

Roseburg Wins Swimming Meet, Drain Second

McAneney Wins High Point Honor; Eugene 3rd In Meet

The third annual Southern Oregon Invitational Swim Meet at the municipal pool will go down in history as a dual meet between Roseburg and Drain.

The sponsoring Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce could have saved paper on invitations, because only a 13-swimmer Drain team showed up and a two-man Eugene team. Roseburg won the meet last night in a hair-raising finish, 62 to 58 for Drain. Eugene's two men picked up seven.

Oddly enough, Drain's 13-member team was the biggest at the meet. Roseburg fielded seven swimmers and won largely on the strength of the boy's divisions 15-18.

In spite of the disappointing absence of such invited teams as Grants Pass, Medford, Klamath Falls and Salem, the meet was a thriller in the nip-and-tuck battle for points between Roseburg and Drain.

Wins Breast Stroke

Chuck Bafaro's staunch little swimming unit took over the point-lead at about the midpoint and held it until the final event, the 80-yard relay for boys 18 and under. A powerful foursome of Jim Oerding, Jerry Clark, Ron McAneney and Jack Gerling won the day for the Roseburg squad with a five-point victory which meant a final four-point lead.

McAneney, a big, loose-slung Roseburg splasher, won the individual trophy with 18 points. He won the breast stroke, back stroke and individual medley and came in third in the free style. He swam third on Roseburg's winning relay team.

He was hard pressed for the honor, however. Drain's 14-year-old Dick Henderson was just two points behind with 16. He won the breast stroke, backstroke and medley events also in his division, but fell to third in the free style to cost him a tie.

Myrtle Creek Diver

Drain's comely 16-year-old, Shermaine Chapman, won high-point honors in the girl's division. She won the free style, backstroke and medley for 15 points.

Roseburg's points in the girl's division were almost wholly limited to Barbara Pattison and Sylvia Eddy. The latter picked up 12 points and the former, eight points.

The diving field was almost as populated as the swimming ranks. No less than 10 entries were listed for three optional dives, but the event was not counted in the team score. The winner was John Coleman of Myrtle Creek.

Swim Clowns

The spice in the program was a four-man clowning circus by Don Cooney, Bob Williams, Walt McNair and Jerry Clark. They literally beat themselves to pieces in an impromptu, but polished appearing performance which warmed the chill breeze with laughter from the half-populated stands.

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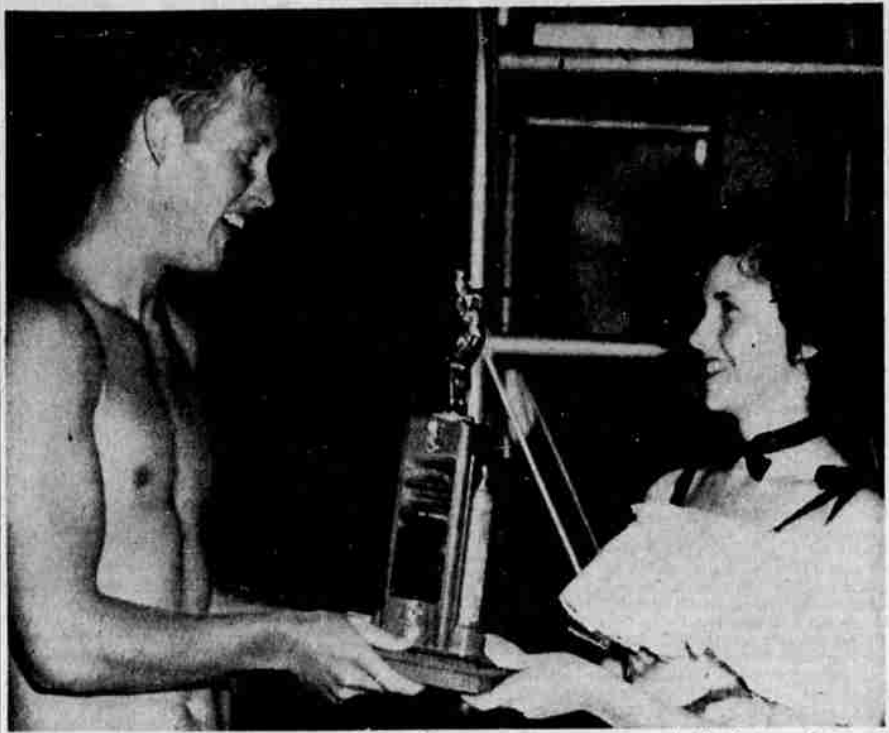

Coen Draws Chief Mound Job Tonight

Roseburg's young right hander, Mickey Coen, has been named for mound chores against the Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks tonight at 8:30 on Finlay Field.

The steadily improving Linfield College sophomore will probably oppose Washington State College's veteran Ward Rocky.

Coen has a score to settle with the Lumberjacks. The last time they faced him, the Jacks hammered out a 16-2 victory. It was Coen's most lopsided defeat, although only an exhibition tilt.

When Coen goes to the mound, he will face probably the most formidable batting roster in the state, next to perhaps the Portland Beavers. The top end of the Lumberjack lineup contains no less than five hitters clipping along at a better than .350 pace. Jeep Stetter leads the list with a .416 average. Then comes Dick Wenner (.407), hulking Buzz Arlitt (.390), Lou Scrivens (.366) and Manager ury Leiminger (.366) and Manager Curly Leiminger a .304.

The slugging averages for the Lumberjacks are just as imposing. Stetter is second in doubles with eight, third in triples with three and first in home runs with four. Wenner has six doubles and four homers and Arlitt has four triples. The Lumberjack lineup isn't only a hitting club either. It leads the Southwestern Oregon League in fielding with an .888 average.

The games tonight and Sunday, however, will pit the League's two top fielding clubs. Roseburg is second in the League with an .852 average.

The Chiefs, this year, have lost four straight to the Coos Bay team, but Roseburg Manager Earl Sargent pegs plenty of optimism on the addition of crack Catcher Jack Warren and hurler Don Siegmund.

Sunday at 2 p.m., the two teams complete the weekend series on Finlay Field, but no pitcher has been announced for the contest. On tap, however, will be Siegmund, Wally Beamer and old reliable Bus Sponer. One of the League's top hurlers, Al Treichel, of Coos Bay will probably take over the mound chores for the Lumberjacks.

Starting time in tonight's SWO League contest was changed from 8 to 8:30 in order to give the Jacks more time to warm up since they lose an hour because of Coos Bay standard time.

Giants Split Twin Bill With Braves

Manager Leo Durocher of the New York Giants is searching the Polo Grounds for John McGraw's book entitled, "how to beat the brains out of the second division teams."

McGraw won many a pennant for the Giants by rolling up overwhelming margins against the lower echelon teams of the National League. But the men of Durocher are finding the Poor Richards tough customers.

The giants of 1932 have looked like champs against the pace-setting Brooklyn Dodgers and third place St. Louis Cardinals, taking 21 of 33 decisions from the two. Against the last four teams in the league, Chicago, Boston, Cincinnati and Pittsburgh the Giants have managed to win only 38 while losing 25.

Brooklyn on the other hand has feasted at the expense of the chronic losers. The Dodgers have won 33 and lost only nine games to the Cubs, Braves, Reds and Pirates. Against the rest of the league the Dodgers have captured 19 and lost 27.

The Giants blew a fine opportunity Friday to gain a big chunk of ground on the Dodgers by splitting a two-night doubleheader with the sixth place Braves while the Dodgers dropped an 8-3 decision to the Philadelphia Phillies. By winning both games the Giants would have advanced to within 6 1/2 games, instead they trail by 7 1/2.
