Year's Work Reported

Dr. Burli Gilpin is the representative director to the state association, and Mrs. J. A. Harding is an honorary director.

At the meeting, attended by 56 persons, most of whom had worked on the Christmas Seal Sale and the Chest X-ray survey, the group voted to incorporate under the name of Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Association, Inc.

George Luoma presided at the business meeting, which included a report of the year's activities by Mrs. W. F. Amiot, executive secretary, and also the report on the chest X-ray survey.

Truman Cuts His Estimate On Tax Take

Less From Corporations By \$3 Billion; Revenue From Individuals Rises

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional money experts expressed surprise Wednesday at President Truman's estimate that federal taxes on corporations this fiscal year will yield three billion dollars less than he had figured in his budget seven months ago.

However, among the few lawmakers available for comment on the revised budget estimates released Tuesday night, none challenged the possibility that the drop-back point has been reached.

Rep. Daniel A. Reed of New York, ranking Republican on the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, said it had been evident to him for some time that retail business has been lagging. He observed that such a condition could hardly exist without a backlash on manufacturers.

In his new look at the budget, Truman figured that not only receipts but spending and the year-end deficit are coming down. For the fiscal year which ends next June 30, he lowered his estimate of receipts from 71 billion dollars to \$68,700,000,000; of expenditures, from \$85,400,000,000 to 79 billion dollars; and of the deficit, from 14,400,000,000 to 10,300,000,000.

Income Tax Take To Be Up — One exception to the downward trend was individual income taxes, which will bring in about 33 1/2 billion dollars, or half a billion more than the January estimate.

Truman said his current estimate that corporation taxes will bring in \$24,800,000,000, instead of \$27,800,000,000 was based on two factors: A low estimate of corporation profits for calendar years 1951 and 1952; and added experience with the provisions of the excess profits tax of 1950 and last fiscal year's tax increase bill.

All but 100 million dollars of the estimated \$6,400,000,000 decrease in expenditures was due to military funds, including foreign military assistance. Truman explained that there have been not only certain reductions in appropriations but "some slowing of military production resulting from the work stoppage in the steel industry."

W. Marston Appointed On 'Retain Revenue' Body — Walter Marston of Roseburg has been named to the newly-organized Taxpayers' Committee to retain pari-mutuel revenues, announced Acting Chairman Henry W. Collins of Portland.

Marston is accepting the position for Douglas County, said, "Should pari-mutuel revenues be lost it would cost Oregon a total of \$992,812 a year, Douglas County alone would lose next year an estimated \$12,500 in fair money and \$2,400 that helps support the Northwest Turkey Show. Our organization feels we cannot afford to lose that revenue."

Executive secretary of the committee is G. Irvin Hess of Union county.

Bean Harvest In Local Area 80 Pct. Completed — The Roseburg area bean harvest is about 80 per cent completed, with pickers expected to finish work sometime next week, according to the Oregon State Employment Office.

Pickers are still working in the Winston-Dillard area, with a few others in Garden Valley fields. A total of 181 workers have been employed in the current bean harvest, employment office figures show.

Episode 4 directors and leaders met Tuesday night, and the Sir Francis Drake cast and directors and leaders of Episode 1 will meet tonight, while Episode 2 directors, assistants and leaders will meet Thursday night.

Sunday night at 7:30, leaders and episode directors will have a walk-through rehearsal. All music elements and dance sections will practice next Wednesday Aug. 27, at the Fairgrounds.

Thursday will be livestock rehearsals for stock scenes of the cavalcade.

Passes for those taking part in the pageant will be issued to directors and leaders Thursday of this week and may be obtained from the individual leaders. One

pass is issued to each participant, and grants admission through the participant's gate, but not the grandstand.

The Oklahoma Moonshiners will play for the Centennial street-dance Saturday evening, Chairman Bob Elliott announced today.

The dance will be combined with a beard contest during which the outstanding specimens of beards will draw merchandise prizes for their owners.

The festivities will begin in downtown Roseburg at 8 p.m. Howard L. Ramey, Eugene, arrived in Roseburg today to handle the lighting effects for the big Pageant Labor Day weekend.

NEGLIGENCE CHARGED

State Demands \$469,000 Of E. K. Wood Lumber Co. As Cost Of Fighting Fire

The State of Oregon seeks \$469,101.89 of E. K. Wood Lumber Co. of Roseburg for the cost of fighting the 28,200-acre Vincent Creek forest fire last summer.

A damage suit for that amount was filed in Circuit Court here Thursday afternoon by state's attorneys.

Justice Recall Petitions Again Found Invalid — Petitions to recall Drain Justice Clarence Leonard have been found invalid for the second time, District Attorney Robert M. Stults disclosed today.

In a letter to County Clerk Roy Agee, the district attorney said: "I feel that the petitions are not valid and that you would not be justified in calling a special election to consider the matter."

The first petitions were found invalid because the committee had failed to notarize each page of the petitions, as required by law.

Stults said the sponsors of the latest petitions neglected to file a statement showing contributions and expenditures for such petitions as required by law, and further that "none of the petitions circulated had attached thereto a copy of the initial petition of the sponsors stating their reasons why Justice Leonard should be recalled."

The latest set of petitions had been filed July 28 by a five-person recall committee. They are Dorothy E. Blomberg, Edward F. Jones, Gladys M. Wickwire, Vernon N. Pouncey and Leo O. Meyer.

In their initial petition, filed with the county clerk before they were circulated for signatures, the committee charged that Justice Leonard had subjected the name of law and order to disreputable abuse amongst those living under police action.

