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Ruthless War On Corruption Vowed By Adlai

MINOCQUA, Wis. — Gov. Adlai Stevenson — resting at a forest hideaway — said Wednesday he feels "very comfortable" at this time about his chances of defeating GOP Presidential Nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower in November.

Aain he told newsmen he would "deal ruthlessly" with crime, corruption and misconduct in federal government if elected president.

A reporter asked him how he thought he "stacked up" with Eisenhower in their race for the presidency.

"I feel very comfortable," he replied.

May Stand In Denver
The Illinois governor disclosed he may open his Western campaign Sept. 5 with a television speech from Denver, Colo. — the

headquarters of Eisenhower. Then, he said, he will strike westward to the Pacific Northwest and California for "10 or 12" speeches.

Stevenson said the major problems for the nation are in foreign policy — but that his own biggest obstacle to election is the Republican theme that "it's time for a change" in the administration.

He said that convictions for misconduct among federal employees had proved that "a mess does exist" in Washington. He first used the phrase a week ago in a letter to Editor Tom Humphrey of the Oregon Journal at Portland.

The Democratic nominee said Wednesday he was merely repeating a phrase Humphrey had used in a letter to him when he said there was "a mess in Washington."

But then he went on to say the convictions for wrongdoing in the federal government had proved that a mess did exist, added:

"Crime, corruption and misconduct are messy wherever they are and they must be eradicated. I intend to deal ruthlessly with such things. I always have."

The best approach to the problem, he continued, is to appoint qualified men in the first place.
