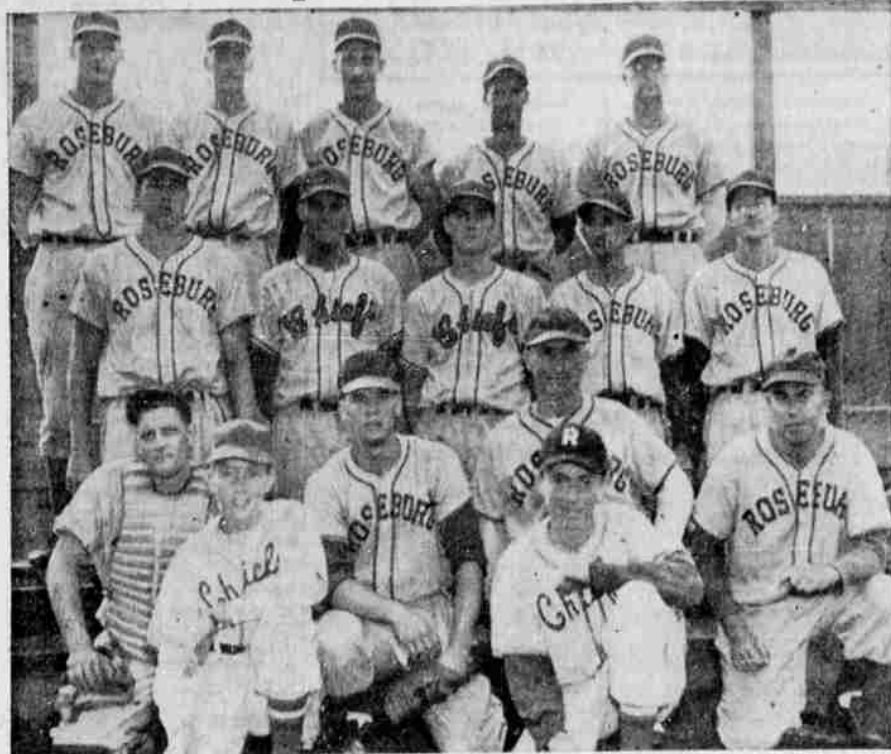


Chiefs Tip Sox, 4-3, To End Season

Coen Notches Fifth Victory On Eight Hits

The Southwestern Oregon League Drain Black Sox blew across three runs in the first inning on their home diamond Sunday, but it wasn't enough to hold the resurgent Roseburg Chiefs.
The Chiefs won, 4-3, to end the season on a sweet note and become one of four teams in the state to turn the trick in 30 Drain games this year. Only Silverton, Coos-Bay-North Bend and Bandon have managed to win against the Sox this year.
It was a countering three-run blast by the Chiefs in the third inning that put them ahead for good. Winning pitcher, Mickey Coen, went the route to win his fifth game in seven League starts. After a disconcerting first inning when he gave up four hits and three runs, Coen whitewashed the Sox by scattering four more harmless safeties.
Chuck Fiske put the Chiefs in the running with a single to lead off the first inning. A pair of outs pushed him to third and Jack Warren's slashing single brought him home.
It was the big third that told the story, however. Hal Zurcher started the rally when Don Kirsch bobbled a grounder at short. Barney Koch capitalized the break by singling. Then, for the second time, cleanup man Warren took the cue and lashed another single to score Zurcher.
On the next pitch, to Bud Shirliff, Warren went whopping to second. As he pulled up, he clenched his fists and shouted gleefully, "I stole a base." His stolen base helped bring on the winning run. Don Siegmund, playing right field for the Chiefs, rammed an over grounder to Kirsch. His peg to first bounced out of the mitt of Pat Wohlers and both Koch and Warren streaked home with the only unearned runs of the day. Siegmund got to third, but was nipped in a close play at the plate.
Coen was only in trouble once after the first inning. He hit Wohlers on the heel in the eighth. Then Ad Rutschman bounced an easy grounder to the right of the mound which Coen fielded and threw far over the head of Ferrell at first. This put Sox runners on second and third. But the fire went out on two easy infield flies.
The young Roseburg flinger can give particular thanks to two of the hottest infielders in the League. Barney Koch at second and Fiske at short had the short field covered like a tent. These two took 11 of the 19 assists in the game without an error, including two double plays. Together they had seven putouts. Fiske had seven assists without an error.
Drain Manager Roy Helser put a surprise touch on the game by failing to pitch. He started Coquille recruit, Aldon Wilkie and devoted his entire effort to directing the Sox game. Wilkie portended a fine nine-inning, but that one unearned run cost him the game.

Cade Called To Vancouver For Professional Contract

Drain's slender young pitching product, Jerry Cade, has received a beckon from the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast League.
According to unofficial reports, the southpaw control artist, who graduated from Drain Union High in 1951, will go to the Seattle farm team of Vancouver in the Western International League—that is, if he can find his parents.
It seems the offer was made last week and Cade was too young to accept. He must have his parent's signature on the contract. They are currently vacationing in Canada and he has been unable to contact them. Meanwhile, he cannot play with the WIL club.
When he does don a Seattle uniform, he will reportedly receive \$350 per month and approximately 15 percent of his sale price to a major club. No bonus was indicated.
The Drain youngster couldn't be reached for an interview, but it was reported he was unhappy about leaving the Drain Black Sox before the crucial Roseburg series and Shaughnessy Playoffs. According to unofficial sources, however, he felt he should take a fling at professional ball before being called into the service.
Drain Black Sox Manager Roy Helser deserves credit for taking the unpolished youngster and building him into one of the top winners in the Southwestern Oregon League. Cade had won six and lost only two in League play. The coach and his protégé met at Linfield College where Helser mentors during the school year.
For four years, young Cade has been one of the most publicized hurlers in southern Oregon. He led Drain High School to three state "B" high school baseball championships. On graduation, he entered the University of Oregon, but moved to Linfield spring term where Helser took him in tow.

