

Chiefs To Play Stars At Finlay

Tonight at 8, the Roseburg Chiefs make their final exhibition stand of the summer baseball season against the cream of the Evergreen League on Finlay Field.

No roster has been released yet by the Evergreen All-Stars, but if it resembles the group which met Drain last month, it will be made up primarily of the one-two clubs in the four-team Evergreen League, Sutherland and Elkton. Incidentally, the Drain Black Sox won that one, 12-1.

This is the beginning of the home stretch for Roseburg's ball club. Only a home-and-home Southwest Oregon League series with Drain remains on the schedule after the All-Star game tonight. The Evergreen League is also getting in its parting shots of the 1952 season. Only three games are left on the schedule. This weekend, Sutherland is scheduled at Oakland and Elkton goes to Glendale. The season ends Sept. 1 with Elkton at Oakland.

If the All-Stars can corner the bulk of their hitting power from Elkton and Sutherland, they may show the Chiefs a trick or two. These two teams have five of the top ten sluggers in the League and have seven hitting .300 or better. They are clipping along in

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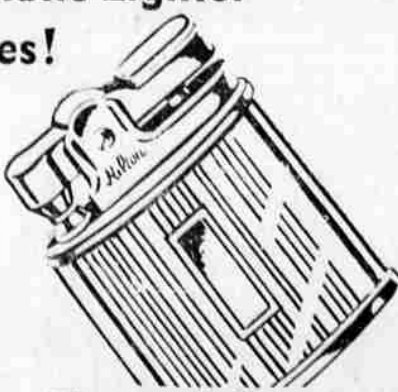

Beavers Invade Angel Lair With First-Division Edge

The Seattle Rainiers, back in the Pacific Coast League second division after their disastrous series with Portland, tackle the Oakland Oaks this week, while the rampaging Beavers go after Los Angeles. The Rainiers will have the toughest row to hoe.

The Oaks are tied with Hollywood in first place and have been steadily eating up their opposition. The skidding Angels are in sixth place and the Beavers will be in a position to tighten their grip on fourth place if they continue the inspired baseball they have played in recent weeks.

Hollywood edged into a tie with Oakland in Monday night's only game.

The Stars re-won a game they won July 24 from Sacramento, and which was protested by Solon manager Joe Gordon. Hollywood won Monday night by an 8 to 3 score, whereas the original count was 5 to 3.

The game was resumed in the last of the second inning with two men on base and Johnny Lindell

batting for Pinky Woods, who pitched in the protested July 24 game.

The game had to be replayed because league president Clarence Rowland upheld manager Gordon's contention that umpire Lou Barbour should not have allowed two Hollywood runners to advance a base when the pitcher uncorked a wild pitch that hit the ground and then struck Woods' bat. On the next pitch Woods homered.

Urzetta Upset In Amateur Golf Match Monday

SEATTLE — The Men's National Amateur Golf Championship, the ranks stripped of its last two champions, swung into the second round of match play, Tuesday with the remaining challengers crowding into the spotlight.

Belted to the sidelines in the day's two most startling upsets were the defending champion, Billy Maxwell from Odessa, Tex., and the 1950 kingpin of the nation's amateurs, Sam Urzetta of Rochester, N. Y.

Dusk was settling over the Seattle Country Club's green acres when the familiar "unknown," Ira D. Gruber, a fine hitting, calm young man from Pottstown, Pa., disposed of Maxwell on the 21st hole.

Earlier in the day, Urzetta, whose 39-hole victory over Frank Stranahan at Minneapolis in 1950 was the longest overtime match in the tournament's history, fell before Marion (Sonny) Hiskey, 21-year-old player from Twin Falls, Ida.

Gruber, a mere 18 years of age and a sophomore at Duke, sank an eight foot putt for a birdie three on the 21st to win. Maxwell had missed his putt from 15 feet out.

Hiskey, a member of North Texas State College's national collegiate team champions this year, and Idaho and Utah champion, ended Urzetta's hopes with a chip shot dead to the pin for a birdie four on the 18th green.

Maxwell's defeat carried on a jinx like string for the champions dating back to 1935. No champion has retained his title since California's great Lawson Little made it two in a row that year.

Tuesday, in contrast to Monday's organized confusion, 64 matches were on the schedule. Included in the field were the survivors of 72 matches, plus 56 fortunate individuals who drew first round byes.

Durocher Draws Five-Day Suspension And \$100 Fine

Roseburg Plans Drain Revenge

Only one weekend of Southwest Oregon League baseball play is left in this most spectacular of all seasons.

The pitched battle for positions ended last Saturday and Sunday for the four berths in the Shaughnessy Playoffs Aug. 31 and Sept. 1. The Roseburg Chiefs saw the door close Saturday night as they lost a tight 6-3 tilt to the Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks.

Sunday, however, Sutherland's Wally Beamer froze the powerful Lumberjack bats to post a major upset with his five hitter. The 3-1 Lumberjack loss dropped them to third place behind the torrid Medford Cheney Studs. The Studs rapped Brandon twice to make certain the Chiefs didn't overtake them.

The double loss failed to effect the Brandon Millers, who finished off their regular season play with the contests. They were certain of a Playoff spot last weekend.

Medford, meanwhile, is classed as the hottest club in the League at this writing. The Studs have won eight straight SWO contests. Their last League loss was on July 13 to the Drain Black Sox.

The hopes of a League and Playoff championship in Douglas County rested firmly on the shoulders of the Black Sox today. A win against the Roseburg team this weekend would give the Sox the League championship. They can do no worse than a tie for first and the only contender is Medford's blistering Studs. To achieve a tie, the Studs would have to win both its games at North Bend while the Sox were losing both ends of the home-and-home series with Roseburg.

The Roseburg-Drain game will be crucial for the Sox and they have a much tougher aggregation to meet than in their last set-tilt. The series at Coos Bay-North Bend will also be a major one in determining positions in the playoffs. A double win by the Lumberjacks would give them the runner-up position and a single loss would put the Studs in second place.

\$800,000 Earmarked For NW Conservation

WASHINGTON — More than \$800,000 has been set aside for three Pacific Northwest states and Alaska for restoration and development of wildlife resources, the Fish and Wildlife Service announced Monday.

The agency said the money will come from a \$10,679,059 fund allocated for wildlife in the 48 states and territories and for administration of the Pittman-Robertson Act.

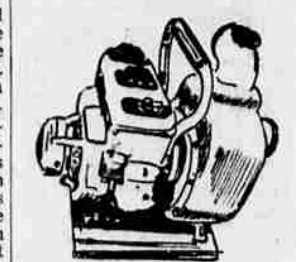
Under the act, states share in federal excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition.

Allotments include Washington, \$275,993; Oregon, \$245,938; Idaho, \$203,710, and Alaska, \$75,000.
