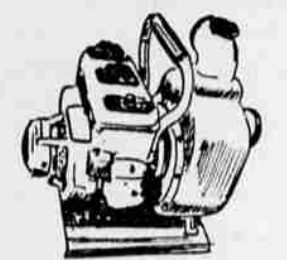

US Tee Tourney Finals Reached

SEATTLE — The old timers can take heart, the young ones cheer and a pleasant chapter will be written into the records Saturday when the final round unfolds in the 1952 United States Men's Amateur Golf Championship.

Rivals for the nation's top amateur honor are two Washington stars, Jack Westland of Everett, at 47 a most unusual finalist, and 22-year-old Al Mengert of Spokane.

Twenty-one years ago, a young man then just 26 faced the famed Francis Ouimet in the finals of this same classic, and was beaten by 38-year-old Ouimet, 6 and 5.

The beaten player was Westland, then a resident of Chicago, where the 1931 tournament was held at the Beverly Country Club.

Westland is taking time out from his campaign for Congress to campaign for the golfing crown.

Westland, a deliberate, business-like golfer, reached the finals with a sparkling 5 and 4 triumph over Bill Mawhinney, 23-year-old former Canadian champion from Vancouver.

Mengert, who is campaigning for a job since his release from the Air Force recently, ended the tournament melody of Don Cherry, 28, the ex-Texas caddy and now an established nightclub and record making crooner. The score was 3 and 2 in a match that was as dizzy as the weather.

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Games Here, At Drain End Local Season

Roseburg baseball ends tonight. Tonight at 8, the Roseburg Chiefs will center onto Finlay Field for the last time this season. They meet the powerful, pace-setting Drain Black Sox of the Southwestern Oregon League.

This intra-county series — and the SWO League season — ends Sunday at 1:30 on the Drain Field. Roseburg fans have seen some of the top baseball in the state during this outstanding semi-professional season. This game should be a suitable climax.

The Sox haven't sewed up the league race yet, so the game will have its spice of drama. It will pit one of the best fielding teams in the League against the Sox, who have probably the top mound staff and one of the best batting clubs in the League and state.

Big Names Evident

Even the element of big names is evident in this game and series. The County and League got quite a shock when Manager Roy Heller moved straight from the Portland Beavers to the Drain Black Sox. Another shock followed quickly when Harvey Storey, another former Beaver, came to the Drain park from the San Diego Padres.

Bill Beard, a third Beaver, and an impressive list of professional, semi-pro and college stars converged on the northern Douglas County town to enhance its reputation as a baseball hotbed.

Up to last weekend, the Chiefs would have been given little chance of toppling the League Leaders. But in a pair of sparkling home tilts, the Chiefs held the powerful Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks to a 6-3 win Saturday night and followed it Sunday by doing what the Black Sox have failed to do in four games — beat the Lumberjacks.

Chiefs Rejuvenated

The Chiefs found a new well of strength in a newcomer named Jack Warren, who could easily be classed as the best catcher in the League. Beside beautiful fielding, Warren carried out the most wicked bat on either team. His Chief teammates took the cue and started hammering the Lumberjack pitchers too. The result was a team of impressive caliber which can meet the Sox on their own ground.

Another pleasant surprise was a fifth-inning homer by North Bend's Wally Beamer. The Sutherlin hurler held the Chiefs to fewer hits than any other pitcher in the League has managed.

Pitchers Hush-Hush

But the subject of pitchers is strictly hush-hush this weekend. Both Roseburg Manager Earl Sargent and Manager Roy Heller have failed to reveal a starting battery tonight.

If previous form holds up, Heller will start himself on the mound or send in his sensational protégé, Jerry Cade. But he still has Gene Peterson ready for call.

Judging from his brilliant stand against the Lumberjacks, Wally Beamer stands a better than average chance of starting one of the two remaining games. Either Bus Sporer or Mickey Coen are also prime prospects for starting berths. Manager Sargent reports he will definitely not start new pitcher Don Siegmund. Siegmund cannot make the Saturday night game and must pitch in a State League game for Eugene Monday.

He will probably play an outfield Roseburg position in the Sunday game, however.

