Industri Prospect Starts Skagway Boom

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — A boom in property values in the southeastern Alaska town of Skagway was reported Thursday, coincident with rumors that developments were expected soon on a long - discussed multi - million dollar aluminum plant project there.

The Anchorage Times said Skagway property prices have risen sharply in the last 30 days "after mysterious buyers appeared and were interested in purchasing or optioning almost anything in town."

The Times said one Seattle man purchased \$30,000 in Skagway property, and that one Alaskan bought \$20,000 worth.

The Aluminum Company of America, which has held waterfront rights and other property at Skagway since 1948, declined to confirm or deny reports that an announcement on the long-discussed project was imminent.

It was the most bitter attack on Peurifoy since he remarked to Greek newsmen two days ago that a new government would be in a better position to attack the country's pressing economic problems.

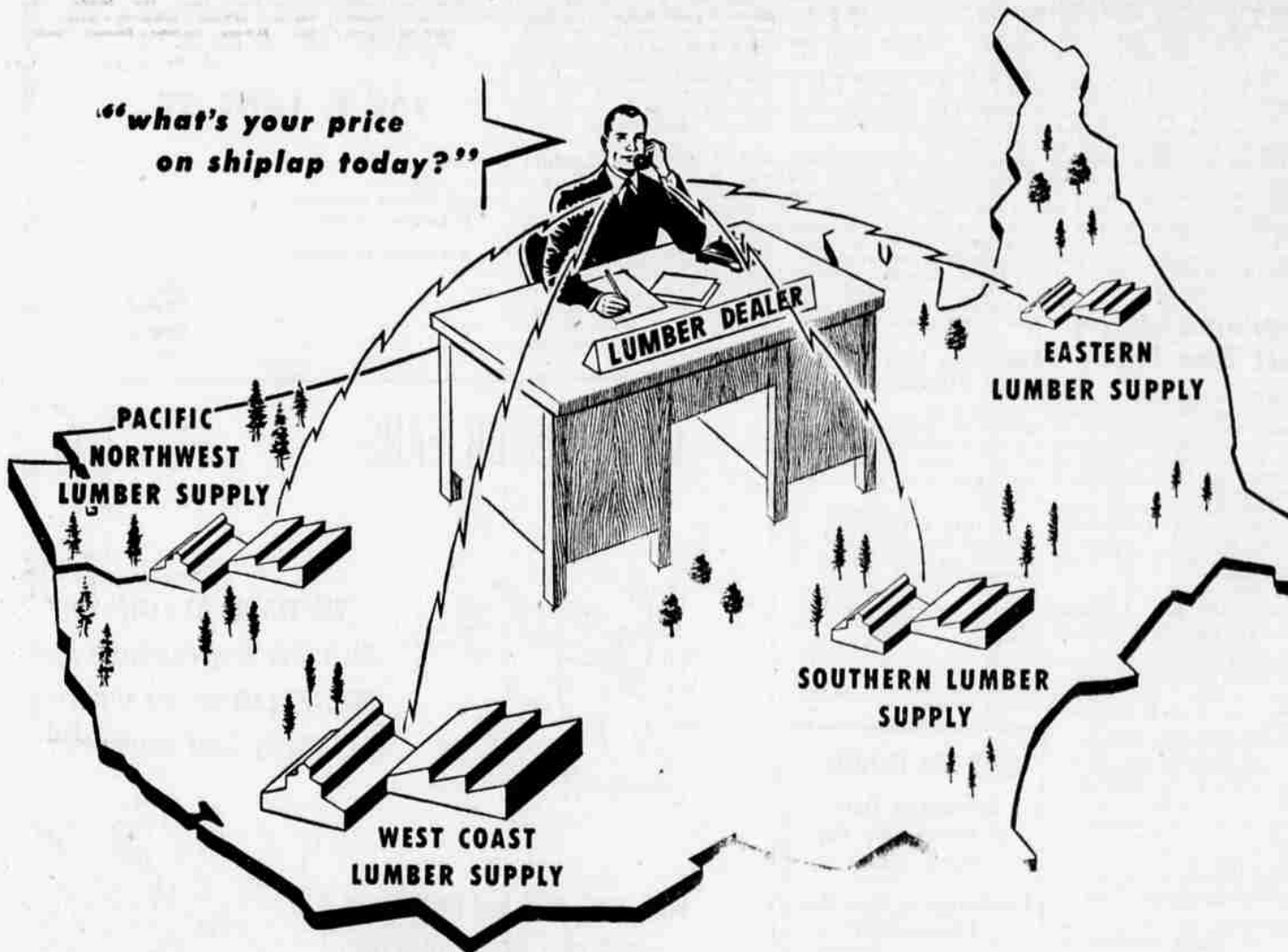

Blunders Brought On Korean War, Ike Declares

KANSAS CITY, Kans. (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower said Thursday this country might face much more serious trouble now if it had not "reacted" to the 1950 Communist attack on South Korea.

The Republican presidential nominee made the statement in reply to a question at an open meeting with GOP leaders from seven midwestern states.

Eisenhower said he believes "we could point out terrible blunders" which brought on the Korean war.

But he added "I believe we would have been in great danger if we had not reacted" by meeting the Communist aggression.

And then he said that if this country had not reacted it might be involved in much more serious trouble now.

Blunders Inexcusable

Eisenhower's stand lined him up with President Truman on the matter of going into Korea, but the general stressed he feels "terrible blunders" were made which brought on the Korean war.

And he said those who were responsible for such "blunders" cannot be excused for them.

On another point, Eisenhower said "no one I know of has presented any feasible plan for attacking China" in any move to end the Korean war.

It was not immediately clear whether Eisenhower was taking direct issue with Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who has advocated hitting Manchurian air bases north of the Yalu River.

Eisenhower said an attack on Red China would amount to fighting "a far more difficult" war "than the one we are in now."

Eisenhower set forth his views after K. B. Cornell, GOP candidate for Congress from Oklahoma, asked the general whether U.S. foreign policy should be re-examined.

Eisenhower replied the question was "as broad as life itself," but he said the policy "must be re-examined."

And—in an obvious state at Truman—the general said there must be greater respect for Congress on the part of the executive.

Teaching Right Won By Negro

BREMERTON (AP) — The rural Central Kitsap School Board changed its mind again Wednesday night and voted to go ahead with the employment of a negro school teacher.

Board members said Ester Wilfong, 22, of La Grande, Ore., will teach the sixth grade in the Central Kitsap Junior High School at nearby Silverdale.

The school district is about 10 miles outside this U.S. Navy yard city, and about two-thirds of its residents are Navy yard employees.

The board voted to withdraw its action of the previous night, which was to rescind the contract tendered the male teacher Aug. 13.

District Supt. Carl F. Jenne said the vote to reaffirm Wilfong's contract was unanimous—just as the previous night's contract-rescinding action had been.

Jenne said the reversal followed a meeting with James H. Huey, high school principal, and Glen Mansfield, executive secretary of the Washington State Board Against Discrimination in Employment.

Wilfong is a 1952 graduate of Eastern Oregon College.
