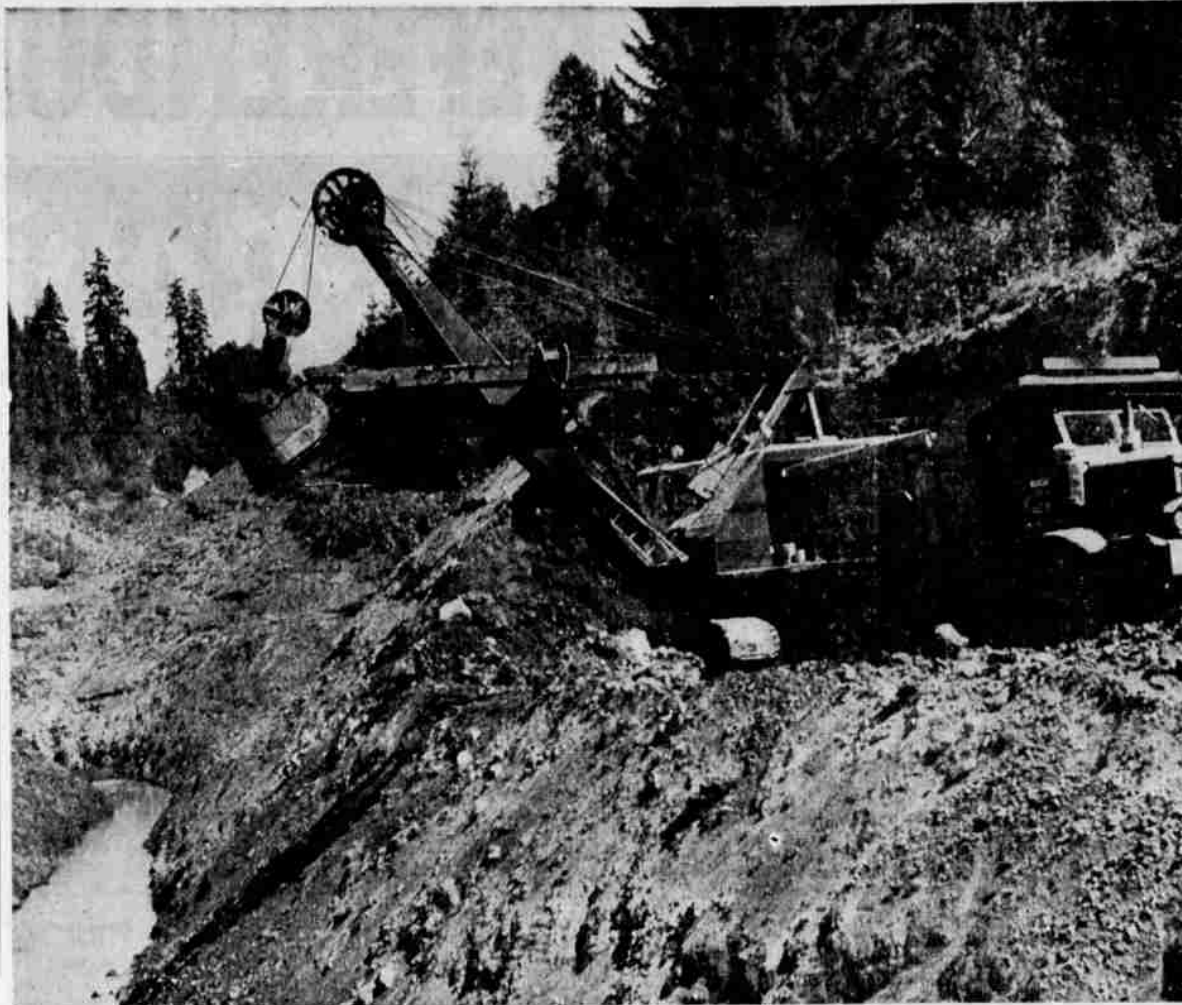

maries, reserving his endorsement for candidates who have been nominated and who then ask his backing.

