toss brought Rutschman home.

A pair of costly errors and a walk loaded up the bases for the Sox in the second inning to set the stage for the winning run. Rutschman again figured by grounding to the pitcher. He was ripped at first but the throw home went awry as Mel Krause scored. Ron Phillips got his second hit of the game in the third, a triple that put him in scoring position for Mel Krause's single.

Rutschman was again prominent in the sixth. He rapped a long single that scored both Jack Fasset and Gene Peterson.

Drain's only error, in the eighth, robbed Peterson of a shutout. This is the only inning in which he gave up more than one hit. He allowed two in that frame. Peterson struck out five and walked four.

In a touch of humor that spiced the game, both Jim Shorer and Manager Bill Garney were kicked out of the game in the seventh. On one play, Drain First Baseman Ron Phillips had to take a throw on the line between the plate and first. The runner, Shorer, ran into him and then skirted out of the base line. He was called

out on a call he vociferously protested. Shorer was pinch hitting for Roy Carlson. Manager Carney joined Shorer in the violent protest and soon both were out of the game. Carlson came back into the game to make up a full team.

Public Hearing Asked On Pelton Dam Project

PRINEVILLE — A spokesman for Portland General Electric Company said Tuesday that the State Hydroelectric Commission will be asked Thursday to hold public hearings on licensing construction of Pelton Dam.

The commission recently denied PGE permission to build the power dam on the Deschutes River in Central Oregon on the ground that it might reduce Lower Columbia River fish runs.

Earlier the Federal Power Commission had authorized construction. The Prineville-Crook County Chamber of Commerce Tuesday approved a resolution asking the state commission to reconsider the PGE application.

Malheur Listed Among Top 100 Beet Raisers

WASHINGTON — Five-sixths of the United States sugar beet production comes from 100 counties, scattered in 16 states.

Weld County, Colo., leads both in acreage and tons of production, and Yolo, Calif., is second.

The only Oregon county in the top 100 is Malheur. Although it is eighth in acreage, it is fifth in tons of production. The only counties in the United States to out-produce it, in addition to the top two, are Canyon, Ida., and Imperial, Calif.

Bevos Shade Seattle, 4-3; Oaks Take Over PCL Lead

The Portland Beavers knocked Seattle Rainiers out of the Pacific Coast League first division the last time they met. Thursday they were in a position to do it again.

Outbit 9-7, the Beavers made their baseless count Wednesday night and shaded the Rainiers 4-3 for their second straight victory over the league's fourth place club.

The win put Portland only a game and a half behind Seattle going into Thursday's doubleheader.

Seattle got off to a three-run start but lost the edge on Joe Brovia's eighth inning homer with Ed Barr and Frank Austin aboard.

Oakland and San Francisco meanwhile teamed to give Hollywood the business and drop the Stars out of first place.

Oakland nosed out the Los Angeles Angels, 4 to 3, and went into first place. San Francisco helped

make this advance possible by kayoing Hollywood, 6 to 4.

Sacramento staged a late-inning rally to make it two straight over San Diego, 3 to 2. The Sacs scored all their runs in the ninth inning and drove Bennett Flowers off the mound. Pinch-hitter Joe Marty's two-run single turned the trick.

Sabotin Drops Bout To Nardico

CLEVELAND — Lulu Sabotin, way ahead on the scorecards, ran into a looping right Wednesday night and lost a main event to Danny Nardico by a technical knockout.

Referee Lew Parker stopped the bout at 1:53 of the fifth round after Nardico opened a deep cut over the Warren, O., fighter's left eye.

At the time Sabotin was ahead of the Tampa, Fla., light heavyweight by three rounds to one on the official cards and was out-punching and outboxing the man who had won him three months ago in his only other professional 10-round.

Sabotin weighed 176½, just half pound more than Nardico.

150 Archers Due Here For Big Tourney

Roseburg has drawn one of the plums of the Oregon archery fraternity.

On Labor day weekend, a host of 150 archers from all over the west Coast will flood into Roseburg for the 17th annual Pope-Young Archery Shoot at the Winchester Rod and Gun Club grounds.

It's fitting that one of Oregon's top tournaments should be held in the area of one of its founders, Earl Ulrich, Ulrich, who 17 years ago helped set plans for the annual running of the event, will be one of the shooters in this year's meet. He and a group of other archers named the tourney after Dr. Saxton P. Pope and Arthur Young, two of the nation's top promoters of the bow-and-arrow sport.

The Pope-Young event, which is just one of the events listed for the three-day shoot, is a test for hunters in which all targets are reproductions of animals in their natural habitats. Fifty of these targets are placed over the course and the make-believe hunter gets one shot at each with a broadhead arrow. The striking point of the arrow counts one of three values, 10, 5 or 3. This event will be scored with the clout and wand shoot for the meet championship.

Special novelty events are also on the three-day agenda, such as archery golf and "buck and Squaw."

America Cup Matches Start On Seattle Links

SEATTLE — Two national amateur champions and other top golfers from Mexico, Canada and the United States teed off at the Seattle Golf Club in the inauguration of the America Cup matches Thursday.

The event, in which seven-man teams from the three North American countries compete, precedes the U.S. National Amateur Championship matches which open Monday over the same course.

Dodgers, Giants Divide Twin Bill

Joe Black is one major league rookie who is living up to his spring press clippings.

Back in March Black was hailed as another Don Newcombe in Brooklyn's training camp. He was tabbed as the best bet to take up the slack caused by Newcombe's entry into the Army.

It's doubtful if the Dodgers would be leading the National League by nine games if it weren't for Black. Used entirely in relief roles, the Dodger recruit has appeared in 37 games, winning nine, losing two and saving several others.

Black took part in both ends of Wednesday's day-night doubleheader against the runner-up New York Giants. He gained credit for the 5-4 day game triumph and was tapped for two unearned runs in the 8-4 night game defeat.

Black took over in the eighth inning of the see-saw opener at Ebbets Field with the score tied at 4-4. He halted a Giant rally in the eighth and got out of another jam in the ninth when he induced Hank Thompson to hit into a forced play with the bases loaded and two out.

Chicago and Cincinnati and Philadelphia and Boston also split doubleheaders. The Cubs dropped the opener to the Reds, 11-3, but won the second game, 7-0.

Philadelphia whipped the Braves, 3-0, but bowed, 9-3, in the night portion of the two-night twin-bill.
