

Democrat Group Lines Up For Ike

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Mississippi's Democrats for Eisenhower set up their own machinery Tuesday they hope will carry this traditionally Democratic state for the Republican nominee.

Delegates to an unofficial convention voted to name a slate of independent electors pledged to Dwight D. Eisenhower and Sen. Richard Nixon, the GOP candidates for president and vice president.

Bitterly denouncing the action of the state Democratic convention Monday that unequivocally pledged its electors to Gov. Adlai Stevenson and Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama, State Sen. Earl Evans told the Eisenhower supporters: "Our movement is not a new political party. We are Jeffersonian Democrats. I am entirely for the best candidate. I am entirely satisfied with the stand of Eisenhower civil rights."

WOMAN DIES AT 101

OREGON CITY (AP) — Mrs. Mamie Amelia Peck, who observed her 101st birthday six months ago, died at her home near here Sunday.

A native of Wales, she came to this country in 1856, when still a young girl. Her family crossed the plains to Oregon by wagon train in 1867, settling at Aumsville. Her husband died there 76 years ago. There are no known survivors.

Many GIs Fail To Get Dividend

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Veterans Administration official estimated Saturday that of those entitled to 200 million dollars in 1952 dividends on national service life insurance, only half will draw out their share in cash this year.

Officials believe there are two major reasons for this:

1. Many of the five million holders of about six million policies—the NSLI policies are held by World War II and subsequent veterans—who are entitled to dividends either did not understand or ignored instructions they must apply in writing.
2. Many who are not requesting checks are merely letting their cash be credited to their account to pay later premiums, or to draw three per cent interest after a certain date.

The estimate that only half of those entitled to 1952 dividends will be paid was based on Saturday's report that 1,448,028 checks totaling \$53,326,754 had been issued up to Aug. 7.

The 1952 disbursement is being handled by district offices to which policyholders pay their premiums except for those back in military service, whose dividends are being

paid from the headquarters office here.

A veteran who failed to send in his application in writing may still get his dividend at any time by writing to the district office where he pays his premium.

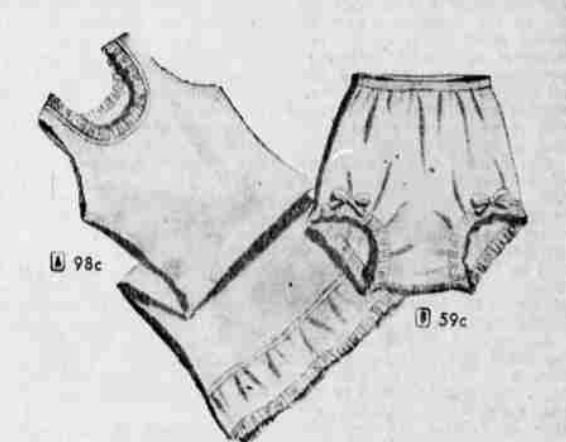
