City Farming' Shows Increase Across U. S.

NEW YORK — Nearly a third of all U.S. farms are run by persons who have another job from which they derive their basic livelihood, reports the Institute of Life Insurance.

The principal income of this group comes from a job, business or profession in a town or city. The group also includes those whose main income is from pensions or invested savings.

This trend, which has almost doubled in the last 10 years, is attributed by the institute to greater use of the automobile and the speed of modern transportation.

Cobalt 'Bomb' To Help Treatment Of Cancer

NEW YORK — Montefiore Hospital in the Bronx says it will receive a high-intensity radioactive cobalt "bomb" next month from Canada to help in the treatment of deep-seated cancer.

Particles of energy from the unit penetrate cancer cells to destroy them.

Mustering-Out Pay Available To Korean Vets

Regulations and procedures governing mustering-out payments authorized recently for veterans of the Korean campaign have just been announced by the Department of Defense.

Eligible for the payments are all enlisted grades and officers below the grade of major or lieutenant commander who were discharged or released from active duty under honorable conditions after June 26, 1950. Veterans of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps or Coast Guard or one of their components, including women members, are eligible.

The law provides for payment of \$100 to veterans with less than 60 days active service; \$200 for those with 60 days active service but no foreign service; and \$300 for veterans with 60 days or more of active service who have served outside the United States or in Alaska after June 26, 1950.

Lump sum payments will be made to eligible veterans who have already been discharged or released from active duty. Those eligible for the payment who are still in the Armed Forces will receive their payment in \$100 monthly installments, the first of which will be paid on discharge or release from active duty.

To receive the payments, veterans who have been discharged or released from active duty after June 26, 1950, without receiving mustering-out pay must:

- (1) Submit on or before July 16, 1951, an informal type certified application containing: The veteran's name and address; service number, serial number or file number; statements he was not discharged or released from active duty to accept employment, without having served outside the United States; that he is not now serving on active duty; that he has

not received any mustering-out pay or that he has not or will not make any other application for the mustering-out pay for service after June 26, 1950; a statement as to whether or not he has had foreign service, and the date of his arrival in the United States.

(2) Submit, with his application, the original of the Report of Separation from the Armed Forces of the United States. If the veteran has lost the original report (DD Form 214), he should apply to the military service in which he served for issuance of a duplicate. To assure the return of this certificate, veterans are cautioned to print their present permanent address on the certificate.

Korean veterans can get application forms and further information and assistance in preparing their applications for mustering-out pay by visiting any Veterans Administration office, it was announced by the VA.
