School Children Lead Dimes March Donations

PORTLAND — Oregon school children outdid others in the U.S. in giving to the March of Dimes this year. The Oregon adults were not far behind.

E. T. Hedlund, state director of the 1952 campaign, reported Oregon school children averaged 25 cents each for a total of \$42,000. At the top was Gilliam County with a 99-cent average, followed by Grant at 76 cents, Sherman and Lane at 71, and Douglas at 66.

The statewide per capita contribution was fourth in the country, but the \$640,000 total contributed by Oregonians was larger than the combined contribution of the three states with a higher average—Wyoming, Nevada and Idaho.

City Employees' Petition Move Hit By Ruling

SALEM — Salem's Civil Service Board Monday upheld City Attorney Chris Kowitz' ruling that circulation of petitions by city police and firemen asking for a 40-hour week and collective bargaining rights with the City Council is illegal.
