## 'No-Win' Peace Plan Rejected

WASHINGTON (AP) — North Korea's expressed hope for a nobody-wins armistice has been brushed aside by the State Department as an empty gesture.

Prime Minister Kim Il Sung of North Korea, in a speech carried by the Pyongyang radio, said: "We hope to get an armistice agreement wherein there is neither victor nor vanquished."

This interested United Nations diplomats, looking for a break in the Panmunjon truce talks which have dragged on for 18 months.

But the State Department saw nothing new in Kim's speech. It issued a statement yesterday saying it refuses to compromise on the prisoner-return point but would welcome any proposal to settle "this one remaining issue."

The department said that, if Kim has anything concrete to offer, the Panmunjon truce table is the place for it. However, it added: "We will not permit the Communists to reduce the negotiating table to a sounding board for their false and vicious propaganda."

## Foreign Policy Debate Planned

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman's fresh endorsement of bipartisan foreign policy moves brought a call by Sen. Styles Bridges Friday for vigorous Republican campaigning on international issues.

Bridges, the GOP Senate leader, told reporters Democrats want Republicans to share responsibility for foreign policy decisions and hope to eliminate the issue from the campaign.

"It is ridiculous to say that foreign policy should be kept out of the campaign," the New Hampshire senator said. "It is intertwined with every important domestic issue and the American people have a right to discuss and know what their foreign policy is."

Truman told a White House news conference Thursday he endorses a 1951 Senate document which said "the conduct of American foreign policy in the past decade has, in general, been bipartisan in its aspects."

The President cited this in disjunction by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican presidential nominee, of an invitation to come to Washington for a briefing on the world situation.

Eisenhower said he did not believe there should be any exchange between him and Truman that the American people did not know about.
