Heinline Music School Announces Registration

Through the courtesy of the St. Louis Institute of Music, Mrs. C. S. Heinline was privileged to be one of a large group of prominent piano teachers chosen to attend a Master Session at the Royal Academy of Music in London this summer. She has returned to Roseburg after two months study and travel through England and the continent with much enthusiasm and many new ideas to present to her students.

The St. Louis Institute offers many wonderful opportunities to its students and teachers throughout America and one of its advantages is the Foreign Master Session held every summer. It is an institutional member of the National Association of Music Schools and is allied with Washington University. Because of this high standing they are invited to foreign universities for this Master Sessions every summer.

The Royal Academy is recognized as the largest as well as the oldest of such music centers in the world. It was granted its charter in 1830 by King George IV and

has ever since been under the direct patronage of the ruling sovereigns. Naturally its faculty represents teachers of distinction and authority, every one a specialist in his or her chosen field.

As usual, the Heinline School has a definite plan for music study for all grades, elementary, intermediate and advanced. This plan is outlined at the beginning of the season and must conform to the requirements of the prescribed course.

Mrs. Clyde Carstens has been the assistant theory teacher for five years. She directs all the class lessons and has been commended by St. Louis each year for the excellent preparation for the examinations.

The Pre-School will not open until Oct. 1 because of arranging a new studio in Mrs. Heinline's home, however, all former or prospective new students are urged to register during the week of Aug. 25 as only a limited number of desirable lesson periods are available.