On the radio program, Mundt also said that Eisenhower, the GOP presidential nominee, will also campaign for Sen. James P. Kem of Missouri, Sen. William E. Jenner of Indiana and Sen. John W. Bricker of Ohio. Republicans who have not shared Eisenhower's foreign policy views.

Monroney said he finds it impossible to believe that Eisenhower would appear on the same platform with McCarthy because of the latter's attacks on Gen. George C. Marshall, who helped Eisenhower attain his five-star general's rank.

The Oklahoma senator noted that in a Senate speech McCarthy had accused Marshall of participating in "a conspiracy of infamy so black that when it is finally exposed, its principals shall be forever deserving of the maledictions of all honest men."

"Either Sen. Mundt hasn't read this scurrilous attack on Gen. Eisenhower's friend and sponsor or he fails to grant to his candidate any of the human loyalties of a friend for a friend," Monroney said. "It is incredible that Gen. Eisenhower can embrace McCarthy, the author of this attack upon a great American. Gen. Eisenhower knows better than anyone else of Gen. Marshall's great service and patriotism to his country."

Sanity Warrant Ends Minister's Mountain Fast

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP) — A 24-day fast by a Bible Presbyterian church minister at a 7,000-foot mountain has been ended — but not by the higher authority he sought.

The Rev. Robert Kutz, about 42, was taken from the mountain yesterday by Yakima County deputy sheriffs who brought him in on a sanity warrant after concern was felt for his health.

He climbed to the top of Darland Mountain, 45 miles west of here in the Cascades, late last month after parking his car in a high meadow. He would come down, he said, when told to do so by "a higher authority."

Since then, forest rangers attest, he has had no food. He slept in his car. He didn't protest when the deputies came to get him and exhibited what one official said was "surprising strength" in walking to their car. No report has been received on his condition since he was lodged in a hospital.

The Rev. Kutz has no parish now. His wife told police he fasted 28 days last year.

officers will be required to "know it forwards and backwards."

Special forms have also been printed for the Police Department called activity reports. All duties performed by each officer will be listed on these reports at the end of each shift.

The blank includes listing for accidents handled, arrests made, windows and doors checked, etc. From these reports Chief Olson will compile his monthly records.

Records Being Clarified

One of the biggest projects now underway in the department, Olson said, is to reorganize the record division.

"There has been a duplication of effort in many cases," he said. "And the files need reorganizing to assure that we can find the records when we want them."

Underway at the Police Station today was a renovation program. Supplies in the store room were being checked and placed in neat order. The entrance way to the jail, formerly filled with miscellaneous goods, was cleaned out and is being painted, all without use of special funds from the city, Olson pointed out.

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Teamsters Urge Changes In Legal Regulations

per pound up to 5,000 pounds; any additional overload over 5,000 pounds to be five cents per pound, and that the much discussed 2,000-pound rollback now in effect be abolished.

No. 7. We are in favor of the adoption of the Washington tariff for hauling logs — the tariff and regulatory fees to pay for administration and policing of the log hauling industry.

No. 8. All permittees now holding active permits would retain the same rights they now have. We recommend five territories: a state-wide permit; a northwest permit from Eugene to the California line; a northeast permit from the Washington line to Baker, and a southeast permit from Baker to the California line.

Long Log Permits Unwanted

No. 9. We recommend all long log permits be abolished, and the highway be posted for the length of load that can be hauled.

No. 10. The tariff fee for the printing of the tariff for logs, poles and piling shall be \$2 per year; the plate fee shall be \$2.50 per year; the regulatory fee shall start at 4,000 pounds and be \$7 per year and increase \$1.00 for each additional 2,000 pounds declared. Example: 18,000 pounds would be \$14.

These recommendations have been voted upon by individual members of different teamster unions. The log truckers claim among other things that they are discriminated against because they can operate only 16 hours out of 24 and can only operate Saturday mornings until noon. If one is 10 miles from his destination on Saturday noon, he must leave his truck along the road until the following Monday morning.
