Roseburg High Grid Camp To Start 50 Youths To Start 7-Day Toughening Up Exercises

In almost the same breath, baseball season ends and football's falltime activity gets underway.

Coach Bill Reder and 50 of his Roseburg High School football charges head for camp this Sunday for a week's toughening up process.

This is the second year Reder and his "lads" have journeyed up to the Little River camp. It was instituted by Reder in his first year with the Indians with the promotional help of Mayor Al Flegel. This toughening up process which precedes the regular season training grind for the young grid hopefuls paid off with a minimum of injuries. Although Reder drew a tough year to move from his Grants Pass assistantship to the Roseburg head coach job, his camp innovation was a top-drawer success.

Assisting Reder again this year is stocky Keith "Bobo" Moore, who moved fresh from the University of Oregon to the Roseburg gridiron scene in 1951. He will take a vanguard of boys to camp Saturday to make preparations for the main body of the grid trust which leaves for camp Sunday at 1:30 p.m. with Reder and Junior High Seventh Grade Coach John Guzzo.

All other coaches in the Roseburg system are expected to attend the camp at various times during the week.

As with an army, the stomachs of the host of grid hopefuls will get primary consideration. Also returning to the camp this year are Mr. and Mrs. Ken Molyer, who received high praise for their culinary talents at the camp last year.

As yet, it is too early to tell about what to expect of this year's squad of Indians. But Reder states that on paper, the picture is "bright in comparison with last year." He has 18 returning lettermen as a starter. This number just about doubles the list of monogram returnees in 1951 when Reder was forced to start almost from scratch.

In addition, Reder has had time to integrate his system. He knows the capacities of his assistants as well as the past performances of

the probable 1952 core of players.

Coach Reder announces an innovation in the expanding Roseburg High School football scene. Increasing interest and expanding High School population has increased the size of the football turnout considerably this year. Therefore, a freshman squad is being added to the varsity and junior varsity. Two newcomers to the Roseburg coaching ranks will mentor the two secondary squads. Bob Shrewsbury will take over the jayvees and Bob Oliver has been named to the freshman top position. Each of these teams tentatively draws six games during the season.

While the majority of the varsity and jayvee squad is at camp next week, the frosh will practice nightly on Finlay Field. The first practice is scheduled Monday night at 7:30.

Boxers Suffer Brain Damage

CHICAGO — A report indicating that a high percentage of boxers might be suffering from some degree of brain damage was published Friday in the journal of the American Medical Association.

Two Denver physicians found abnormal brain wave recordings in one out of three cases in examining 24 boxers in Colorado over a year long period.

The Colorado State Athletic Commission ordered compulsory brain examinations with an electroencephalograph, an electrical brain wave recording apparatus, in a move to prevent serious injury or death from the sport.

As a result of their findings, Drs. Ewald W. Busse and Albert J. Silverman of the Colorado Psychopathic Hospital recommended nationwide adoption of such periodic compulsory brain examination of fighters.

Their studies of the 24 boxers showed four suffering from severe disturbances and five from moderate disorders.

Salem Clips Hawaiians, Wins Jr. Legion Tourney

YAKIMA, Wash. — Salem, Ore., handed Waipahu, Oahu, its third straight defeat Thursday and qualified for the sectional American Legion junior baseball championships at Hastings, Neb.

Chiefs May Shake Drain's Chances For Championship

The Roseburg Chiefs may be out of the Southwestern Oregon League baseball race, but they are in a position to shake Drain's championship hopes.

It's a slim chance, but in this most unpredictable of all sporting games, nothing's impossible.

Saturday night at 8, the Chiefs can pave the way for such an upset by scoring a victory at Finlay Field. Not only would it keep the Black Sox from wrapping up the League championship, but it would complete the Chief home-season on a happy note.

Sunday, Roy Helser's Black Sox play the hosting role at 1:30 in the game that climaxes the season for the Chiefs and the regular SWO play for both teams. Another victory by the Roseburg squad at Drain would really put

the Sox in danger of losing the crown.

Such a series sweep by the rejuvenated Chiefs would leave the rest up to Medford. The Cheney Studs are the sole remaining club with a chance to overtake the Sox. If the Sox lose both games and the Studs win their pair, the two teams would end in a deadlock necessitating a playoff game.

