Record Chinook Run Continues

Migration of spring chinook salmon continued at record pace through the counting station at Winchester during the first two weeks of August, reports William E. Pitney, game department field agent in charge of the Umpqua River studies.

Pitney reports 41 fish tallied over the counting board for the period Aug. 1-15, the largest number recorded during that period since the count started in 1946. Total movement since the start of the season, is 4,529, as compared with 2,861, as of Aug. 15, 1947, the parent run of the current migration and the previously high count since 1946. Seattle Gets 4-3 Rapping From Oaks

The Portland Beavers kept their Pacific Coast League winning streak alive Tuesday night, notching their fifth in a row, while Seattle's slumping Rainiers posted their fifth straight loss.

The Beavers opened their invasion of California with a 3-0 decision over Los Angeles. Seattle bowed 4-3 to Oakland.

Larry Ward of Portland and the Angels' Willie Ramsdell gave up five hits apiece, but Ramsdell was touched for four of them in the sixth inning. These four hits coupled with a walk and a wild pitch that created a long rhubarb, fashioned the three Portland runs.

With Jim Russell on third and Joe Brovia on first, Ramsdell threw a knuckler that escaped catcher Les Peden's grasp.

He made no effort to retrieve the ball and Russell scored. Peden maintained that the ball had hit Hank Arlt's bat, and that Russell should not advance. All the Angels got into the act before play was restored with Peden's protest disallowed.

Oakland employed the home run to whip Seattle. Sam Chapman and Tookie Gilbert delivered the lethal wallop, and it was Gilbert's 26th long blow in the eighth that decided the issue.

Seattle had just tied the score at 3 - all. George Bamberger notched his 10th pitching victory and the hard-working Vern Kindsfather was charged with his 11th loss against 16 wins. Seattle committed three errors.

Hollywood scored four runs in the 10th inning to put San Diego 4-0. Sacramento edged San Francisco 4-3.

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Philly Hurler Gets 20th Win As Pirates Lose 10-5

Who is the best pitcher in baseball today?

The folks of Pottstown, Pa., point to their own Bobby Shantz, the pint-sized southpaw of the Athletics, as the game's top hurler. The citizens of Springfield, Ill., contend that their Robin Roberts, the pride of the Phillies, is the best.

At any rate, one thing is certain. The Philadelphia clubs own the only 20-game winners in the major leagues. Shantz was the first to reach the charmed circle, notching his 20th triumph last Aug. 5.

Roberts, who joined him Tuesday, became the first National Leaguer to reach that total.

Roberts coasted to his 22nd complete game in 28 starts as the Phils outslugged Pittsburgh, 10-5.

The Athletics didn't need the service of Shantz as they swept a double header from the lowly Detroit Tigers, 4-3 and 6-5, to climb into a fifth place tie with Chicago.

and advance within nine games of the pace-setting New York Yankees.

Although beaten by the White Sox, 3-1, the Yankees managed to retain their two game advantage over the runner-up Cleveland Indians who lost 6-5, to the Red Sox in Boston. Washington clung to fourth place, edging the St. Louis Browns, 2-1.

The National League race tightened as the Cincinnati Reds held the front running. Brooklyn Dodgers to a split in their double-header while the New York Giants, St. Louis Cardinals and Phillies all won.
