Improvement of county school administration was the problem discussed by Douglas County and other Oregon school officials at a week-long workshop at the University of Oregon in Eugene last week.

Kenneth Barneburg, school superintendent, and W. M. Campbell, deputy in charge of rural school affairs, attended from Douglas County.

Main topics under discussion were auxiliary services, such as transportation, school lunch program and audio-visual aids, business and financial policies, curriculum and supervisory services.

School officials decided to ask the state legislature to pass enabling acts giving county school superintendents the power to employ auxiliary services supervisors who would work with several districts within the county.

WHEN BULLS WON

MALAGA, Spain — Authorities suspended bullfighting here Monday after the bulls got a little too tough with the matadors.

Gintanillo Ricardo Fernando Gimenez were seriously gored. Jo-selito Torres stuck himself with his own sword while trying to kill his bull and went to the infirmary in grave condition.

Officials decided to call the whole thing off before they ran out of matadors.

Bean Harvest Outpaces Pace At Canneries

STAYTON — The bean harvest in this area has been moving so swiftly that canneries have had trouble keeping up. The yield is big and the quality is reported to be excellent.

At the Stayton Co-operative Canning Co. plant up to 380 tons were delivered on top days. Growers reported that the big Blue Lake Cannery at Salem was getting deliveries in such large quantities that it was forced to shunt some into cold storage for later processing.

Although acreage this year is nearly 20 per cent less than last, the big yield, stimulated by the warm summer nights, is expected to put this area's output close to the 1951 total.

SALEM — The late harvest season finds five Oregon areas short of bean pickers, the state unemployment compensation commission announced over the weekend.

The areas, and the number of pickers needed, are: Salem, 1,000; Eugene, 400; Hillsboro, 300; Lebanon, 300; and McMinnville, 100.

Camas Valley Seaman On Anti-Sub Destroyer

Seaman Apprentice Jerald D. Smiley, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton D. Brown of Camas Valley, is serving aboard the anti-submarine destroyer USS Carpenter which recently returned to her home port at Pearl Harbor, T. H., after five months of Far East duty.

While in Korea, the Carpenter was an escort ship and rescued downed aviators in Wonsan harbor under the guns of Communist shore batteries.

Each Camas Valley School Grade To Have Own Teacher For First Time In History

The Camas Valley School will have a teacher for each grade this year for the first time, reports Superintendent-Principal Marlen Yoder. The faculty is larger than last year's by three teachers.

Six of the faculty members will be teaching at the Camas Valley School for the first time.

Guy Lutz, who will serve as vice principal and teach social studies and mathematics, comes from Myrtle Creek.

Head athletic coach will be Rodney Petty, who will also instruct high school shop classes and teach the eighth grade. The sixth grade will be taught by Ann Petty.

Mrs. Frances James, who did substitute teaching in Camas Valley last year, will have the fourth grade. New high school science teacher will be James Tallman, who comes from the University of Oregon in Eugene.

Five former teachers are returning for the 1952-53 year. Lucille Counts will be the first grade teacher, serving in the same capacity as she has for the past eight years. Mary Jane Kinnan, second grade, will be starting her fourth year in the Camas Valley school system.

The third grade will be taught for the third year by Ada Thorpe. Mrs. Carrie Pope, who taught the fourth and fifth grades last year, will handle just the fifth this fall. Byron Westlake, part time music teacher, is returning to continue the music program instigated last year. Westlake also will serve the Tennis School on a part time basis.

Yoder, superintendent-principal for the past three years, will also teach mathematics.

Cook for the newly-organized hot lunch program will be Jenny Boyer. "Blue" Spencer will cart the fourth year as custodian and bus driver, while "Bunny" Spencer will begin her third year as school secretary and assistant janitor.

Oregon's Civil Defense Practice Being Checked

SALEM — Oregon's civil defense leaders Monday were wearily compiling the results of a marathon 40-hour practice emergency which ended Sunday night.

Described by State Director Jack Hayes as "the most worthwhile project yet undertaken in civil defense", the practice alert included such emergencies as air attacks, forest fires, sabotage and coastal landings.

The "emergencies" were described in messages sealed in envelopes with the "time of occurrence" written on the outside.

When the emergency was presumed to have occurred, real radio, phone and teletype messages calling for help were dispatched from the state headquarters in Salem to county civil defense units.

The county offices, in turn, contacted doctors and emergency equipment in their areas and checked the availability of equipment, blood plasma and personnel. Although no equipment was moved to the sites of the supposed disasters, an estimate of the time needed was compiled.

Success of the eight western state civil defense operation will be determined at a critique to be held at Ft. Lewis, Wash., Aug. 26 between the military and civil defense personnel of the Pacific Northwest states. An Oregon critique is set for Sept. 3, Hayes said.

Steel Case 'Mishandled,' Sen. Sparkman Claims

WASHINGTON — Sen. John J. Sparkman, the Democratic vice presidential nominee, describes the steel case as "badly mishandled" in a copyright interview published Monday by the U.S. News & World Report.

"I think that the steel case was badly mishandled from the very first day," Sparkman was quoted by the weekly news magazine.

"I think it was mishandled, first, by both sides finding it too easy to come to the government, to pass the buck more or less—and it offers a buck-passing possibility so far as stockholders are concerned, and so far as labor unions are concerned.

"In that case, if things go wrong then the loser can blame the government." The Alabama Senator also said that "even on the procedure I thought it was badly handled."

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