The closely-pitted pair was even up going into that last sudden fall. And they reached a climax in the tremendous battle during that final fall when both got the same idea for an airplane spin. Both were in the same preparatory clutch for the lift, but neither could do more than lift his opponent slightly off the floor.
Sandow apparently had the champion groggy in the waning seconds of the match, but the canny belt holder suddenly came alive and dropped the youthful pretender in the clinching hold.
Kiser won the first fall with a cradle hold. Sandow evened it up with his vaunted thunderbolt.
The semi-final was another rip-roaringer. But it was cut short when Bullet Bob Cummings failed to come back for the third fall. Musclemen Eric Pederson made his return to the Roseburg Armory memorable by throwing Cummings into a fierce full Nelson that completely devastated him. Beside putting the force of both his tremendous arms into the hold, Pederson used the ropes on Cummings' neck for added leverage.

Drain Wins Title In Final Series

The Drain Black Sox nailed down the Southwestern Oregon League baseball crown Saturday night on Gene Peterson's brilliant three-hit, 5-1, victory at Finlay Field.
A near-capacity crowd turned out to watch the Roseburg Chiefs make their final home stand of the year. What they saw was the magnificent Drain right hander hold the Chiefs to a lonely single through the first eight frames. He was robbed of a one-hitter in the ninth when Pinch Hitter Nib Beamer and Chuck Fiske each collected harmless singles.
The Drain victory erased any chance of being overtaken in the SWO flag race. The Sox would have had to lose this one and the Sunday game to possibly lose the championship.
It was Beamer's blasting home run in the third that proved to be the winning run. A late swinger, the Sox catcher boomed this big one over the head of right fielder Les Winders. In the fourth, Mel Krause rammed a single to center which was good as a homer. The well-tagged one-baser bounced crazily through Center Fielder Hal Zurcher and Krause circled bases.
Gene Peterson put insurance on his own game in the fifth when he hammered another tremendous blow over the head of Winders in right field. This one also went for four bases and the fourth score. A clever jeopardy play by Beamer in the seventh put him out on a rundown between first and second, but allowed Don Kirsch to score the fifth run from third.
Roseburg's only run came in the fourth after John Ferrell had walked. Wally Beamer collected the only Chief hit in the first eight innings, a single that scored Ferrell.
The hard-hitting Sox collected 11 hits off Beamer and Ironhorse Bus Sporer who relieved him in the sixth. Sporer hurled a brilliant relief stint, striking out six.

Beavers Still Pushing Seattle After Dumping Angels Twice

The Seattle Rainiers, back in the Pacific Coast League first division after a hectic week at Oakland, can make a bid this week for third place in a series with San Diego's tiring Padres.
The Padres, in third place 9 ½ games back of front-running Hollywood but only four games ahead of the Rainiers, visit Seattle for a series starting Monday.
The Portland Beavers, trailing Seattle by half a game, also are in a position to advance in the standings. The Beavers tackle last place Sacramento in a seven-game series starting Tuesday at Portland.
Seattle won its series with Oakland, four games to three, by grabbing the Sunday opener 6-2 and winning the nightcap 5-2 in the 13th inning.
That 13th inning was the big event. The Rainiers exploded for four doubles and three runs to break it up after Al Gettel had held Seattle scoreless from the third inning.
It was Clarence Maddern's double that started the decisive action. In the opener Vern Kindrath chalked up his 17th victory of the year.
Portland dispatched the Los Angeles Angels by scores of 11-3 and 3-2. In snapping the Angels' four-game win streak in the opener Portland outfielder Jim Russell drove in six runs. He got two homers and two singles in five times up. In the seven inning nightcap Chick Pieretti was credited with the win.
The Hollywood Stars 3-2 win in the Sunday opener against San Diego and 6-2 shellacking in the nightcap gave them six out of seven wins over San Diego for the series.
At Sacramento the San Francisco Seals trounced the last place Soles 7-0 and 7-3.

Yanks Regain AL Top

Know what's keeping the Yankees and Dodgers in first place? Pitching? No. Hitting? No. Then what is it?
Okay, we'll tell you. It's the fielding... just plain old fashioned D E F E N S E.
Before the start of the season those who picked New York and Brooklyn to win the pennants predicted the Yankees would win on their pitching and the Dodgers would cop on their hitting.
With fewer than 40 days to go, the Dodgers own a comfortable 8 ½ game edge over the St. Louis Cardinals in the National League race and the Yankees have a two-game edge on the Cleveland Indians in the American.
And it hasn't been the Dodger hitting nor the Yankee pitching as much as their fielding that has been responsible for their lofty perches.
By completing a double play Sunday in routing the Cardinals, 10-4, to snap St. Louis' eight-game winning streak, Brooklyn broke a league record, completing a twin killing in their 19th consecutive game.
The Yanks came from behind to nip the Detroit Tigers, 4-2 and pick up a full game on the Indians who dropped a 16-inning 9-8 marathon to the Senators in Washington.
Two ninth inning Giant errors gave Cincinnati two unearned runs and a 5-4 first game decision. The Giants managed to get a split in the doubleheader, winning the second game, halted at the end of seven innings by darkness, 6-3. The division dropped New York nine games off the pace.
Boston's third place Red Sox moved within four games of the Yankees, sweeping a pair from the St. Louis Browns, 2-1 in 10 innings and 12-1.
Philadelphia's Athletics clung to fourth place by one percentage point, dividing a doubleheader with the White Sox. The A's came back to cop the second game, 5-1 after the White Sox had taken an 11-7 opening slugfest.