State Doing Paving Job On Glendale Streets — A \$15,000 paving job in the Glendale business district is being done by the State Highway Department, through efforts of the Glendale city council.

Black top is being spread on Pacific Avenue from the intersection of Third to Fifth Streets and north on Third from Pacific to the railroad crossing.

This work is being paid for out of a \$250,000 fund built up from gasoline taxes and is used only on the city streets of towns of 2,000 population and less.

The city council applied to have the work done three years ago and was turned down. It applied again last year and was accepted.

In addition to the work being financed by the state gasoline fund, three local merchants, Harold Cooley, Al Mohr and Ray Young, have agreed to pay for similar work to be done on the east half of the block between Second and Third on Pacific.

Contract For Viaduct On Highway Awarded — A Eugene firm has been awarded the contract to build a 90-foot viaduct on the Divide-Anlauf section of Pacific Highway, the State Highway Commission announced today.

Low bidder was Hamilton & Thomas at \$27,890.

Ike Readies Campaign's First Volley

Opening Speech, Dated At Boise, To Emphasize Middle Ground Policy

DENVER (AP) — Dwight D. Eisenhower loaded his campaign guns for a speech Wednesday attacking the Democrats and calling on America to follow a middle ground course, "rejecting both the extreme left and right."

The Republican presidential nominee flies from his Denver headquarters to Boise, Idaho, to make a major address from the state capitol steps late Wednesday.

Aides were describing it as the general's first frankly political speech since he became the party's standard bearer July 11.

Eisenhower arranged to confer first in Boise with the Republican governors of ten western states.

They planned a campaign discussion of matters of special interest to the west—such as reclamation, soil conservation and water power.

In advance of the campaign speech, Eisenhower's executive secretary, Arthur H. Vandenberg, Jr., put out a statement setting forth points the general expected to cover.

What Ike Will Say — Vandenberg said: "General Eisenhower in his speech today at Boise will denounce the attempts of leftist political groups to monopolize agreed social goals and to claim that theirs is the only way to achieve them."

"The present administration, the general will charge, is running this year with new faces but will continue to offer schemes like the Brannan (farm) plan, socialized medicine and bigger and more (Continued on Page Two)

U.S. Silver Coin Surplus Under Canadian Discount

VICTORIA, B. C. (AP) — American silver coins are being discounted here at about seven per cent on the dollar, bank officials said Tuesday.

The bank officers said the larger coins are being marked down to cover the cost of packing and shipping them to Seattle.

U. S. paper money is being discounted at about four per cent, however.

One bank manager said the larger discount for silver was decided upon after customers complained they were getting too much American silver in rolls of change from their banks. As a result of the complaints, the banks are returning the silver south of the border.

Alleged Parole Breaker Faces Bad Check Charge — State police, who were sent to arrest E. C. Dunn on a bad check charge, found him already in jail on another charge.

On Dunn's arrest and beaten them to the punch by lodging him in jail on a California parole violation charge.

State officers later served a warrant charging him with obtaining money by false pretenses. He is accused of passing an eight-dollar bad check in Roseburg. District Judge A. J. Geddes set bail at \$300.

200 Planes Deal Enemy Heavy Smash

Bombs, Fire Combine To Destroy 58 Buildings On Korean West Coast

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — The U. S. Fifth Air Force said about 200 Air Force and Navy warplanes hit a Communist ammunition supply and troop billeting area Wednesday on the Korea west coast about 25 miles northwest of the Red capital of Pyongyang.

The Air Force said U. S. Sabre jets made one of four Russian-made MIG-15 jets intercepted about 100 miles north of Pyongyang.

Planes from American carriers operating on the Korean east coast hit the target first—shortly after noon.

They were followed by Fifth Air Force fighter-bombers.

There were eight separate targets in the area, the Air Force said. Four were smashed by Navy pilots and four by Air Force fliers.

Returning pilots reported early claims of 38 buildings demolished and five damaged.

Bombs Blast Ammunition — Big explosions rocked the area as bombs smashed into ammunition stores. Flames raged through the target, a center of more than 300 buildings.

The U. S. Eighth Army said 3,134 Reds were killed or wounded in the week ended Aug. 14, highest weekly toll in two months.

U. S. Marines inflicted most of the casualties in the hot battles on Bunker and Siberia Hills near Panmunjom.

The Marines seized Bunker Hill from the Chinese Aug. 12 and beat off seven big Red attempts to recapture it.

U. N. troops early Wednesday threw back a Red probe against Bunker Hill in five minutes.

County Institute Set For Teachers — "Education of the Exceptional Student" will be the meeting topic for all elementary and high school teachers from Douglas County at the County School Institute Oct. 16 and 17 in Roseburg, reports School Superintendent Kenneth Barnhouse.

By "exceptional student" Barnhouse means the mentally gifted as well as retarded, he says.

The annual institute is sponsored by the County School Office and the General Extension Division.

In addition to the regular teachers' meetings, there'll be a workshop for all school lunch program cooks on the 16th. Laura Wells, state school lunch consultant, will be in charge.

Held in conjunction with the institute will be a school of instruction for school bus drivers and bus inspection. This will be conducted on a district basis from Oct. 13 to 16, with separate meetings in Roseburg, Drain, Myrtle Creek and Reedsport.

A former Senior High School instructor, Paul Warren of the State Department of Education and the Secretary of State's Office will handle the drivers' classes and bus inspection.
