SEATTLE (AP)—Golfdom's newest trophy, the Americas Cup, belonged today to the United States and it was a youngster known as "The Boy" to his teammates who pointed the way to victory yesterday over Mexico and Canada.

Gout is one of the oldest known diseases, having been described by ancient Greek medical writers two thousand years ago. It is fairly common in the United States, but frequently remains unrecognized.

Gout occurs almost entirely in middle-aged males. It is rare in women. There is a difference between what is termed gout and gouty arthritis. It is possible to suffer from gout due to metabolic changes and all its complications, without having arthritis. Gout appears to be caused by defective kidney excretion of uric acid. At recurring intervals uric acid is retained in the blood, partly free and partly as a sodium salt. When this concentration reaches a certain level, there begins a deposition of sodium monurate crystals into and around the joints and tendons, which constitutes an acute attack of gout. In the blood of gouty individuals, the uric acid content is usually above the normal.

Acute attacks of gout frequently occur at night. The first attack of gouty arthritis appears suddenly, lasts a few days or perhaps a week or two, and then disappears completely. In the majority of patients the main joint of the big toe is the first to be affected, and in 90 per cent of patients either the big toe, heel, ankle or instep is involved in the first attack. Later attacks may include the joints first affected, or may involve the knees, hands or elbows. The pain becomes excruciating.

After many repeated episodes with acute gout, chronic gout develops. It may occur from three to even forty years after the first attack. Unlike acute gout, the remissions or periods of relief are incomplete or absent. The pain is less severe than in the acute type, but the joint may be swollen and tender. At this late stage there may be notable deformity of the affected joints. In about fifty per cent of persons, small hard deposits appear as yellowish areas in the deep red inflamed joint.

The initial attack of gout usually occurs in the fourth decade of life and may be brought on by rich heavy meals, alcohol or by worry, mental shock or an injury.

Alcoholism, especially the fermented liquors, attributes greatly to the disorder as does overeating and underexercise. Lead poisoning often results in an attack of gout.

While as a general rule perfect health exists between attacks, there are attacks permitted to come closer together by carelessness in habits until the individual becomes crippled permanently. (Paid Advertisement)

Permit Asked To Drive Piling Near Reedsport

Application has been made to the Department of the Army by the Menasha Plywood Corp., Norton Bend, for a permit to drive piles and a 3-pile dolphin in the Umpqua River along the southerly shore extending downstream from the entrance to Schofield Creek near Reedsport.

The proposed work will comprise a 3-pile dolphin to be driven about 120 feet channelward from the low water line in the Umpqua River approximately 200 feet downstream from the entrance to Schofield Creek. From the 3-pile dolphin a single row of piles spaced at intervals of 45 feet will extend downstream 1,500 feet parallel to, and from 20 to 120 feet channelward from the low water line.

Maps and plans for the work are on file and may be seen in the office of the district engineer, 628 Pittock Block, Portland.

Letters expressing views concerning the effect of the proposed work on navigation are requested from all interested parties, particularly navigation interests and State and local authorities. Replies to receive full consideration should be received in this office prior to Sept. 15, states T. W. Ragsdale, chief, operations division.

The school board, at its meeting Wednesday, set the charge for cafeteria meals at 25 cents per pupil meal, on a meal ticket, \$1.00 per week, or 35 cents for a single meal. Meals for Tri-City school will be prepared at Myrtle Creek and taken there in a specially equipped bus. Mrs. Mel Wheaton and Mrs. Hugh Riggs will serve them.

The board has sold its 1937 school bus, which can no longer be used to transport children, to the Tri-City Fire department for \$1, and other considerations; namely, operation of the department in fire drills, and added protection in the area for the school.

A 1,900 gallon water tank will be mounted on it for use in the area. The board has agreed to permit the churches to use the school facilities for recreational purposes on evenings that can be worked out with the athletic director.

Plans are also being worked out with the churches for released time from school work for religious instruction. It was the consensus that two 60 - minute periods be granted per week in compliance with Oregon law.

Dale Whisnant, head custodian, was asked to supervise the building of an incinerator on the main school grounds at a cost not to exceed \$665. Bids ranged up to \$1,500.

Sackett To Ask 2 TV Stations

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Sheldon F. Sackett, West Coast publisher and radio station operator, Friday announced plans to file applications for television stations in Walla Walla, Wash., and Medford, Ore.

Sackett said the applications, to be filed within 10 days, will seek Communications Commission authority to build a 5,000-watt very high frequency transmitter at Walla Walla and a 500-watt VHF frequency station at Medford.

Both stations would telecast on channel 4.

Sackett, who will head both corporations, said equipment contracts have been signed. He estimated that the Walla Walla Station would cost \$400,000 and the Medford Station \$350,000.

Sackett owns the Coos Bay, Ore., Times, and radio stations KOOS in Coos Bay, KROW in Oakland, and KVAN in Vancouver, Wash. He has applications on file with the FCC for television stations in Oakland, San Francisco, Portland-Vancouver and Coos Bay.
