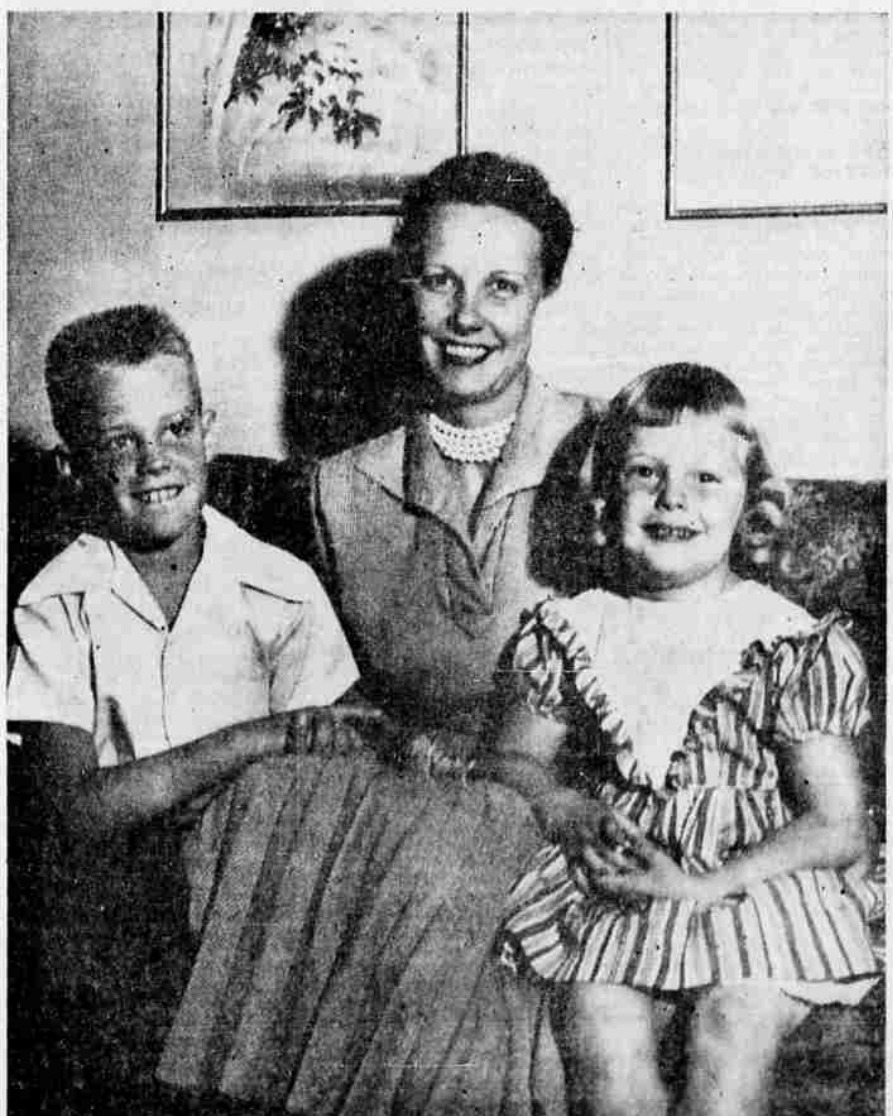
WCTU INSTITUTE TO BE HELD TUESDAY AT METHODIST CHURCH
