Truckers Given Wage Increase, Work Week Cut

A reduction from 45 to 40 hours in the work week, with no reduction in take-home pay, for truck drivers and other related employees of local pick up and delivery services in Spokane, Pasco and Walla Walla has been approved by the Regional Wage Stabilization Board according to J. B. Gilliam, Board chairman.

The Regional Board, acting under policies recently adopted by the National Wage Stabilization Board, approved a petition for approval of the reduction in hours and a general wage increase of twenty (20) cents per hour to maintain weekly take-home pay. The employers and the unions gave assurance that no additional employees would be required as a result of the reduction in hours. The Board specified that, in order to protect stabilization objectives, the wage increase could not be made effective prior to the date of the actual reduction in hours and in no case earlier than May 1, 1952, the expiration date of the last collective bargaining contract.

The petition was jointly submitted by the Motor Freight, Warehouse and Transfer Association of Spokane, representing 13 firms, and General Teamsters (AFL) Locals 690, Spokane, No. 839, Pasco and No. 556, Walla Walla, representing the employees.

In addition to the provisions for reduction in hours without reductions in weekly pay, the Board the collective bargaining contract approved an escalator clause in tying future wage rates to increases in the Cost of Living Index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, a reduction from 1 year to 9 months in the eligibility time for vacations, overtime pay at the rate of time and one half for hours worked over per day or 40 per week and a guarantee of 4 hours' pay for any hour called to work on Saturday or Sunday.

In a special action the Board granted permission to 30 other firms, not represented by the Association but engaged in the same industry, to put the same provisions into effect providing they have traditionally followed a similar labor agreement as to wages, hours and working conditions as has the Association.

Crows Spread Disease Among Oregon Turkeys

SALEM (AP) — Crows are getting part of the blame for spreading pullorum disease among Oregon turkeys, the State Department of Agriculture said Thursday.

The crows pick up the disease from egg shells dumped along a creek near an egg-breaking establishment and from hatchery cast-offs dumped in the fields for fertilizer. They then carry the disease to the turkey flocks, where they are frequent visitors, an agriculture department report states.
