 PORTLAND — All bids for the University of Oregon Medical School teaching hospital were too high, the State Board of Higher Education said Wednesday.

Lowest of the four bids was \$4,184,169. It came from Donald M. Drake, Portland.

Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, Silverton, chairman of the building committee, said all bids were far beyond available funds. The board asked architects to revise plans and report on Sept. 9.