In any case, the secrecy which shrouds the choice of pitchers heralds this two-game series as a no-holds-barred event for the far-well bid to the 1952 season.

Harper Enters Coaching Ranks At Roseburg High

Roseburg basketball Coach Dick Ballantyne is all aglow today.

His former Oregon State College hoop teammate, Bill Harper is due in town almost momentarily to get acquainted with his new job as head baseball coach and freshman basketball mentor.

Ballantyne was not only pleased that he was getting a former OSC comrade, but also because he was getting an assistant so well founded in basketball.

The five-foot eleven-inch Harper was one of the top guards for the Beavers in his three years as a letterman. Particularly outstanding in his sophomore year, the OSC ace drove, ball-handled and dribbled his way to an all-Northwestern Division selection that year. He was graduated in 1951.

Knows Baseball

His know-how of baseball is reflected in the fact that he is currently finishing the season with the Albany Alcos in the tough state semi-pro league. He plays third base.

Harper's entry in the Roseburg prep athletic system is just one of the myriad of replacements and shifts that have taken place. He is one of only two new coaches on the varsity level, however.

Bill Reder and Bob Moore are still at the helm in football. Ballantyne is the hoop headman. Al Hoffman still guides tennis and Frank Purdy holds the track top job. Moore has added the guidance of the wrestling squad to his list of duties, replacing Walt Johnson.

Shifts Wholesale

On the lower echelons of the Roseburg coaching ranks, the shifts and replacements have been wholesale, however.

In football for example, three new coaches have been named. Heading the junior varsity as a replacement for Frank Purdy is John Guzzo. He was in the High School system as a social science teacher last year, but added the jayvee coaching job to his duties.

Another new face is his assistant, Bob Oliver from OSC, who will also double in freshman mathematics.

The newly-created freshman squad will be headed by another newcomer, Bob Shrewsbury, also of OSC.

Moving down into the Junior High School, Hod Turner continues as eighth-grade coach. Stepping up to the seventh grade coaching job is Bruce Hamilton, who was replaced at Riverside Grade School by Jim Henabest. Hamilton replaces Ron Pinkham, who entered business in Eugene. Reder will keep a particular eye on a host of 18 lettermen. The majority of the remaining group is just up from the Junior High or junior varsity squads.

Practices Start Here

Meanwhile, practice will also get underway on Finlay Field for aspiring youngsters who cannot go to camp. New coaches Bob Shrewsbury and Bob Oliver will greet these youngsters for the first local practice at 7:30 p.m. Monday.

A permanent coaching personnel at the camp for the week-long grind will be Reder, Moore and Jayvee Coach John Guzzo. Junior High Coach Hod Turner is expected to spend the early phase of training at the camp. Reder states he will invite all Junior High and Grade School coaches to spend at least part of the week at the camp to watch it in operation.

The Cleveland Indians are in first place Saturday convinced they will win the 1952 American League pennant.

One reason for their bright outlook stems from the fact they have conquered one of their chief stumbling blocks of the past—the New York Yankees at the Yankee Stadium.

The notion in some quarters that the Indians "choke up" when they tangle with the Yanks in New York was smashed to smithereens Friday.

Cleveland turned back the Yanks, 6-4, in the first game of a vital two game series and took over the top rung from the defending champions by one percentage point. This is the first time Cleveland has ruled the roost since June 7 and also the first time since June 14 the Yanks are the pursuers instead of the pursued.

The Chicago White Sox, fresh from three straight triumphs over the Yanks, extended their winning streak to four games by beating the third place Boston Red Sox, 4-1. In other American League games, the Philadelphia Athletics captured a two-night doubleheader from the St. Louis Browns, 5-2 and 9-0 and the Detroit Tigers defeated Washington, 2-0.

In the National League, the red hot St. Louis Cardinals defeated the New York Giants, 3-1, to stretch their winning streak to seven games. The victory also moved the Cards to within three percentage points of the second place Giants. Brooklyn's pace-setting Dodgers split a two-night doubleheader with Pittsburgh, winning the first game, 9-2, but losing the second, 3-2. Cincinnati edged Philadelphia, 3-2, and Boston downed Chicago, 4-3.