This appears close to the impossible borderline since the Studs invade Coos Bay-North Bend, but one important factor can't be overlooked. The Studs are the only club in the SWO which has never lost a game to the Lumberjacks. It is the only club which won a two-game series from the 'Jacks.

If the form sheets hold up, the Sox should win the championship hands down, but nothing is certain in the game of baseball.

1,700 Shoot It Out To Win Trapshooting Championship

VANDALIA, O. — More than 1,700 of the world's outstanding marksmen battle it out Friday in trapshooting's most unpredictable event and for the game's most coveted championship—the Grand American Handicap.

Shooters from practically every state in the union, Alaska, Canada, the Canal Zone, Cuba and Hawaii are in the fight for the \$1,500 first prize.

Last year Mike Wayland, 18-year-old Washington, Kans., High School student, shooting in the first squad in a field of 1,682, fired a 99 which grabbed off the big prize. A year ago the youngster fired from 21 yards. But this year he's back on the 23, from where he fired a 93 in Thursday's preliminary handicap dress rehearsal.

E. G. Beckey, 45-year-old plant engineer of Rock Falls, Ill., won a five-way shootout to take the preliminary and thereby probably wrecked all his chances to capture Friday's classic. Only one man, R. B. Barber of Paulina, Ia., has ever won the two big fea-

tures, and he did it back in 1905.

The women's preliminary championship went to Mrs. Dorothy Koller, 23-year-old mother of three from Tekamah, Neb. She defeated Mrs. Pauline Oliver, 42-year-old Lubbock, Tex. housewife in an extra event after they tied at 87.

Ronald Mosier, 17-year-old Fresno, Calif., high school student who won last year's Grand American junior championship, won Thursday's preliminary junior laurels with 96 from 22 yards.

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Boston Raps Indians, 4-1; Yanks Beaten

A month ago the Cleveland Indians were pronounced through as an American League pennant threat.

Friday, the Indians could well recall Mark Twain's famous remark: "Rumors of my death are greatly exaggerated."

The Indians appeared to be knocked from contention on Black Tuesday, July 22. That day they dropped a doubleheader to the New York Yankees and fell 7 1/2 games behind the Bombers.

But the Indians didn't fold. Instead they climbed back into the thick of the Yankee stadium for a two game series with first place at stake.

Cleveland, trailing the Yanks by one game, could take over the lead by one percentage point by beating the champions in the series opener.

Both the Indians and Yanks suffered defeats Thursday. The third place Boston Red Sox knocked off the Indians, 4-1, and the Chicago White Sox drubbed the Yanks, 6-1, to sweep a three-game series.

Washington and St. Louis divided a two-night doubleheader, the Senators winning the first game, 3-2, and the Browns the second, 8-1.

In the National League the Chicago Cubs impeded New York's pennant bid by splitting a doubleheader with the Giants, winning the first game, 8-6, but losing the second, 10-5. The standoff kept the Giants seven games behind the front-running Brooklyn.

The Dodgers' game with Pittsburgh was rained out. Philadelphia and Cincinnati were idle while in the circuit's only night game, St. Louis nipped Boston, 3-2, for the Cards' sixth straight victory.

They lost Charley (Choo-Choo) Justice, their offensive star, and their head coach, Dick Todd. Justice broke his wrist, and will be out from four to six weeks.

Officially, Todd quit to attend to his farming interests in Crowell, Texas. Unofficially, there was talk that he and the Redskins' owner, George Marshall, were at odds over the 35-0 shelling from the San Francisco 49ers last Sunday.

Todd's announcement said he asked to be relieved before the world champion Los Angeles Rams hung a 45-23 licking on his team Thursday night. The news came out moments after the final gun. Marshall said a successor will be picked Friday.

Eric The Great Back For Bout

Eric Pederson, the muscular giant from Los Angeles returns to the Roseburg wrestling arena this Saturday night for a sensational bout before the Pacific Coast Light Heavyweight hassle.

The arrogant Pederson was recently reinstated by the Roseburg Wrestling Commission after a suspension last winter. Despite his "Muscle Beach" qualities, Eric, "The Great" is one of the most popular wrestlers on the coast as well as one of the most deadly. His sensational build carried him to second place in the 1947 "Mr. Universe" contest and he was selected as the "most muscular man in America" the same year.
